do in the future!



A ROTARY MOMENT TO REMEMBER

Since Richelle and I took over the Salvation Army's Avon Service Unit in 2019, we've had the privilege of hearing countless stories of how the Salvation Army has touched lives. We've heard stories of families receiving financial assistance, children receiving gifts for Christmas, and even veterans recalling how the Salvation Army's simple offering of coffee and donuts provided comfort during the darkest days of war. These stories remind us daily of the profound impact that service organizations can have on people in times of need.

But during Rotary Week this year, something extraordinary happened that really put into perspective the power of service—and the ripple effect of Rotary's work. As I was bell ringing at Tops, I had an experience that is now, without a doubt, one of the most meaningful moments of my life as a Rotarian.

Less than 10 minutes into my shift, a young man in his mid-twenties approached me and handed me a thick wad of \$20 bills. My first reaction was one of disbelief. Here was a young man, generously donating a large sum of money. I asked, "Are you sure?" And he simply nodded, responding with a heartfelt "Yes," followed by, "God bless you." As he handed me the money, he smiled and said, "As-salamu alaykum"—a traditional Muslim greeting meaning "Peace be upon you."

I was still processing the sheer generosity of his donation when he turned and walked into the store. As he left, I offered a sincere thank you, and he responded with something that completely caught me off guard: "No, thank you. God bless you, and God bless Rotary."

I must have given him a confused look, because he then proceeded to share a story that left me speechless. He told me that he was from Syria, and for the first time since his childhood, he would soon be able to return to his homeland. The reason he was alive to do so, he explained, was because of Rotary.

He told me that when his family was fleeing the brutal Assad regime, it was a Rotary Club in Turkey that helped them escape to safety. From there, another Rotary Club in Germany helped facilitate their move to Europe, and eventually, they found a new home in the United States. It was this network of Rotary clubs—working together across international borders—that saved his family and gave them a chance at life.

As I stood there, trying to process his words, I couldn't help but feel a deep sense of gratitude for the work that Rotary does, often in ways we don't even realize. The moment was so powerful that it brought a lump to my throat, and yes, I'll admit it: my eyes welled up a little.

We often hear our fellow Rotarians mention their "Rotary moment"—that instance when everything about Rotary's mission and impact suddenly clicks into place. Well, this was mine. This encounter, so brief yet so profound, has cemented the pride I feel in being a Rotarian.

LINKING HANDS FOR LEARNING

January 2: Seven Rotarians from the Rochester area are on their way to Central America to build another school. These include Avon, Honeoye Falls-Mendon and Rochester Rotarians. They will spend the next ten days working side-by-side with the community members of Las Lagunetas, Nicaragua to build a one-room schoolhouse for elementary children. They are volunteering for the organization Linking Hands for Learning, which has constructed fourteen schools there over the past twelve years. Avon Rotarians volunteering include Tom Vonglis, Helen Zamboni, Kirk Vanderbilt, and Rob Lupisella. Lauri Hoffman and Jeanine Lupisella from the Honeoye Falls-Mendon club, and Steve MacIntyre from Rochester Rotary will be volunteering as well. Joining them will be eleven others, which includes seven college students. Linking Hands for Learning will be facilitating two trips for this build and in total will have forty volunteers from the states working on this project.




Dear Uncle Jim & family of Avon Rotary Club,
