PROGRAM

At the risk of provoking unfavorable comparisons with his predecessor, **President Ted** introduced past President **Bill Boland**, as the Program Speaker.



Bill Boland's subject was the U.S. Space program, from its early years, to the recent private launching of a rocket carrying a Tesla automobile. At each stage, the engineers and pilots had to invent, build and then test equipment and procedures that had never been built or used before.

One of the heroes of the Space Program was John Young, who participated in the Space Program over a period of 42 years. Among other things, he piloted spacecraft in each of the four different classes of space craft, namely: the Gemini Project; the Apollo Commercial/ Services Modules; the Apollo Lunar Module; and the Space Shuttle Program. John Young died on January 5, 2018 at age 87.



On February 6, 2018, Elon Musk's Space X Company launched the Falcon Heavy rocket, which is the heaviest current space craft in service. The February 6, 2018 Falcon Heavy launch included a Tesla automobile with a dummy driver named "Starman." As a result of **Bill Boland's** interest and involvement in the U.S. Space program, he is a recipient of the Service to Frontier Award.
