

Meeting; 10 January 2023

TONIGHTS MEETING Rtn IAN BURNET

Author and historian Ian Burnet,who is a member of Northbridge Rotary, was our Guest Speaker for a Zoom meeting in October 2021 on the subject of Joseph Banks' voyage on the Endeavour who, with Daniel Solander, became the first trained naturalists to describe the unique flora and fauna of continent Australia that had evolved during its 30 million years of isolation.

Tonight Ian will speak to us in person, unrestricted by technology, on another of his fascinating books on an earlier period fully titled as "The Tasman Map -The Biography of a Map - Abel Tasman, the Dutch East India Company and the first Dutch discoveries of Australia"

Every visitor who passes through the vestibule of the Mitchell Library stops to admire the magnificent marble mosaic of the Tasman Map which fills the entire vestibule floor.

Over a period of only forty years from 1606 to 1644 and based on sixteen separate discoveries the first map of Australia took shape. The Tasman Map shows a recognizable outline of the north, west and south coasts of Australia that was not to change for another 125 years until the British explorer James Cook charted the east coast in 1770.

In 1925 and 1933 the Mitchell Library in Sydney acquired both the Tasman Huydecoper Journal and the Tasman Bonaparte Map. The story of how the library managed to acquire these treasures of Dutch exploration and cartography will bring new recognition to these icons of both Dutch and Australian history.

lan Burnet grew up in South Gippsland, Victoria, Australia and graduated with a degree in Geology and Geophysics from the University of Melbourne.

He has spent thirty years, living, working and travelling in Indonesia and is fascinated by the diverse history and culture of the archipelago. This is reflected in his books "Spice Islands", followed by "East Indies", then "Archipelago - A Journey Across Indonesia", then "Where Australia Collides with Asia", then "The Tasman Map" and his latest book "Joseph Conrad's Eastern Voyages".

TREE OF JOY 2022



The tradition continues. A team consisting of members from the Rotary Club of Chatswood Roseville as well as Crows Nest met on several occasion to organise the final Rotary community project of the year. The Tree of Joy has a history of over 30 years.

Thirteen committed supporters placed Rotary trees in their premises to collect gifts for various charities. All benefactors, which includes Chatswood Chase, several local schools, Roseville Golf Club, medical practices, and community establishments reconfirmed their availability to be part of this year's Christmas charity program. One new supporter being Coles Local Chatswood at

Westfield allowed us to place a tree and gift receptacle cage at their store.

The official opening of the Christmas campaign took place at the Chatswood Chase at 11am on 10 December. The traditional carol singing was conducted by Noel Cislowski and was attended by the State Member for Willoughby Tim James MP, the Mayor of Willoughby City Tanya Taylor, some long time supporters of this community initiative, including some Rotary members. The tree at Chatswood Chase was continually attended by Rotarians, who generously gave 130 man hours of their time from 10 to 22 December.

As in previous years, Sheads Real Estate made an office available to us where we received and sorted all gifts from the various trees. From there donations were picked up by/or distributed to the beneficiaries. Rotarians delivered gifts to several nursing homes in the Chatswood and Lane Cove area. The beneficiaries included the Children's Ward Treasure Chest at the Royal North Shore Hospital, Phoenix House, Catholic Care, Streetwork, Youth off the Streets, to name a few.

The result was most rewarding, we received an estimated 3900 gifts, as well as gift cards to the value of nearly \$8,000 and cash donation valued \$3,700.

It was a satisfying result which was made possible by the support of the benefactors, the public and the commitment of the members who formed The Team consisting of Peter Lewis, Sue Rayeane, Peggy Yu, Michael

MacQuillan, Bruce Carfrae, Tony Basten and John Hartley.

It was an example of good teamwork.



REGIONALISATION PROJECT - UPDATE

After the Regionalisation Pilot vote in September, we announced that 90% of clubs voted yes to proceed with the pilot and 20 of 21 districts met the two thirds of clubs voting Yes threshold. The 21st district had a simple majority in favour but not the two thirds majority.

The results were reported to the Rotary International Board and it was approved that we proceed with 20 districts. We will continue to work with the last district during this period and give them the opportunity to have another vote at a later time.

The last several years have been focused on planning but fast forward to now and we are into the pilot implementation phase. Since we last communicated with Zone 8 members:

- 1. We established a task force to carry us in to the next phase. Past District Governor and Past Coordinator Tim Moore is the Implementation Task Force leader and his team is currently being resourced based on appropriate skills in responses to calls for volunteers.
- 2. We have held new information sessions where you heard from Co Chairs PDG Ingrid Waugh and PDG Peter Frueh on the progress made in the design and consultation of the Pilot.
- 3. We have documented our progress and mapped out a draft timeline.
- 4. We also plan to present the pilot cost estimate to the Rotary International Board in April 2023. The time frame has been extended to allow more extensive consultation on the implementation plan and associated costs that are being developed.

Throughout the new year you can expect regular communications and opportunities to get involved, so please keep a look out for emails from the team. 




