FROM YOUR PRESIDENT

What an amazing series of successes our club has achieved since I last wrote to you 2 weeks ago.

Rotary International has approved a Global Grant for the Golden Needle project which will assist poorly educated women in Turkey to obtain the necessary skills to gain employment and the resultant self confidence and independence.

This project was initiated by Ian Garrard. Ian led a Group Study Exchange group to Turkey in 2013 and became concerned with the plight of child brides and subsequently encouraged the former Roseville Chase Rotary club to raise money to help prevent that abuse.

About one year ago Ian was asked by a Turkish Rotary club to assist with the Golden Needle project and with the considerable help of Peter Kindred they arranged for personal donations by members of, and friends of, our club to raise US\$15,000 which was needed to trigger the program. As a result of assistance from District and Rotary International, more than US\$71,000 will be made available for this most meritorious scheme. [At the current exchange rates this will be much more than AUS\$110,000. An astonishing amount.]

And on Friday the 30th September, Peter Timmermann with the enthusiastic support of Andre Hariman and other members of our club, held an Oktoberfest function which raised over \$7,675 for the purchase of Shelter Boxes which will be used to assist people who have been displaced as a result of disasters, such as the war in Ukraine and the horrendous floods in Pakistan.

And on the following day Peter Lefmann, with the assistance of John Hartley and many members of our club, organised the most successful Bunnings Sausage Sizzle our club has ever held and raised more than \$2,630, plus further donations of \$158.00 for the purchase of Shelter Boxes. This result was aided by the donation of the sausages used on that day by Coles Local of Chatswood Westfield who have generously agreed to collaborate with us with some of our fund raising activities in the future. (Below is the text of my letter to Coles about this).

As many of you are aware I will tick off the item at the top of my Bucket List with a Round the World trip commencing on the 11th of October to meet up with some of the wonderful people I have made friends with during my life to date. Our Vice President, Tony Basten will continue to lead and update you with the successes and activities of our club during my unpaid sabbatical.

Good afternoon Trent

I am following up on our discussion on Tuesday with you, John Hartley and me about a collaboration between Coles Local at Chatswood and the Rotary Club of Chatswood Roseville.

As you are aware I have already discussed the matter with the Board of our club and they are very keen to progress an affiliation between both of our organisations to our mutual benefit.

As I understood the next move, I am to arrange for the preparation of an A3 poster for display near the front door of your store announcing our affiliation with the intention of publicising the connection of Coles Local Chatswood with Rotary. Although he is not a professional graphic artist, one of our members will draft the sign and I will submit it to you for your comments. If our club is arranging a special event for the benefit of the community we will discuss a larger poster. If necessary, we will engage a professional to assist.

One of the current major fund raising events of our club is organising sausage sizzles at Bunnings Chatswood. We, and other charities, are offered the opportunity to do so every 6 to 8 weeks. We serve a few hundred customers during a Saturday or Sunday and as you may know they create a considerable amount of good will for Rotary and any organisation that we are connected with.

Obviously the labour costs are non existent and our main/sole expenses are the sausages, bread, condiments and soft drinks. Our next appearance is on Saturday the 1st October. John and I discussed with you the possibility of Coles Local Chatswood providing the sausages without charge. We usually need in the vicinity of 700 thin sausages each time. There is no wastage as any sausages left over are deep frozen.

In return we would display a prominent A3 sign notifying the customers of your donation. If you find that the publicity is to your liking you may consider at some time in the future supplying other items e.g. bread or soft drinks. Obviously those donations would also be clearly publicised.

NEXT MEETING - 25 OCTOBER 2022 Ken HUTT - ASSAULT on EVEREST for END POLIO NOW

KEN HUTT – Australian adventurer and mountaineer

A thwarted attempt by Australian adventurer and mountaineer Ken Hutt to become the first person to legally paraglide off the top of Mount Everest to raise money for Rotary International's **End Polio Now** campaign has been placed on ice but his message went all the way to the top.

"In fact, seeing Ken reunited with his son at basecamp (below), and that he has achieved so

Ken developed a life-threatening chest infection at camp 2 (6400m). He had no choice but to descend. Once you get beyond camp 2, you cannot get medical aid or be rescued. It was heartbreaking because Ken had been working on securing the flying permit for more than three years, but it was the only decision he could make.

Although Ken didn't get to launch the paraglider from Mt Everest, his team (right) still managed to succeed with their goal. Three other Brazilian climbers in his team made it to the summit and carried **the End Polio Now** banner with them.

