PROGRAM

Dick Pope, then introduced our speaker, Randi Hewit. Randi is the president of the Community Foundation of Elmira-Corning and the Finger Lakes.

Randi had volunteered to speak to us with 24 hours' notice. However, you would not have known that if she hadn't told us.



She gave us some history of the Foundation, noting that it was created on paper a few months before the infamous flood of 1972. It received a jump-start after the flood when five Corning area churches received rebuilding loans from the federal government at 1% interest. Although the churches raised the money and tried to pay it back, the government said "no." Use it for something else.

The money was invested in the Foundation. Over the years the money was repaid and many projects have been funded. The principal remains in the Foundation.



Randi then discussed their recent 45th Anniversary celebration. The goal of the celebration was to present 45 grants in 45 hours. Starting at 9 p.m. on a Wednesday evening Randi and Sara Palmer began a 30-stop tour to distribute 45 grants before 6 p.m. on Friday.

The tour started with a visit to the Youth Center at Hawthorne Court in Elmira. The tip included stops at libraries, schools, social service agencies, health facilities, parks, arts groups, and the Potter's Hands home.

The trip ended at 171 Cedar Arts Center. CreAgent Marketing filmed the endeavor and will be releasing a documentary film in September.
