PROGRAM

Gil Sweeet introduced our speaker, **Chef Burd Holland**, has been observing businesses, restaurants, farming and local products since the late 1970's. He is currently the Chef at Fox Run Vineyards and the owner of Finger Lakes Made, a company that develops food and packaged products using only Finger Lakes ingredients. He is renowned for his use of local ingredients in cooking. He is a graduate of the New England Culinary Institute.



Chef Holland told us that at Fox Run Vineyards, our goal is to provide visitors with one of the best winery experiences in the region. Our belief is that this experience encompasses not only the quality of our wines and beauty of our vineyard and tasting room, but also an educational opportunity presented to all visitors and the quality service provided during each and every visit.

On a culinary level, the Fox Run Café features ingredients from our neighborhood farmers and producers. Our own garden is filled with vegetables that are featured on our menu. The Café is open from April through mid-December, providing a wonderful selection of cheeses from dozens of creameries and an increasing number of packaged products for cooking. Every year there is more and more NY products to choose from.

The highlight of the summer is the annual Fox Run Vineyard's Glorious Garlic Festival, held the first weekend of August each year. With numerous garlic growers, food producers, and artists, the festival weekend demonstrates that the pairing of good wine and well-prepared flavorful garlic is nothing short of sublime.

The property that Fox Run currently encompasses was a dairy farm for more than a century. The first grapes were planted in 1984 and the Civil War-era dairy barn was converted to a modern wine-making facility in 1990. In 1996, farther up the slope a new facility was completed with state-of-the-art capabilities and view of Seneca Lake that is unrivaled. The original barn itself is used now for special events, winemaker dinners and our Food & Wine Experience. The tasting room was designed and built around the barn giving us today two tasting bars, our Café and Market and gift shop.

Our tasting room is open year-round to guests visiting Seneca Lake and Finger Lakes wine country. We hope you include us in your tour of the region and enjoy the wines we currently offer. Spend time with us by having lunch in the café and taking a vineyard tour. Our online store provides you the opportunity to reminisce about your time in the Finger Lakes by purchasing your favorite Fox Run wine and having it shipped to you. Fox Run can ship to 30 states. You might even come across a bottle of Fox Run wine when you travel internationally. Fox Run is also available in almost 10 different countries around the world. 50/50 – Pauline Emery's table was the winner.
