Guest Speaker - David Lipson

“ABC News and Current Affairs”

David's father, Dr Tony Lipson, was a charter Member of the Roseville Chase Rotary Club, who sadly suddenly passed away in April 1996.

David, is a broadcast journalist and news presenter of 21 years experience in Australian Television and 3 years in Australian Radio.

With Sky News Australia, he has been based in Washington DC, Sydney, Melbourne and Canberra - covering a wide range of news and major events. He has broad experience reporting, presenting and producing news and working in the field as a video journalist - shooting, editing and transmitting stories.



David has covered news events in Afghanistan, Mongolia, India, Vanuatu, Papua New Guinea, Cambodia, Malaysia, Hawaii, Washington DC, New York and all over Australia, including remote Arnhem Land.

He is currently the host of the “PM” current affairs program broadcast across the ABC network of radio stations. He is also occasional Foreign Correspondent having worked previously as ABC Bureau Chief in Washington and, prior to that post, as Bureau Chief in Jakarta.

His first story in Washington was on Trump's Impeachment. David reported on and, with his young family, experienced the Covid lockdown, the riots following the death of George Floyd and the Presidential election.

David served his time (*as did many from the Rotary families*) as a youngster working at John Hartley's Party Time Hire.

David's mother Anne has kept in touch with the Club. She was a guest at the 2023 Changeover, and will also be our guest at the meeting.

FROM THE PRESIDENT

“Rotaract Clubs bring together people ages 18 to 40 to exchange ideas with leaders in the community develop leadership, professional and business skills and have fun, fellowship and does good in the world whilst doing so”.

There are over 200,000 members in 189 countries. In some countries like India and Sri Lanka there is 1 Rotaract Club per 3.5 Rotary Clubs and 20 % of Rotaractors become Rotarians. Anyone under 40 can become a member of both a Rotaract Club and a Rotary Club. By the way, in those countries there is 1 Interact Club (*high school based*) per 2 Rotary Clubs.



In Australia there is 1 Rotaract Club per 12 to 15 Rotary Clubs and in our District 9685, there are only 15 Rotaractors. Unless we do something, they will cease to exist in our district in a couple of years.

We believe that the desire to form a Rotaract Club should come from the young professional community and not from our District or Our Rotary Club. Thus our club is leading the investigation to find out if the young business and professional community in the City of Willoughby wants a North Shore Rotaract Club which meets once a month on Sunday 12.00 noon to 2.00 p.m. with a focus on professional and business development plus fun, fellowship and doing good in the world.

Currently we are compiling a list of personal names and organisations we should contact to inquire the desirability of forming a local Rotaract club. We will do this slowly and methodically and should you have any suggestion or advice please contact me.

LAST MEETING - 26 SEPTEMBER

The guest speaker was Dr Meg Barnet. She is a post-doctoral fellow at the immunology laboratory at the Garvan Institute. She is also the clinical lead of the National Exceptional Responders program which is designed to work out why some people respond to immunotherapy (*stimulation of anti-cancer killer cells*) and others do not. She completed a PhD in immunology while on two scholarships and is now a senior lecturer at UNSW.

Her main clinical interest is in treating gastrointestinal and lung cancers, while her main research interest lies in conducting clinical trials designed to identify the best form of immunotherapy for a particular individual. Although chemotherapy combined with surgery is still the most widely used and effective method of treating tumours such as breast cancer, immunotherapy is yielding impressive results in chemo-resistant tumours including melanoma, some lung cancers, kidney cancer and childhood leukaemia. It is different to other types of treatment in that it can be quickly established whether it works or it does not. On the other hand, results have been disappointing to date in most colon cancers, pancreatic and prostate cancer.

She outlined the three different approaches that are being worked on in the many laboratories around the world which, between them, have led to cures in up to half of the patients who had previously failed to respond to conventional treatment with chemo or radiotherapy.
