Using the most recent example of post-Election comments, through Social Media, she went on to prove her point in saying how negative comments can be very harmful. Alicia stated that if people were to think before they spoke, and if they tried to follow the guidelines of the Four-Way Test, it would lead to much kinder, more positive communication between us all.

Claire told us how last Summer, she attended the Youth Leadership Camp. She had participated in two different presentations. One left her feeling a bit bad, while the other made her feel inspired. She said the difference was in the way the presenters communicated with the participants. This personal example led
