FROM YOUR PRESIDENT

I have suggested in the last 2 editions of the Bulletin that the Rotary Club of Chatswood Roseville forms some type of liaison with the Yeoval Central School in central NSW which has approximately 100 students from kindergarten to year 12. Its indigenous population is around 30%. The students come from a relatively low socio-economic background which sometimes impacts their educational opportunities. Yeoval has a population of under 300.



At our last meeting Warren McGurgan of the Rotary Club of Belrose told us of how his club has, for the past 26 years, been giving support and assistance to the students of the Peak Hill Central School, which is about 40 Kms from Yeoval as the crow flies.

I recently drove to Yeoval and on Tuesday the 30th of May met with Trish Henderson, the Principal, and Helen Tremain, the Secondary Head Teacher, and we had initial discussions as to whether, and if so how, our club can work in with them and the school to assist the students.

Our meeting was not overly extensive nor detailed as they had to fit me in with their classes but they expressed interest in our hosting an excursion to Sydney early next year by about 15 members of Years 9 and 10, together with 2 or 3 staff members. About 4 days and 3 nights. There is no train service from Yeoval and the once per day train from nearby Wellington arrives in Sydney at an inconvenient time so they will catch a bus to Lithgow and a train to Sydney then stay at a hostel close to Central.

They would appreciate us showing them various aspects of Sydney. "An Urban Challenge". Some random suggestions were the Jewish Museum, a football match, Luna Park, an art gallery and a walk over the Harbour Bridge. No need to hire a bus as they should experience 'the joys of public transport'.

From previous experience the cost is in the vicinity of \$500 each student for a 3 day trip but I do not know how that is made up. They receive a subsidy of \$220 but I do not know where that comes from. Somehow they manage to raise the additional money. "No child misses out!" Obviously our club will subsidise their expenses and entertainment but the nature and extent of same will have to be clarified closer to the day.

During my visit to the school I attended 2 'class rooms' which were small rooms



occupied by one and two students respectively, a table and chairs, and a monitor. They were being taught on a subject for the Higher School Certificate not otherwise taught at their school, by a teacher who is located in a distant location, to students who may be spread over many thousands of square kilometers. That is normal education in many Australian country towns, similar to the Alice Springs School of the Air. Such are the difficulties faced by our bush students and their amazing teachers.

I have subsequently written to Trish and Helen and asked for their further suggestions on an interaction between our club and their school between now and the end of this year.

A visit to Yeoval to mentor students in Years 11 and 12 as to future career opportunities, as done in Peak Hill by Belrose club members? Provision of books, new or used, to the students or the school library? Naturally I would like to keep up the momentum and I hope you will support me.

I will mention this matter at our Board and Club meetings on the 13th of June and ask for approval and support for my ongoing discussions with the Yeoval Central School. There will be a cost to our club but the extent of same will depend on what assistance we are asked to give. If you have experience or suggestions on how we can help in the coming 6 months please discuss with me, Andre Hariman our President-elect or Phil Dunbar, our incoming Community Service Director.

The Rotary club of Chatswood Roseville is the only Rotary Cub in Australia to receive this award.

ShelterBox has been supported by the Rotary Club of Chatswood since 2004 constantly making contributions towards this good cause, resulting in winning Gold Awards for the past 5 years.

It recognises the NSW general community and is about commitment, dedication, perseverance, and proactivity in improving the lives of others.

The Awards are divided into three categories: Urban, Rural and Health. These are further divided into:

- 1. Young Inspirational Woman of the Year 18-30 years of age
- 2. Inspirational Woman of the Year 30+ years of age
- 3. Inspirational Health Worker 18-30 years of age and 30+ years of age
- 4. A total of 24 finalists will be recognised.

Everyone knows at least one woman, irrespective of age and vocation, who excels by volunteering quietly, giving of her time to make a real difference to the lives of others.

These women inspire others and are real role models.

A panel of independent judges, from Rotary across NSW, will assess nominees on their community service which best exemplifies Rotary's motto of Service Above Self, achievements, and personal attributes.

