Conspicuous by his absence from the table was Bill Plummer. He said he forgot, but tried to use Dick Wheat as an excuse. This still cost Bill one dollar. Les Rosenbloom admitted to a July birthday and it cost him a dollar as well.

PRESIDENT'S TIME

During the President's time **Jan** asked who helped with the fireworks the prior evening. Paul Tick was the only one to stand. It cost everyone else one dollar.



PROGRAM

At this point Jan called on Bill Boland to introduce our speaker, Andy Zepp. Andy is the Executive Director of the Finger Lakes Land Trust. This is an Ithaca-based nonprofit conservation organization that works cooperatively with landowners and local communities to permanently protect undeveloped lands that are important to the character of the Finger Lakes region.

Andy noted that as a former Rotarian he knows how important it is to get out on time. To that end, his goal was to discuss three topics: the Land Trust, what the Trust does in Corning, and the challenge of toxic algae in the Finger Lakes.

Andy explained that the lands and the waters are the basis of the economy in the Finger Lakes. Agriculture contributes more than a billion dollars to the economy annually while tourism is a \$2 billion dollar industry. One of the goals of the land trust is to have those economies exist in harmony.

Among the conservation strategies Andy discussed were: creating new wetlands to buffer our lakes, streams and rivers,

maintaining the rural character of the Finger Lakes through stronger land use planning, and enhancing public access to the nature trails.

In particular, he discussed the Houghton Family preserve on Spencer Hill. Jamie and Maisie donated the land and funds to take care of it. When this project started, one of the first things Andy did was have a meeting with about 30 "neighbors." They were thrilled with the project and wanted more trails. This may lead to a trail that connects with the sidewalks of Corning. It is not guaranteed, but it is a rare opportunity.



Andy also discussed the toxic algae that were present in all 11 of the Finger Lakes for the first time last year. Two prime contributors are both due to climate change. First, the more intense rainfalls we have experienced wash nutrients from the soil into the lakes. Secondly, the longer and hotter summers allow these foreign particles to "cook," creating the algae.

Andy noted that the Land Trust acquires land. Right now it holds 150 conservation easements, which limit how land can be used. In the long run the goal is to create a marriage between conservation and development.

Andy noted that the Land Trust has been able to purchase land that governments may want to purchase, but can't because of all the hoops that they have to pass through. The Land Trust will purchase land and hold it until the government can buy it back. The Land Trust can then use the money to purchase more land. In general, they purchase lots of 100 acres or more, but they will purchase smaller lots if they are strategically located.

Overall, this was a very interesting and informative presentation. Thank you, Andy.
