SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

Gerry Wolfe kicked off the Scholarship Award piece of the program, noting once a year we have this opportunity to celebrate students who successfully applied for our scholarships. She also noted that one scholarship winner was unable to join us this week as she had an exam, so that student will be joining us next week.



Gerry then called to the front **Paul Tick**, who introduced our first scholarship recipient, Jessica Dejneka. In high school, Jessica was an officer in the Key Club and also volunteered at the Sophomore Leadership Conference, was a counselor at a girls' soccer camp, helped run a middle school track meet, and helped set up the local World Expo.

She volunteered for many community events, including the Wine Glass Marathon, Walk for Wishes, Suicide Prevention Walk, Kiwanis Pasta Dinner, Glass Fest, and Relay for Life. She also worked at the Food Bank of the Southern Tier and Salvation Army.

Altogether in her high school career she has accumulated almost 750 hours of community

service. On top of all that she is one of the top students at the Corning- Painted Post High School.



Jessica introduced her parents Pam and Matt Dejneka and told Rotarians of her plans to attend the University of Delaware in the fall and majoring in Biology. She thanked Rotarians for giving her this opportunity and intends to continue her commitment to community service in the future.

Next Gerry called forth Stacy Ward to

introduce scholarship recipient Ivan Jubilee II. For several years Ivan volunteered at Arnot Ogden Medical Center performing many tasks, such as refilling water pitchers, delivering mail, helping in the volunteer office, and delivering specimens to the lab.

In addition, Ivan volunteered with the CNY Health Education Center MASH Camp. As a Junior Leader, he helped with the interactive, hands-on, educational workshops that highlight the skills, equipment, technology, and resources utilized by healthcare professionals. These workshops are aimed at 7th-9th graders that are interested in careers in healthcare. Ivan also has a history of volunteering at the Corning Museum of Glass; first helping the education department during holiday and summer events, then later serving on the Teen Leadership Council to plan events, mentor younger museum volunteers, and participate in behind-the-scenes museum activities.



Last summer Ivan volunteered at the DC Veteran's Administration through the Howard University Center of Excellence College of Pharmacy Summer Enrichment Academy. There he helped the pharmacist with inventory supply and restocking shelves. He also had the opportunity to spend time with the veterans.

Ivan also volunteerd at the Wineglass Marathon in 2015 and 2016, handing out food in the Food Tent. Additionally, every year for the last four years Ivan has rang the Salvation Army bell outside of Tony R's on behalf of the Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity.

In 2016, Ivan volunteered through Habitat for Humanity to help freshen up the grounds at 171 Cedar Arts Center by laying down mulch, planting flowers, and decorating the outside. Lastly, over the past three years, Ivan has leveraged his varsity basketball experience and refereed for the Corning Junior Hawks Youth Basketball League, with players ranging in age from five to 12.



Ivan introduced his parents Krystal and Ivan, and told Rotarians of his plans to attend Xavier University of Louisianna to pursue a degree in Pharmacy. After he graduates he plans to work in the DC area or New Orleans area VA. He also shared that this summer he was a Pharmacy Camp where he and his friends talked about building or starting a pharmacy chain in Africa, so he plans to earn an MBA to help with that goal. He also thanked the Rotary Club for awarding him this scholarship which will lessen the financial burden of attending college.

Last but not least, **Gerry** introduced scholarship recipient Jason Drapikowski. Jason volunteered at the Big Flats Food Pantry for four years, including participating in their fall food drive, placing plastic bags on doors of houses one week and then collecting the bags with food donations the following week. He also sorts the food and places it in bags for storage.



Jason has participated in the Big Flats Kids with Cancer Fun Run Day, with proceeds going toward research and to the families of children with cancer.

For the past five years, Jason has participated in St. Mary Our Mother Parish 's food and christmas presents drive for families who cannot afford christmas meals or presents, packing and distributing the food and gifts.

On Memorial Day and Veterans Day he volunteers placing flags on graves of service men. He also rings the bell for Salvation Army.

Jason describes his Eagle Scout project as one of his "largest acts of community service." In spite of roadblocks, he finaced, built, and erected two Osprey nesting poles on the Chemung River over the span of three years. He conducted fundraisers with assistance from the Chemung River Friends and contributed his own funds. The completed project cost a total of \$3,000. He obtained the necessary permits, plans, and nesting poles. He helped with building the necessary platforms for the offspring, and he had to working with municipalities to install both the poles and platforms. Jason introduced his folks Dave and Patty and shared his plans to attend Rensselaar Polytechnic Institute in the fall to study engineering. He also thanked Rotary for helping him pursue higher education with this scholarship.

LOG CABIN PROGRAM

Dave Anderson introduced Leon Golder, the President of the Corining-Painted Post Historical Society. Leon is from central PA near Danville. He spent a career at Ingersol Rand in engineering. He and his wife live in a home they restored on River Road two or three doors down from the American Legion. He's also a trombone player who played with a New York City jazz band and the Hep Cats. Thhis year, he was a nominee for the Jeffersonian Award.



Leon updated Rotarians on the the Wixon Road Log Cabin restoration project we helped to complete in 2017 with a District Simplified Grant led by then-President, now-Mayor **Bill Boland**. The Cabin is located at the former Patterson Inn on Pulteney Street, which recently changed names to the Heritage Village of the Southern Finger Lakes.



The project consisted mainly of restoring the logs and chinking, but first they had to remove the bugs! The Cabin was covered for two days. They had to keep watch over it around the clock as the gas used to kill the

bugs was lethal. Then they chipped out the old mortar, used preservatives on the logs, epoxied cracks in the logs, installed mesh, and used Carlisle Mountain sandstone to create the new chincking, which was dyed to match the original.



When all was said and done, Leon showed a picture with **President Ted** taking all the credit for the project while **King William** and **Dave Anderson** applauded him for no apparent reason!