Filmmaker Joe Carter, who accompanied Ken and was producing a documentary *Fly from Everest* said, "to have a storyline now where Ken was forced to retreat from the mountain without achieving the summit or the paragliding flight is not necessarily a sad ending"


GOLDEN NEEDLE PROJECT - UPDATE

I wish I could be with you all this evening to share your annual Oktoberfest and sample the pure, cold German beer, hot currywurst and spicy sauerkraut. Instead, I'll be toasting you with room temperature Cornish ale and munching on a pasty.

I have enjoyed the warm hospitality of the Rotary Club of Chatswood Roseville on several occasions, through international dinners and special club nights. ShelterBox has enjoyed the solid and generous support of the club over the years, through members like Dieter Torheiden, Michael McQuillan and Peter Timmerman. I was privileged to be able to award the club with their Diamond Lifetime Giving Award, several years ago, in recognition of donating more than \$50,000 to ShelterBox. UPDATE MESSAGES FROM TONY BASTEN COVID 19 and POLIO

AN UPDATE ON COVID-19 AND POLIO

COVID-19.

Is the infection about to go away? It has been downgraded from a pandemic to an epidemic, but it is not about to disappear; on the contrary the causative virus, SARS-Cov2 has become endemic in many parts of the world including Australia. Moreover, reservoirs remain in immune compromised humans and animals (eg white tailed deer in Canada and minks).

When will the next vaccine resistant variant emerge? We don't know although the current Omicron family of variants, by virtue of their high transmissibility may have been outcompeting other variants as they arise. This could explain why no serious new variants have been reported in the past few months.

When will herd immunity be achieved? It may not due to ongoing emergence of new variants in which case COVID will become a seasonal infection like the flu. In that case an annual booster covering new variants will be routine as it currently is for the flu.

The winter in the northern hemisphere is likely to herald an increase in case numbers. By the time of our next winter, however, updated versions of the mRNA (Pfizer and Moderna) and protein-based (Novavax) vaccines will be available here. These together with the anti-viral drugs already available should keep serious infections at bay and further reduce the death rates except in the unvaccinated and those with poor immune systems (eg the elderly in aged care facilities).

POLIO.

Are we losing the battle against polio now that cases are being reported in New York, London and further afield? No, I don't think so since the recent cases have been due to infection with the 'vaccine-derived polio virus' (VDPV). VDPV is a strain derived from the weakened (attenuated) live polio virus contained in the oral versions of the vaccine still used particularly in developing countries. However, should it circulate in unimmunised populations or in immune deficient individuals for long enough, VDPV may revert to a form capable of causing clinical disease including paralysis as happened in the case of the recent New York patient.

This does, however, raise the question of how did patients acquire VDPV in countries like the USA and UK* where the live oral (Sabin) vaccine was replaced



over two decades ago with an injectable non-replicating inert vaccine. What has been shown is that they 'caught' the VDPV from someone who had previously received the live vaccine in another country before travelling to the USA (and UK).

Given the practical value of using an oral vaccine in developing country settings, WHO has been sponsoring the replacement of the current oral vaccine (called mOPV2) with a genetically more stable version (nOPV2) in order to reduce the incidence of VDPV infections.

Ongoing regular testing of sewage for the presence of VDPV is needed to determine the extent of the risk of infection from it in developed as well as developing countries. But above all, it remains essential to vaccinate the entire population of the world which remains a problem in countries like the USA where the anti-vaxx lobby has gained momentum during the COVID-19 pandemic.

ZONE 8 REGIONALISATION PROJECT VOTING RESULT

Co-Chairs Regionalisation Group Zone 8, have advised of the outcome of the voting on the Zone 8 Regionalisation Project as set out below.

"We were delighted with the result with more than 89% of clubs across the zone expressing a YES vote. This lets us know that there is strong support for a pilot which will enable us to trial, explore, design and evaluate a new regional approach to supporting and governing Rotary and Rotaract clubs in Australia, New Zealand and Pacific Island region.

We are pleased to advise that 20 out of 21 Districts achieved the required threshold of two thirds majority of clubs voting Yes. The club vote was also endorsed by all 21 District Governors in their role as Rotary International Officers. Whilst one district had more than 50% of clubs vote yes, it did not meet the two thirds threshold.

At this point in time, we will advise the Rotary International Board of the outcome as well as seek guidance on the path forward. Thank you for your patience and we will be in touch once we have a clear course of action.

We would like to thank all Rotary and Rotaract volunteers who have supported this project. We would also like to thank the Rotary International staff at our Sydney office and elsewhere for their ongoing support."
