FROM YOUR PRESIDENT

I would like to discuss my thoughts on the Australia Day BBQ held at Chatswood Mall on the 26th of January.

Let me initially tell you how proud I am to be the President of the Rotary Club of Chatswood Roseville where numerous members assisted before, at and after the event. There is no doubt that the occasion created an enormous amount of camaraderie between everyone who took part. Details of the occasion are provided elsewhere in this edition of the Bulletin by Peter Lewis, our Community Service Director.



It is always very risky to mention individuals as someone is always left out but let me specifically thank; -

- Peter Lewis, who did a lot of work putting the day together, including obtaining funds from the National Day Council Grant and convincing Willoughby City Council to allow us gratis to occupy a prime position in Chatswood Mall.
- Peter Lefmann, [and John Hartley's van], who organised all of the provisions [sausages, bread etc], picked up all of the relative items [marquee, BBQ, banners etc] and delivered them to and from the site.
- Ross Symons, who at short notice designed promotional banners and flyers and negotiated the cost of printing same.
- Peter Timmermann, who arranged for 2 Shelterboxes and promotional material to be on site.
- Michael MacQuillan, who organized a raffle, and of course the many members who donated prizes.

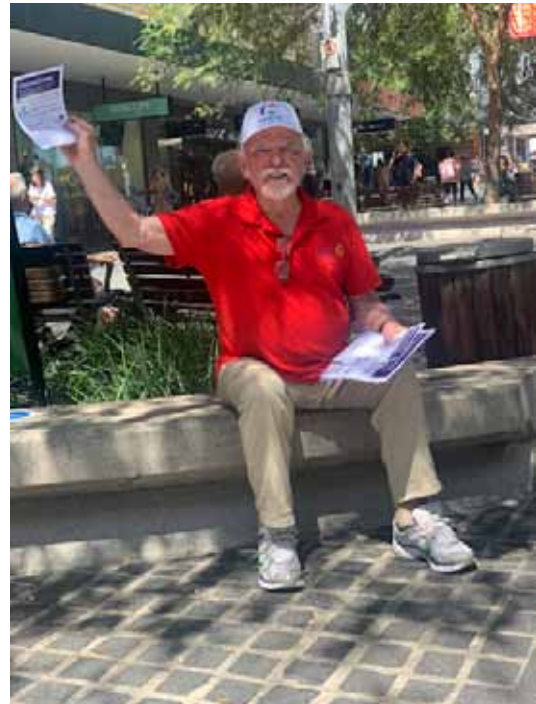

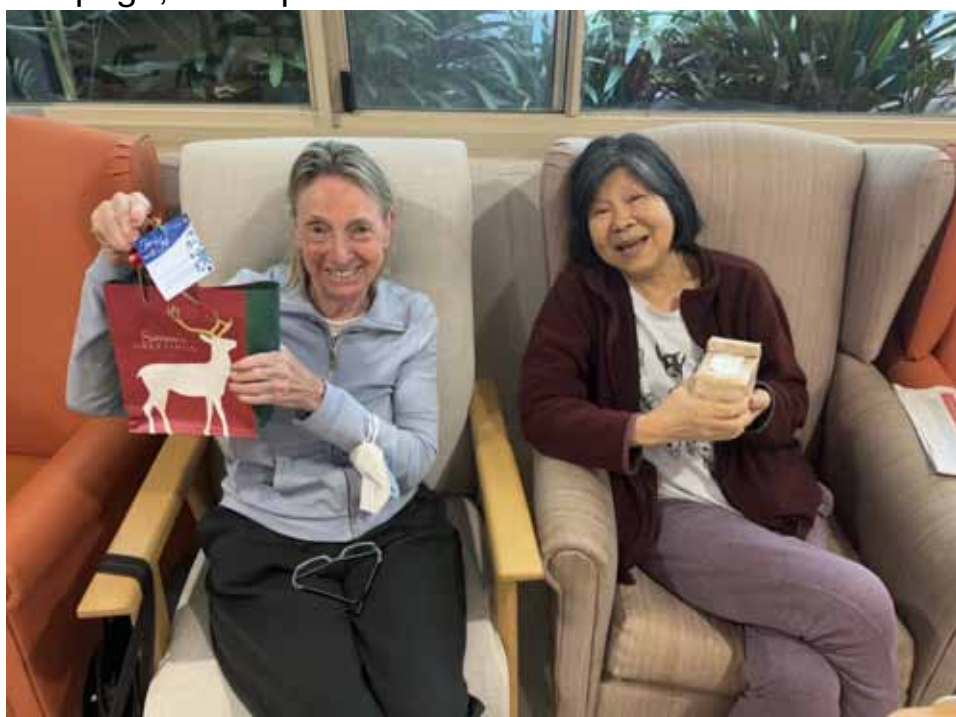

2023 RYLA ATTENDEE - JUSTIN du PRE Le ROUX



Hello all. My name is Justin du Pre le Roux and I was sponsored by the Rotary club of Chatswood Roseville to attend RYLA, also known as the Rotary youth leadership awards in January 2023.

Before I get into my report, I would like to extend thanks to the Rotary club of Chatswood Roseville, and in particular to Richard Green, who was my point of contact before and throughout RYLA. Without Richard, or the club as a whole I never would have been able to undertake the life changing experience of RYLA, and for that I am so very thankful.

My experience of RYLA is hard to talk about. Not because of trauma, or a lack of significance or anything of the sort, but rather because I have been sworn to secrecy on many of the parts that impacted me most. So please excuse me if this sounds too generalised, but I think it was that secrecy that made RYLA special for me.

