As mentioned earlier, District Secretary Karen Parkhurst, was the program presenter today. She captured our attention by prefacing her talk with a quote from Margaret Mead: "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world...indeed, it's the only thing that ever has!" Through the use of slides to accompany her talk, Karen helped to raise our awareness of things Rotary can do to help: much in the same way as we have in the past, in donating solar ovens to the people of Nicaragua. This country, which Karen has visited previously, is second to Haiti in terms of impoverishment, yet the people are so appreciative of what Rotary has done for them. As stated in the handout that Karen gave us, potable water is a scarcity in the villages of Nicaragua. The Water Project would provide a pump, chlorinator, tank, and distribution piping to the targeted village, thus helping to ensure a safer water supply for its residents. A considerable amount of funding is required to complete this project, and Karen is hoping that the Naples Rotary can once again participate! Many thanks, Karen, for making us aware of this great need! Here's hoping, once again, that we can be an instrument of change!


