

FROM YOUR PRESIDENT

During the last fortnight some of the activities of our club have reminded me of a duck floating on a lake. On the surface all is calm and serene but unseen under the water there is frantic activity to keep things moving and on course.

Because of recent changes in the revenue law in Timor-Leste it was necessary to enter into an up to date Memorandum of Agreement with the local Carmelite Sisters to clarify our mutual responsibilities to assist the program which, inter alia, provides dental care to remote and rural communities and supports dental workers with training and mentoring equipment and dental supplies. Many Australian dentists, and others, including the son of Andre Hariman, have, and continue to, provide their services on a pro bono basis to assist.

Sounds easy but the program has developed like Topsy over the years and although it works extremely well it required disciplined concentration and expertise to properly specify exactly what are the roles of all parties.

Peter Kindred supplied much information and Neil Howie demonstrated his remarkable legal drafting skills in producing the document which has now been signed by all parties and which, hopefully, satisfies the authorities in Timor-Leste.

Another frantic activity which has required many hours of discussion and involvement of several members of our club over recent weeks is whether or not our club can issue tax deductible receipts for some of the donations made to it. This was news to me because in my naivety I was under the impression that we were legally entitled to do so. [Should I amend my previous tax returns?] However, I now understand that this facility should only be given to organisations having the main purpose of a Public Benevolent Institution, otherwise many shonky operations would attempt to defraud the Australian Tax Office of revenue to which it is entitled.

I do not pretend to understand all of the ramifications of our club deciding whether or not we should proceed to register as a charity, especially as all of the correspondence I have read is heavily laced with acronyms, which I hate, including ATO, DGR, ACNC and PBI. [Heaven help the English language]. However, I sincerely thank those members of our club who have spent many hours grappling with the problem, and who continue to do so by face to face, zoom meetings, emails etc. That group includes Peggy Yu, David Williams, John Hartley, Peter Kindred, Neil Howie and Ross Symons. Neil Howie has once again brought his legal training to the discussions which are continuing. [Sorry if I have missed anyone].



No doubt further discussions at Board level and otherwise will result in recommendations which will be explained by others with more expertise than me.

However the calm movements of the duck were replaced by the dramatic waving of wings, and standing on the water, at the recent Bob Mudgan Primary School Public Speaking and Essay Competition held at the Killara Golf Club. As many of you have heard from me ad nauseum the ability to effectively communicate is one of the greatest abilities a person can have/develop. "The message sent is not always the one received". I am dismayed by the appalling "efforts" displayed by many of our so called "leaders", political, religous or otherwise to successfully explain what they are attempting to convey.

The amazing efforts of the eight contestants at our competition has confirmed my confidence in the youth of Australia and their ability to make a real contribution to the future of our country, [And the world.] with their power to effectively communicate their message. And they did it without the use of one acronym!

Further details of their remarkable performances are provided elsewhere in this copy of the Bulletin. I congratulate each and everyone of them and envy their ability to address a varied and unknown audience, partly consisting of foreboding "mature" people. I also thank their teachers and families that attended to give them support. [However I must admit my disappointment at the large number of club members who did not attend. Are we not interested in supporting the youth of our community?]

SUNKOSHI COMMUNITY DENTAL CLINIC IN NEPAL Report from Rotary Club of Northlakes Toukley

Hi all,

Global Grant Report

I felt so proud to visit the Sunkoshi Community Hospitals new Dental Clinic in Nepal. Northlakes Toukley Rotary was the international partner to the Rotary Club of Rudramati, Nepal, who implemented the grant.

This grant would not have been possible without the support of Peter Kindred and the Kedje Foundation who funded this project. Also to Supid Koirala for his dedicated hard work in researching and writing the grant proposal.

The community hospital had ceased dental operations for 6 months due to poor equipment. In this time they self-funded the construction of the dental and eye wing. (See photo).

The dental clinic is divided into three sections. Office/Admin with two dental bays. One has a monitor and the other no monitor. I can not tell you how impressive this set up is and all concerned should feel very proud.

Currently there is a team out working in the remote areas doing a dental camp, where they are implementing an oral hygiene workshop and carrying out dental procedures whilst promoting the clinic. Photos will arrive shortly.

Congratulations everyone as this clinic will service 1000's of persons in this remote region.



The hospital treats up to 50 patients a week and has 11 staff and refers serious cases to bigger hospitals a hundred KIs away. Due to the hilly terrain, bus and car accidents are of concern. Last week 30 patients were seriously injured in a bus crash.

There strategic plan is to build an ICU unit on site and therefore, they are looking for further support

There is also an urgent need for defibrillators

He said the first day he didn't see anything, the second day he didn't see anything but by the third day, some of the swelling had gone down and he could see a little out of his left eye, and his arm was healed enough that he could fix himself a sandwich and load the dishwasher.
