Rambling On Rotary—August



August is RI's Membership and New Club development Month. We are a few meetings into President Karen's new year. Her first meeting on July 16 at the downs, as a prelude to the District 7120 Pride Day parade on July 20, we made tie-died apparel, and I am authoring this article that same evening. We also had the pleasure of a

presentation by District DEI Co-Chair Wanda Martinez Johncox, please note that our member Cat Jensen (and last year's Rotarian of the Year) is also a co-chair of this committee. Wanda's comments regarding her background as a member of the LGBTQ community growing up in Puerto Rico and the Catholic church were very inspirational. Wanda's service to others locally and around the world for Rotary and the Red Cross resound with last year's RI president's motto to Create Hope in the World. Rotary International's Diversity Equity and Inclusion message is for all clubs and Rotarians to "use respectful language, be supportive, foster a welcoming and inclusive environment and to CELEBRATE diversity" [emphasis added].

In the July edition of the Rotary Magazine, 2024-25 RI President Stephanie Urchick, in her message, stated "Rotary is at its best when we foster a sense of inclusion and belonging in our clubs. In fact ... that belonging is the Magic of Rotary itself. With a focus on inclusivity and belonging, it is easier to be united in a common purpose.
