Those students who occupy the first three positions in the final run of the event have the opportunity to earn one of the scholarships offered by area colleges and universities.

We have seen how students preparing for the contest develop from shy ones to being able to speak in front of an audience. They develop self confidence and poise.

In addition, when members, clubs, districts contribute to TRF; funds come back to the districts which allow clubs to obtain grants from the district for a myriad of projects to help the local communities. Besides, clubs join forces to submit global grant proposals to TRF to fund larger projects. The RLRC has received numerous grants to fund local and international projects. So, this November 27, open your wallets and give to this worthy organization!
