The Year That Was

The Rotary year 2011-12 was an eventful one for the club. Under the able leadership of President Diana, several changes were made to the structure and focus of the club. A renewed emphasis on membership recruitment and retention; specific guidelines for interviewing and recommending potential members, and interesting programs are but some of the efforts to streamline the club's operations.

The development of the latinorotary.com by Abe Hernández has improved considerably the club's communication with its members and the community at large. It is very easy to find the events taking place at the club and district levels. Maps and directions to the sites are very helpful, and everyone has access to La Rotariana, the club's newsletter.

Six new members joined the club, as follows: Peterson Vázquez, Mildred Vázquez, Myrna Ortiz, Petrita Alicea-Cipolla, José Cipolla, and Fernando Santiago were warmly welcomed to the Rotary family.

The local and international activities ranged from those supporting literacy to those related to a farm in the Dominican Republic and a hospital in Minatitlán, Mexico.

Thanks to the matching funds provided by the Ro-

tary Foundation and District 7120, as well as District 4190 in the state of Veracruz, Mexico, the club was able to generate enough funds to equip the kitchen, classrooms, and shops at the Centro de Integración Social that serves 250 indigenous children ages 6 to 12 per school year. Among the equipment purchased there are computers, woodworking saws, sewing machines, refrigerators, washing machine, water coolers, ceiling fans, a stove, and blackboards. The Tuxtepec-Cuenca Rotary Club was the partner in this project.

Community Needs Are Addressed

The Ibero American Action League is a notfor-profit agency that provides multiple social services to the Latino and larger community in Rochester. There exists a very close relationship between this agency and the RCRL. Among the projects carried out to benefit the agency's clientele were stocking the community food pantry, providing toys to over 100 children at the Daycare Center as well as reading materials for the Pre-K children and their parents.

The fourth graders

at the Eugenio María de Hostos Charter Schools received bilingual dictionaries to help them in this school that provides dual language instruction. Club members also read to kindergarten students.

Young Latino Students

The RCRL is very proud of the accomplishments of our young Latino students. They have participated and reached the finalist group at the District Oratorical Contest, attended a RYLA conference in Puerto Rico, and participated at the Young Entrepreneurs Academy at the University of Rochester. In addition, two

Leila Bocanegra has established her own company dedicated to planning parties for the Latino community such as weddings, quinceañeros, and many more events significant to this community.

We celebrate and congratulate the accomplishments of these young students who have demonstrated dedication to their studies and high ethical standards to guide their lives in times when many youths abandon school or engage in risky behaviors.

Guidelines/Expectations for Club Members

In order to make clear the expectations the club has for its members, the following guidelines were developed.

- 1. Attend at least to 50% of the Club weekly meetings.
- 2. Notify the Secretary regarding attendance to meetings in other clubs or to activities and projects hosted by the Club, District or Rotary International. This will count toward attendance to the Club meetings.
- 3. Participate in activities hosted by District 7120, such as: Assembly, Conference, President Elect Training, etc.
- 4. Support fundraising efforts to finance service projects, both local and internationally.
- Participate in activities and service projects hosted by the Club, such as: Literacy programs, support to collegebound Latino students, support to centers offering services to Latinos with developmental disabilities, those who lack food, etc.
- 6. Donate time, resources and talents to the furtherance of the mission of Rotary.
- Support the Rotary Foundation. It is expected that members donate at least \$100 per year to the Rotary Foundation.
- 8. Participate in the Club's leadership by assuming positions on the Board of Directors.
- 9. Actively participate in one or more of the club committees.
- 10. Familiarize self with the Rotary Organization and act as a spokesperson to let people know the contribution it makes to make this a better world.

Fundraising Activity Focuses on Healthy Living

A very active and committed group of members planned and executed the Dance to Health event at the Carlson Metro YMCA with Zumba lessons, chair yoga, and Silver Sneakers exercises. Health-related community providers offered pertinent information, taking blood pressures, and measuring glucose levels. It is well known that diabetes, cardiovascular diseases, and many other chronic conditions tied to poor eating habits and lack of exercises affect the Latino community disproportionately. By focusing on healthy living habits, the event hopes to have a positive effect on our community. Of course, the event was open to all regardless of ethnicity.

The evening event at the Diplomat Party House featured a dance performance by professional dancers who afterwards invited the public to participate in group lessons. There were appetizers, cash bar, and open dance to the rhythm of Latin music.

Both events were well attended and everyone had great fun while exercising and dancing. There was a request for a repeat performance in 2013!

Guidelines, continued

- 11. Pay the initial fee of \$15.00 and the annual fee \$110.00 or \$55.00 for six months at the time of the induction; if you choose to pay the fee in two installments, these must be made no later than June 1 and December 1 of each year. If unable to continue with your cub membership, it is your responsibility to notify the Club Treasurer of your intention to resign by May 15 or November 15.
- 12. Understand and practice the moral and ethical principles that characterize Rotary, including the theme of "Service Above Self".
- 13. Remember that "BEING A ROTARIAN IS NOT AN OBLIGATION, IT IS A PRIVILEGE"
- 14. Lack of compliance with the guidelines stated above may result in the suspension of your affiliation with Rotary.