Nominations close on 16 June 2023 and finalists will be announced on 26 July 2023.

The winners will be announced at an Awards ceremony to be held in Sydney on 10 September 2023.

Lifestart Foundation Inc. Report to Rotary Club of Chatswood



Founded in 2000 by Australian Karen Leonard OAM and supported by a team of dedicated volunteers, **Lifestart Foundation** applies a holistic approach to helping those in need through proven working programs and initiatives which are designed to effect a generational change.

Lifestart Foundation is an Australian registered charity which provides sustainable assistance to disadvantaged people in Vietnam. It's main focus is providing educational scholarships, but also gives assistance across many areas, including house building, vocational training, emergency aid and medical support.



Accomplishments

- Hundreds of educational scholarships granted to disadvantaged children.
- Annual career days provided to four Danang Universities for Year 11 and 12 students.
- **Annual two-day career trip** to Hue University of Medicine and Pharmacy provided for Year 11 and 12 students.
- English lessons provided to hundreds of students in order to improve their

employment and study prospects.

- The Lifestart Foundation Free School (2006-2014) catered to extremely poor, illiterate, disadvantaged, neglected and abused children from 8-20 years of age who were not able to continue in main stream education.
- Over 45 at-risk youth mentored and sponsored into traineeships under the Jobstart program.
- **Hundreds of bicycles** and ebikes have been provided to young people which has allowed them to attend school and training.
- Education essentials provided for orphans including food allowances, warm coats/clothes, school uniforms, books and supplies.
- **Provided hundreds of laptops and computers** to High School and University students.

Direct student sponsorship is a positive way to ensure that a child will receive ongoing support for their education. All students are monitored and mentored regularly to ensure that academic achievement and dedication to study is maintained. Sponsors of our students receive regular updates on their progress along with a current photos. Scholarships include the provision of school fees, extra classes, books, stationery, uniforms and transport where needed.

IT WAS THE 20TH OF MAY. ON A CHILLY MORNING, THE SHORE MUNA SQUAD ARRIVED AT ARDEN HIGH SCHOOL, READY TO DEBATE A RANGE OF ISSUES.

MUNA, or the Model United Nations Assembly, is an annual international competition that aims to test the debating skills, knowledge of the country applicable to certain issues and national dress of students who represent a selected delegation. The countries of Japan and the UK had the pleasure of

being represented by the highly capable Michael Kwak, Daniel Kang, Braden Dent (United Kingdom), Oli Mezrani, Killian Featherstone, and Ari Carboni (Japan). The morning brought about excited discussion between each delegation, with conversation ranging from potential alliances, to who wore the most outrageous costume. Day one saw the discussion of four resolutions, being:

- McDonald's as a world food
- Action on climate change
- Borders and national sovereignty
- Exploitation of space.

It was obvious from the get-go that Shore was a school that was not to be messed with, with National debater Michael Kwak silencing his competition with an array of



words that few could even comprehend, and Daniel Kang dominating proceedings in a particularly regal crown and outfit. Unfortunately, the Shore MUNA team was struck apart, with debating mastermind Michael Kwak having to attend a national debate.

The Shore team arrived on day two of MUNA to seal the deal, with a total of two resolutions to be debated over the five hours. Alliances were further strengthened, but bridges were also burnt.

The delegation of Russia dealt with the challenge of even speaking at this point, as they struggled to provide an amendment to given resolutions without severe clamour from the NATO delegations.

Although no Shore team placed in the top three, we knew where we truly belonged - back home. It was truly an unforgettable experience. As a nondebater myself, getting used to 'the lingo' took some time, but was worth it by the cessation of the resolution.

I'd like to congratulate my fellow Shore delegations on their outstanding performance.

Additionally, I'd like to thank Rotary for sponsoring us so that we could have this wonderful experience. MUNA is such an excellent opportunity for all Shore boys, as it allows you to meet and collaborate with people from all types of backgrounds and contexts and have some fun too.


