Rotary Club supports charter school

The Eugenio María de Hostos Charter School is the oldest charter school in Rochester. It has been very successful in its dual language teaching model. Both English and Spanish speaking children receive instruction in both languages. The students fair very well in the state tests. Their scores in both English Language Arts and Mathematics surpassed those of the schools in the Rochester City School District. The students are selected by lottery from applicants. The school offers an extended school day. Parental involvement is encouraged. The school has partnerships with community organizations such as the Maplewood YMCA and the Rochester Latino Rotary Club.

Over the years the club has provided bilingual dictionaries to fourth grade students as well as books to kindergarten students. Tutoring and reading buddies have been provided as well.

Recently, the school acquired the former School No. 22 vacant building in order to expand its offerings to the twelfth grade.

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In order to prepare the school to welcome the students in September, members of the RLRC spent some time cleaning the grounds around the school. This was a fun project that required no money, just the good will of the club members who gave a few hours of their weekend to pull weeds and removed garbage.

Maycanitza Pérez, executive director of the school, joined the club members in the cleaning project. The school has been approved to offer classes from kindergarten to high school.

Starting in September, the school will have two campuses, the new one on Zimbrich Street and the one on Joseph Avenue.

The club anticipates that it will continue supporting the school as this falls within the club's focus on literacy. It is no secret that Latino students drop out of school in alarming numbers. Any effort to increase the graduation rate among Latinos is favored by the club.

Plans for future service projects

Aida Veras and Charol Ríos-Davis, co-chairs of the Service Projects Committee, are eagerly planning future events to be sponsored by the club. Among these, the Mind, Body, and Soul event that is part of the Parent Academy at the Eugenio María de Hostos Charter School. It will be offered in October at the Zimbrich campus of the school.

On September 7th club members together with community leaders will be on hand to welcome students to both the Zimbrich and Joseph campus of the EMHCS.

The Foundation of the RLRC will have its traditional Thanksgiving service project; the details will be forthcoming soon.

A garage sale will be held at the Rochester Public Market to benefit the Polio Plus campaign.

Focus on Rotary



Sam Owori is selected to be 2018-19 Rotary President. He will be declared the president-nominee on 1 October if no challenging candidates have been suggested. Owori says he sees in Rotary "an incredible passion to make a difference." As president, he plans to "harness that enthusiasm and pride so that every project becomes the engine of peace and prosperity."

Owori's chief concerns as a Rotary leader are membership and extension. Since he served as district governor, the number of clubs in Uganda has swelled from nine to 89. He urges past, present, and future leaders to work together to engage more women, youth program participants, alumni, and community members to increase Rotary's membership in the coming years.

Owori is chief executive officer of the Institute of Corporate Governance of Uganda. Before that, he was executive director of the African Development Bank, managing director of Uganda Commercial Bank Ltd., and director of Uganda Development Bank. He has studied law, employment relations, business management, corporate resources management, microfinance, and marketing at institutions in England, Japan, Switzerland, Tanzania, and the United States, including Harvard Business School.

Since becoming a member in 1978, Owori has served Rotary as regional Rotary Foundation coordinator, regional RI membership coordinator, RI Representative to the United Nations Environment Program and UN-Habitat, and RI director. He has been a member or chair of several committees, including the International PolioPlus Committee, the Drug Abuse Prevention Task Force, and the Audit Committee. Most recently, Owori served as trustee of The Rotary Foundation, chair of The Rotary Foundation's Finance Committee, and a member of the Investment Committee. Owori is a Benefactor of The Rotary Foundation, and he and his wife, Norah, are Major Donors and Paul Harris Fellows.

Sergeant-At-Arms - To rotate among directors

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

- 1. The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;
- 2. High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;
- 3. The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;
- 4. The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

Rotarian Code of Conduct

The following code of conduct has been adopted for the use of Rotarians. As a Rotarian, I will

- 1. Act with integrity and high ethical standards in my personal and professional life
- 2. Deal fairly with others and treat them and their occupations with respect
- 3. Use my professional skills through Rotary to: mentor young people, help those with special needs, and improve people's quality of life in my community and in the world
- 4. Avoid behavior that reflects adversely on Rotary or other Rotarians.
