

#### A WORD FROM THE DIRECTOR OF LIVINGSTON COUNTY PLANNING



**November 5:** Avon Rotary Club had the pleasure of hosting Megan Crowe, the Director of Livingston County Planning, who provided an insightful presentation on the critical work her department is doing to support local municipalities across the county.

Megan shared how the county offers technical assistance in a variety of key areas, from land use regulations and economic development to environmental protection. One of the highlights was her discussion of the county's efforts in fostering agricultural and farm development, ensuring the sustainability of this vital industry.

She also provided valuable updates on the ongoing initiatives aimed at improving broadband internet access, which is essential for both rural communities and local businesses. On Tuesday November 12th, our club sponsored its 20th Red Cross blood drive.

It was held once again at the Inn from 12:30 until 5:30. I'm grateful that we have been able to continue this much-needed endeavor, and I thank Jen for her support for this project.

The Red Cross challenged us to collect 26 units of blood during the drive. We had a bit of a slow start, but the results were 35 units collected that can positively impact over 70 patients in need. Let's consider that a great win! Thank you to the nine Rotarians that

were able to contribute as well as all the others.

Every two seconds someone in the United States needs blood for surgeries, cancer treatment, chronic illness or traumatic injuries. 29,000 units of blood are needed DAILY in the States. Care starts with one person taking time to make that generous, important donation.

Our next drive is scheduled for March 25th, at the same place and time. I hope you will join me.

#### **CELEBRATING ROTARY FOUNDATION**




**November 19:** Tonight's meeting was a powerful reminder of the impact Rotary International's Foundation has on the world—and the incredible generosity of our community.

#### **FULL CIRCLE HOME—part 2**




