PRESIDENT'S TIME

President Ted had two announcements from District Governor Don Milton. The first was a welcome to the 71st Rotary Club in our district. The Rotary Club of Rochester Southwest was recently chartered. **President Ted** also noted that the District Governor was encouraging everyone to make plans to attend the district conference, to be held May 4-6 in Saratoga Springs. For more information check out the District website For his final act of the day, **President Ted** fined everyone not sitting at the front two tables \$1, because the front tables were empty.

PROGRAM

President Ted then turned over the meeting to **Wendy Winnett** to introduce our speaker, Karen Epstein. Karen has been Executive Director of Watson Homestead since July 7th of 2014. She was an educator in her previous life, spending over 30 years in various positions at Georgetown Day High School in Washington D.C. Among her goals at Watson Homestead she hopes to maintain the high morale of the staff and widen the revenue stream for the conference center.



Karen explained that the center was the boyhood home of Thomas Watson, the founder of IBM and that it opened originally as a retreat center run by the Methodist Church. She noted that the center can house over 300 people in the cabins, the retreat center and the dorm rooms.

The Center has 4 hiking trails, including one that actually links to the Finger Lakes trail system.

Two of the major efforts every year at the center are Camp Courage and Camp STAR. Camp Courage is a four day adventure camp for young burn victims. Camp STAR is the Rotary-sponsored camp for children with disabilities. The slide Karen showed of the first year of Camp STAR at Watson Homestead included our own **Ray Defendorf**.



But since the photo showed **Ray** with dark hair no one recognized him except **Ray**!

Karen also showed photos of the pool area and the chair lift that was purchased by funds provided by Rotary. She also showed pictures of the climbing wall which has been scaled by climbers as young as 3 years old and as old as 86, as well as a climber who was virtually blind.

The dining hall is capable of serving large and small groups as well as wedding receptions. The food service is run by Corning Catering.

Among the groups that use the facility are a New York State quilters group, a Native American group, the Finger Lakes Farmer's Market, which features 60-80 venders, as well as the YMCA which brings campers to the center daily during the summer.

Karen also highlighted the Red Schoolhouse, a one-room school house that Thomas Watson attended as a boy. It is now on the National Register of Historic Places.

Among her goals for the future, Karen listed:

- Making the center environmentally friendly
- Refresh the Retreat Center
- Add new event space
- Remodel the cabin area
- Modernize the heating system
- Rehab the pool and the pool house

Karen finished her presentation with a photo of the **Mike Platt** Water Towers. The old tower was outside and could be a problem in cold weather. Due to Mike's work there are now three enclosed tanks. They can work together or separately, if necessary.



A lively Q&A period concluded the presentation.
