

She pursued studies in Counseling and Sport Psychology, became a motivational speaker, and worked closely with the South African Police Services to support individuals in crisis.



Lies's accomplishments in physical strength are just as impressive—she has broken South African and world records, competed in South Africa's Strongest Woman contests, and even pulled trucks and aircraft. But her greatest strength lies in her ability to inspire and uplift others as a motivational speaker and mental health advocate.

After gaining notoriety in South Africa, Liesl moved to the United States on a person with extraordinary abilities visa.

Since then, Liesl has dedicated herself to working in mental health and supporting individuals with developmental disabilities. In her current role as a Mental Health First Aid Trainer with



Western New York Rural AHEC, she travels to schools all over Western NY, helping teens develop the tools they need to navigate mental health challenges.

A LITTLE AVON ROTARY HISTORY...



In the mid-1970s, Jimmy Carter made an unforgettable visit to the Avon Rotary Club. At the time, he was quietly exploring the possibility of running for president, and during a regular meeting, he attended as a guest alongside that meeting's speaker, Midge Costanza, who was campaigning for a seat in Congress.

Carter introduced himself to one of our Rotarians with a warm, "Hello, I'm Jimmy Carter, former Governor of Georgia." The Rotarian, thinking it might be a playful exchange from a visiting Rotary club member, responded with, "I'm Clark Kent, but my real identity is Superman." Little did he know that he was speaking to a man who would soon make history on the national stage.

Later during the meeting, our club secretary—known for having a bit of trouble with names—asked Carter to write his name on a napkin to assist with introductions. Carter graciously obliged, and that napkin became a cherished keepsake for the secretary for many years.

Years later, our late Rotarian and presidential historian, Mark Evans, had the chance for a face-to-face meeting with President Carter during one of his annual trips to the Plains Peanut Festival in Carter's hometown of Plains, Georgia. Mark reminded Carter of the humorous "Superman" exchange, and Carter, with a smile, recalled, "I got that a lot in those days."

Looking back, it's incredible to think that just a short time after this visit, Governor Carter would announce his candidacy for president, ultimately becoming the 39th President of the United States. The Avon Rotary Club had the honor of hosting a man who would go on to shape the course of American history—and we remember that special day with great fondness.

After his presidency, Carter continued to live his life with the values of service and selflessness that embody the Rotary spirit. His work with Habitat for Humanity, his commitment to

global peace, and his lifelong dedication to humanitarian causes reflect the ideals of "Service Above Self" that we, as Rotarians, hold dear. As we remember his visit to our club, we also honor the incredible legacy he leaves behind.

May he rest in peace.

By the age of 19, I have been lucky enough to travel to many places around the world and consider myself a well-traveled person. One destination, specifically, holds a special place in my heart. hicles. The first time there, there were not as many vehicles on the streets as there were this year, and I'm unsure if that is a positive or neg-



since this time around I actually paid attention. I am not a fan of hot black coffee, but it tasted very good, and I

was able to appreciate it more. Once we reached the top of the mountain, I was stunned by 180 degrees of incredible views. However, I immediately noticed it was not the same place I went to the first time, unfortunately, the other location has become occupied by miners and is no longer a beautiful lookout. Compared to the first trip the building process is not hugely different. I vividly remember doing many of the same jobs I did on this trip, although as a 9-year-old, I cut a lot of wire. Let's just say, I did that job for about one day this time around. Another thing to point out



is that the building process goes a lot faster when you are using cinder blocks in-



I have been to Nicaragua twice now, and each trip has been uniquely different, but the admiration I have gained for El Sauce after this recent trip is insurmountable. Each trip came with different experiences but the way I can understand and value them now will have a life-long impact on me.



To see all the children that you now know will be able to use the school that we have worked hard to build is a very rewarding experience. The relationships I have been able to build over my six years of doing this trip includes Enrique, Sergio, host families and workers that we see each time we return. After we said goodbye to our friends in El Sauce we finished our trip in Leon before heading home. Here we had fun Volcano boarding, the

While I look forward to my return each year to El Sauce it is always good to come back home and gain further appreciation for all we have here in the USA. 
supporting education, growing local economies, and protecting the environment.

INTRODUCING OUR 25-26 ROTARY INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT

Mário César Martins de Camargo, a member of the Rotary Club of Santo André, Brazil, has been selected as president of Rotary International for 2025-26. He will be the fourth Brazilian to hold the office and the first since Paulo V.C. Costa in 1990-91.

De Camargo was president of the printing company Gráfica Bandeirantes and has been a consultant to the print industry in Brazil. He has also served as president and chair of several printing and graphics trade associations, including the Brazilian Association of Graphic Technology and the Brazilian Printing Industry Association. He has served on the board of Casa da Esperança (House of Hope), a medical center in Santo André sponsored by his Rotary club that serves more than 200,000 patients every year.



De Camargo studied in the U.S. and Germany and holds degrees from São Bernardo do Campo Law School and the Getulio Vargas Foundation's São Paulo School of Business Administration. He attended a high school in Minnesota in 1974-75 through Rotary Youth Exchange, which inspired a lifelong commitment to the program.

A Rotarian since 1980, de Camargo served as his club's Youth Exchange officer in 1981, at age 24, and its president in 1992-93. He was governor of District 4420 (part of Brazil's São Paulo state) in 1999-2000, Rotary Foundation trustee in 2015-19, and Rotary International director in 2019-21. He has also served Rotary as an RI learning facilitator, committee member and chair, and task force member. De Camargo and his wife, Denise, also a Rotarian, are Major Donors and Benefactors of The Rotary Foundation.
