On April 21st the Rochester Latino Rotary Club celebrated its 9th anniversary at the Diplomat Banquet Center. Over 125 persons attended the Masquerade Ball enjoying a nice meal, music, dance, and the raffle of many items and services. There was also a 50/50 raffles with the proceeds going to the Polio Plus Campaign of the Rotary Foundation.

The proceeds from the event go to the Foundation of the Rochester Latino Rotary Club that allows the club to fund service projects locally and abroad.

Although membership in the club is not limited to Latinos, the main beneficiaries of the service projects are Latinos. This is a population that is generally underserved by the programs and projects geared to the general population.

Elisa and Abdiel DeJesús attended the Masquerade ball celebrating nine years of service to the community by the Rochester Latino Rotary club. This event is the main fundraiser of the club, and it helps fund the many projects the club undertakes during the year. By focusing on literacy, the club helps children from kindergarten to high school and beyond.

Scholarships for college-bound Latino students

Once more the club is joining the Ibero American Action League in its efforts to provide scholarships to college-bound Latino students. As is customary, the club will offer two \$500 scholarships to two students chosen by the Ibero's Scholarship Committee. As specified by the club's selection criteria, students chosen must have shown the characteristics embodied by Rotary's theme of Service Above Self. One of the scholarships targets specifically a student who has shown involvement in educational activities such as helping other students who are struggling in school, promoting literacy, serving as tutors, etc.

The scholarships will be presented at Ibero's gala in June. As in past years, the club has obtained funds from the Rotary District 7120 through the simplified grant program. This is a matching fund that allows clubs to fund several projects to meet their communities' needs.

Grant proposal to bring clean water to Puerto Rico

As is known by almost everyone given the coverage by the media, Puerto Rico suffered a great tragedy by the two hurricanes that hit the island in September. The infrastructure basically collapse when the whole island lost power and access to clean water. The recovery has been very slow, particularly in the small towns and those located far from the San Juan metropolitan area.

To help alleviate the situation, the Rochester Latino rotary Club initiated a Relief Fund for Puerto Rico. The Greece Rotary Club became interested in developing a global grant proposal to be submitted to the Rotary Foundation. The first step was to find a Rotary club on the island that would conduct a needs assessment and provide us with ideas for a service project that could qualify for a global grant.

The San Juan Rotary Club was identified and contacted by us. They agreed to conduct the needs assessment. As a result, they suggested a water project to serve two communities located in the town of Adjuntas. There are many steps involved in carrying out the project. There has to be identification of a contractor to dig and/or improve wells, identification of qualified people to monitor the progress and insure the maintenance of the wells once these are finished. Besides, a budget must be developed with accurate figures for each part of the project: digging, materials, equipment, and so on.

Before submitting the grant proposal to the Rotary Foundation, District 7120 must approve the same. The clubs estimate they will need financial support from both the San Juan and our district. It is anticipated that other clubs in District 7120 would like to contribute to the matching funds that must be raised in order to get a global grant from the Rotary Foundation. It is estimated that the total project will amount to \$100,000.00.

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Rotaract Outstanding Project Award Finalists

Rotaract clubs are creating sustainable, positive change in lives and communities around the world. This year, 470 projects were nominated in 59 countries for the Rotaract Outstanding Project Awards. Rotary recognizes the best local or international service projects that highlight innovation, sustainability, and collaboration aligned with <u>Rotary's areas of focus</u>.

The 2018 Rotaract Outstanding Project Award recognized the <u>Rotaract Club of Edulink International Campus</u>, Western Province, Sri Lanka, for a project that teaches entrepreneurial skills to women with HIV to empower them to earn a living.

The club created the Dream Store online platform, where the women can sell products they make and have their earnings go straight to their bank accounts. After meeting with the women to assess their abilities, the club partnered with local experts and Rotarians to expand the women's skills or teach them new ones. The women also received training in basic business and personal finance.

The club arranged with several leading companies, including the largest gift shop in Sri Lanka, to carry the women's products to ensure they had a customer base. The club hopes it can remove some of the stigma around HIV and AIDS by allowing the women to showcase their talents, giving people a way to support them through commerce, and holding events aimed at educating the public about the disease. "Before, these women were unemployed, because nobody would provide them jobs," says Nipun Peiris, past president of the club. "They had no choice but to beg on the street."
