Finally, **King William** reported that **David Rowe's** wife Joan, has cancer and recently suffered a stroke. The members expressed their condolences for all the sad events. Turning from the sad news, **Kelly Copp** reported that there was a good turnout for the cleanup at the Veteran's Park in Corning; and she thanked individually each member who had shown up.

Paula Smith reported that the STEPS Walk to End Poverty will be an entertaining event all day in Corning on May 20, 2017; and she invited all to come and participate. She said the event has already raised \$1,454, as of the breakfast meal.

Dick Puccio reported on the success of the *House With a Heart* project in Nepal. He said Rotary is currently trying to raise \$63,000 for improvements to the school.

PROGRAM

The Program of the breakfast meeting was two member bios: one by **Deb Joseph** and one by **Dr. Bob Cole**.

Deb Joseph is well known and regarded as an employee of the CPP School District, and she is the current co-chairman (along with **Dick Pope**) of the Rotary Spelling Bee Committee. Deb said she is currently working on a novel concerning her parents' lives. Deb proceeded to describe her parents' journey through a life of overwhelming poverty and discrimination, and their ultimate triumph in raising a family of 8 children, all of whom attended college. In Deb's case, the colleges attended included St. Lawrence University, Carnegie Mellon, and Columbia University.

Deb attributed much of her success and that of her siblings to values and habits which she acquired at Catholic elementary schools



in Brooklyn, New York. **Deb's** story is inspirational; and I hope she soon finishes her novel.

Dr. Bob Cole traced his educational, professional and community life from a starting point near the then- North Side High School in Corning, to the University of Michigan; to Cincinnati Medical School; to



the Army; to Vietnam, to Fairbanks, Alaska; and eventually back to Corning, New York. Along the way he met and worked with (among others) **Jim Hudson, Hari Sharma**, Dr. Douglas McCain, Tony Cooper,

Fred Farley, John Ullman, and Sylvia Huber. There was an interesting story about each person and each place. **Bob** had favorable comments about Sylvia Huber, with whom he worked while president of the CPP School District. He described her as a hard-working and dedicated advocate for students and their parents, who could debate forcefully before the School Board and afterwards deal with her opponents on a friendly basis. Our community has benefited in many ways from **Bob's** work.
