CONNECTING ROTARY AND THE COMMUNITY

The Ibero American Action League is a human services agency serving primarily the Latino community. One of the programs in the Family Service unit is the prevention of child abuse and neglect. The population served, for the most part, is comprised of individuals with very low income.

For the second year, the Rochester Latino Rotary Club has provided toys to the children during the celebration of the Three Kings Day. This is a traditional celebration among Latinos. The club has established collaboration with the Toys for Tots program of the US Marines. This collaboration dates to the beginning of the club's existence.

In the past, children at the Ibero´s Child Care Center and at Alternative for Battered Women have been recipients of the toys. This year, 73 children at the Ibero American Action League benefited from the project. The case managers delivered the toys and attest to the joy experienced by the children, who otherwise will not have toys.

Profound poverty in Bolivia amplifies barriers to care and limits the resources available for providing medical services. Severe health problems combined with poverty make the challenges even greater for children and their families.

Mackensie was impressed with the internationality of Rotary. She finds our mission beautifully aligned to the mission of her foundation, well organized, and a network supporting each other's work. She looks forward to working in support of the club's service projects. It is felt that Mackensie will bring lots of positive energy to the club.



Focus on Rotary

CALL TO "BE A GIFT TO THE WORLD"

Using their talents, expertise, and leadership, Rotary members worldwide are asked to be gifts to the world this upcoming 2015-16 Rotary year.

Rotary International President-elect K.R. "Ravi" Ravindran called Sunday's address to incoming district governors the "most significant moment of my life."

"All of you have been given so many gifts. And you have now been given this great gift: one year to take all your talents, all your gifts, everything that you are and can become -- and Be a Gift to the World," said Ravindran, revealing his presidential theme at the annual five-day training meeting in San Diego, California, USA. "You have one year to take that potential and turn it into reality. One year to lead the clubs in your district and transform the lives of others. The time is so short, yet there is so much to be done."

Highlighting Rotary's biggest challenge, the eradication of polio, Ravindran said, "A future without polio is a gift that we have promised to the children of the world. And indeed it is a gift that we will give."

Ravindran, a member of the Rotary Club of Colombo, Sri Lanka, used Rotary's successes in the fight to eradicate the disease as an illustration of the impact Rotary members can have in the world. When Rotary set a goal of eradicating polio 25 years ago, it was endemic in 125 countries, and more than 1,000 children were becoming paralyzed each day. Today, polio remains endemic in just three countries, Afghanistan, Nigeria, and Pakistan. And in all of 2014, only 333 cases were reported. "We will battle on. We will prevail," he said. Ravindran discussed some of Rotary's other challenges, including membership.

"We have to find a way to bring back the fundamentals that built our organization: the emphasis on high ethical standards in all aspects of our lives, and the classification system that encourages a diversity of expertise in each club," he said. "Too often these ideas are viewed as little more than inconvenient obstacles to increasing our membership. But they have been essential to Rotary's success, and we ignore them at our own peril."

Ravindran told attendees that the focus on branding is essential to helping Rotary grow. "We need to reposition our image, which we recognize has faded in many parts of the world," he said. Rotary also needs to continue to raise funds for The Rotary Foundation, attract new members, and encourage greater participation from current members, he added."There are no easy answers to any of these questions. And yet the answers must somehow be found. We are the ones who must find them," said Ravindran.

The president-elect closed his speech emphasizing that now is the time to make real change."You have one year to build monuments that will endure forever, not carved in granite or marble, but in the lives and hearts of generations. This is our time. It will not come again. Let us grasp it," he said.

DGE Miguelina Acosta

Miguelina is from the Dominican Republic. She is a member of the Rotary Club Santo Domingo Bella Vista, District 4060. She is a graduate of the School Of Interior Design, in San Juan, Puerto Rico. She obtained a diploma as Bookkeeper from the Instituto Comercial J.P. Duarte, in Moca, D.R. and a diploma in Communication and Conflict Resolution from the Pontificia Universidad Católica Madre y Maestra (PUCMM).

Besides working as an interior designer, she was the owner of a restaurant in Puerto Rico, and published a cookbook on cooking with microwave. She also ran a printing business. Her husband is a lawyer, and both have been Rotarians for many years. Their club has many projects in the Dominican Republic. Her presentation in PowerPoint is attached to this newsletter. It shows many aspects of her country as well as Rotary work in the Dominican Republic.

Dr. Javier Ayala

Dr. Javier Ayala currently serves as the Dean of Career and Technical Education at Monroe Community College.

He served as Vice President of Instruction at Umpqua Community College in Oregon where he was the chief academic officer and accreditation liaison. Prior to becoming Vice President, he was the Dean of Curriculum and Instruction.

He serves on a multitude of education advisory boards, and can be heard speaking to the public on media topics ranging from cyber security to Latino student success.

Dr. Ayala holds a bachelor of arts in politics – from Willamette University in Oregon and a master of arts in leadership – from the University of Oregon at Eugene. He has a PhD in Education from Oregon State University.

A native of Ecuador, he was the first one in his family to attend college. He attributes his success to the influence of a caring teacher who saw his potential and encouraged him to pursue higher education.

During his talk at the club, Dr. Ayala highlighted the obstacles phased by Latino students when attempting to obtain a post secondary education. He said the careers that can be pursued in the community colleges are marketable. Students who graduate do not incur in the debts that usually accompany those who graduate from traditional universities.

He emphasized the need of role models who look and talk like Latinos.