For me, RYLA actually began in mid 2021 when I was first told about the program by my advisor in rover scouts, Chris Stanley. He encouraged me to give it a go despite my scepticism of a week long camp with nobody I knew to do things I wasn't even allowed to know about.

Eventually, following the cancellation of RYLA2022, I decided to just give it a go, cause who knows, I may just get something out of it, and boy, did I ever. The 2023 program occurred at Knox Grammar school and each day I never knew what to expect. We would be moved between lectures and seminars given by prominent leaders in society, and then quickly thrown out of our depth in teamwork exercises that forced us to assimilate and apply all that we had learnt so far to solve the problem.

All of these challenges were bound to create discourse and bring up strong emotions, so the day was often punctuated by small, close knit group reflection sessions that helped us recalibrate and really distil the lessons out of a challenging task. The week also gave the RYLArians a chance to leave Knox for a dinner with the Rotarians on the Tuesday night. It was a great evening at the pennant hills golf club with great food and even greater conversations.

Following the end of RYLA, I already see that the way I talk to and interact with others has been changed by RYLA, and I definitely see it changing me for the better for years to come.

SUNKOSHI DENTAL CLINIC - NEPAL

3rd GLOBAL GRANT INVOLVEMENT

Peter Kindred has provided the following information about the Sunkoshi Dental Clinic.

Attached are some photo's of a 3rd Global Grant (GG) we have been involved with.

I am the secondary contact for this GG. We could have been the International club as we are down as the main providers of the funds being \$US34,650 out of a total of \$US52,550 with our club being shown as the funder of this on the GG approval.

I was approached by Jan Pryor, who is heavily involved in RAWCS & has her own RAWCS project in Nepal empowering women, that Jennifer Jones, our world President visited last month. Jan is a member of Northlakes Toukley Rotary Club & they are the International club for the GG. Jan approached me due to my involvement with Timor Leste Dental Program.

The Kedje Foundation provided \$A50,000 which was paid direct into the Rotary Foundation a/c in Australia. The GG received \$US8k from our district as a DDF contribution which was matched by Rotary International. There was a small contribution from the Rotary Club in Nepal that was matched by Rotary International.

