Rotarian honored by City of Rochester

Orlando Rivera, Rochester Latino Rotary Club president during the 2015-16 Rotary year was honored by the City of Rochester as a Distinguished Gentleman Role Model. Orlando is a real estate agent with Re/Max Realty Group. He is a 2016 and 2017 GRAR Sales Master Award Winner, and is the 2017 National Association of Hispanic Real Estate Professionals Award #36 Ranked Latino Agent in Northeastern Region.

Orlando has been involved with several community organizations over the years. At this time he is involved with the Rochester Latino Rotary Club as web master and chair of the marketing committee, and with La Cumbre – an advocacy group interested in getting Latinos involved in commerce, government, education, health, and arts and culture. July – get together to invite potential members.

August – Change over picnic. Delayed from July since several members were not available to attend in July. All past club presidents will be invited to take part of the event.

September – Distribution of dictionaries/ books for kids at Eugenio María de Hostos Charter School.

October – Fall planting at the community garden; donation of money for food to the House of Mercy.

November – Presentation to school children re polio; baskets for needed families; 50/50 fund raising for polio (to start in September).

December – Have someone come to club to talk about eating healthy and exercise; a Zumba event together with health-related presentations. This will be similar to event done at the EMHCS last year.

January – Have students follow professionals in fields of interest. Have a career day at a school and have professionals talk about their field. Make sure club members display 4-way test at their place of work.

February – Have a contest for school children to develop posters conveying how to promote peace among people of different backgrounds. Maybe also essays contest about their understanding of peace.

March – Have a speaker on water conservation measures in our homes. Book re water scarcity in other parts of the world will be read and given to students.

April – Sponsor an event where new mothers (and not so new) hear from healthcare professionals about child development, disease prevention, etc.

May – Excellent time to have projects that are youth-oriented such as a conference where different professionals can talk about higher education, importance of abstaining from drug/alcohol/cigarettes, mental/physical health.

June – Get together to promote membership, similar to the one held in July, 2017.

Books are also provided to kindergarten students to take home and also placed in a blue shelf located at a health clinic. Patients are encouraged to take books home. Because of the many literacy-related projects undertaken by the club, it has received recognition by the Rotary District 7120 every year since its inception. Miriam Vázquez and Julio Vázquez (they are siblings) have been the motor behind the projects. Congratulations!

3. Use my professional skills through Rotary to: mentor young people, help those with special needs, and improve people's quality of life in my community and in the world
4. Avoid behavior that reflects adversely on Rotary or other Rotarians.
