PROGRAM

Elijah Baity was then invited to the microphone by **President Ted** to introduce **Steve Hughes. Steve** is the current President and Chief Executive Officer at United Way of the Southern Tier. He previously worked at Catholic Charities and was the Mayor of Elmira. In 2007 **Steve** joined the United Way.

Steve's discussion, "Collaborating for Community Impact," began with a big thankyou to all the veterans for their service. The "old" United Way was great at fundraising **Steve** said, but the new United Way is so much more than that. The goals are to look at complex problems and basic needs and use positive energy to solve them. This mission also embraces including the community in every step, and better communication to fully inform the public of their programing. The organization has improved both investments and goals and it had led to better outcome.



A large percentage of time and energy, as well as \$2.3 million dollars, is spent on children's educational needs. Children that are not reading at grade level by the end of third grade are four times more likely to drop out of high school, and current data shows that in Chemung and Steuben counties 4 out of 10 children are not on par. This is a sad truth that translates to a 13% and 5.2% dropout rate, respectively.



The better a community's early childhood development, the more educated its workforce, translating to higher economic development for the region. The United Way's Kids on Track initiative strives to ensure that by age 8 children are reading at grade level. **Steve** referred to data that illustrates the most critical brain development occurs between birth and age 3; so this is the most important time for young minds to grow and learn, especially by soaking up language.



Steve then shared a personal story of how the United Way has impacted his life for the better. In 2015 his grandson Christopher was born. His daughter was going to be a single mother and he urged her to take advantage of all the wonderful programs and resources the United Way provides. She did, so even before his birth Christopher's mom was signing, talking and reading to him. Now a toddler, Christopher loves to dance and read, and he looks forward to the United Way nurse's regular home visits. **Steve** sees his daughter as living, breathing proof that the United Way's programs work. Steve is enormously proud of his daughter. In a bow to a mission that is close to our club's heart, **Steve** reminded us "access to books is key" for better literacy.

United Way of the Southern Tier has recently

begun an association with Dolly Parton's Imagination Library. The program, which is not currently available in our area, will soon launch to the public. With some additional partners, the United Way is happy to fund the program's monthly gift of a book to children ages birth to 5.

In closing, he stated, "We know how to solve the problem, and we invite you to join us on the way."