The project is basically providing dental equipment. This equipment will be used to provide extensive dental work for 750 villagers a year and over the life of the equipment dental treatment service for up to 450,000 villagers. It will be accompanied by dental exams on 4,000 school children a year and create awareness for these school children of dental hygiene.

I have tremendously enjoyed the experience, and have really valued the friendships and opportunity to hear from STEM professionals around the country - even beyond. I have attached the review of the forum below. Thank you again.

Review

I have been fortunate enough to be given a scholarship by Rotary to attend the National Youth Science Forum, and will be forever appreciative of this opportunity.

The experience has been incredibly impactful, and has shown me how diverse and dynamic a career in STEM can be, and how intersectional science is. I am so excited to move into such an interesting field with great potential for learning and world betterment.

I have really benefited from hearing from universities and bodies such as AGL, CSIRO, CSL, Lockheed Martin and many more. They have given me great insight into tertiary and career opportunities, and have demonstrated the great potential for innovation in a STEM career.

A part of hearing from these industries was visiting, or tuning in to livestreams, from sites like ANSTO, home of OPAL, and the Hadron Collider at CERN. These were incredible to experience, and it was very inspiring to hear about the STEM journeys of those who worked in those industries.

We were also fortunate enough to hear from science communicators, including Dr Melanie Bagg herself, gaining insight into how amazing a career in science communication can be. We also had the opportunity to participate in challenges – coming up with ways to recycle waste, and creating podcast pitches for COSMOS. I really enjoyed investigating further into an area of interest, and I hope to be able to collaborate with COSMOS to produce a podcast episode.

I am very thankful that the forum has provided us with the opportunities and the challenges that it did. I am so grateful for the opportunity to attend NYSF and meeting so many passionate students and professionals, and I am excited to begin my STEM journey and to discover and pursue new passions along the way.

MOREE EAST PUBLIC SCHOOL BOOKS IN HOMES PROJECT

Moree 'Books in Homes' Project

Aim: To extend the literacy project, 'Books in Homes' for the students of Moree East Public School to 2023.

To raise \$12,033 for the program

Moree East Public School is a disadvantaged school with 87% of the students from the Aboriginal community. 'Books in Homes' will provide the children with two new books of their choice per Term for three Terms.

The advantages are:

- Children can start their own home libraries
- Reading can be an everyday activity
- Parents can understand the importance of reading and having books in their home
- Literacy outcomes will improve

Fund Raising:

- District 9685 Grant - \$2,500
 - RAWCS Compassionate Grant - \$4,500
 - Trivia Night run by Turramurra and Chatswood Roseville Clubs - \$3,530
 - Pudding fundraiser by North Ryde, Chatswood Roseville and Turramurra - \$2,200
 - Recipe Book Sales and Christmas Raffle run by Turramurra Club – \$890
- Excess funds will go towards 'Books in Homes' 2024.

Books will be presented to the students at special 'Books in Homes' Assemblies when they arrive and there is great excitement in the school when they know the books are coming.



Nine members from Turramurra and Chatswood/Roseville Clubs visited the school in July 2022 where they were thanked for their donation of 'Books in Homes' 2022 and the provision of market umbrellas for shade.

The Rotary Club of Moree invited the visitors to a social dinner and home hosted four Rotarians.



The Moree Project has been selected for the 'RYLA Elevate Community RAWCS Projects' involving RYLA participants supporting it with marketing and fund raising activities during 2023.

I believe the 'Books in Homes' literacy project will give the students improved educational outcomes and a better chance for a positive future.

This will not only benefit the participants but also the Moree community.

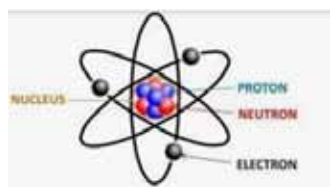
AUSTRALIA NUCLEAR SCIENCE & TECHNOLOGY ORG. (ANSTO)
