- She already has a PhD Immunology & Infectious Disease from University of Sydney, and a B.Laws & B.Science which means that Tony Basten may be able converse with her on Immunology matters of global importance!!!

PDG Pam Pritchard was on the selection committee and offered Mikaela's placement to Chatswood Roseville as "host", to meet with her, keep in touch occasionally, assist with her Rotary interaction and make her feel comfortable.

Little Blue Shed Project - Uganda; RAWCS Project.

The Little Blue Shed brings skills, education, employment and hope to girls and women living in East Rural Uganda.

TANJA CURCIC, of the Rotary Club of Taree in NSW, had a life changing visit to Uganda in 2010, where she witnessed a lady inside a blue shed with one sewing machine. The lady asked for more sewing machines to be brought for other ladies in the village so they too could generate an income. It was done and the shed was officially renamed the "Little Blue Shed".

After returning to Australia, Tanja in 2015 bought a one way ticket back to Uganda. In the ensuing years Tanja developed a new-founded understanding and compassion for the women and girls living in Africa. This gave birth to another level of vision for the Little Blue Shed.

The Little Blue Shed is now on a mission with others to provided training, employment opportunities, counselling and care to vulnerable women and girls living in poverty, and empower them with sustainable programs.

Tanja is returning to Uganda on 27 July, and whilst wishing to speak to our club, has been informed of the Club's current commitments and involvement with the International/Foundation projects this year.

GOLDEN NEEDLE PROJECT - SUMMARY

<u>Context:</u> This summary was, fittingly, prepared on ANZAC day 2022 when we recognise the WW1's allies' invasion of Turkey, at Gallipoli. Both countries have, subsequently, worked respectfully to the betterment of our countries and its people.

The Golden Needle build on earlier joint program involving a Group Study exchange, 2013 and a successful Rotary Global Grant, "Child Bride" (2014/15) to educate disadvantages young women.

<u>The Project:</u> Golden Needle is a humanitarian project, focused on community economic development, being jointly managed by Chatswood Roseville (Australia) and Izmir -Dokuz EylUI (Turkey) as well as being cooperatively funded through the Rotary Foundation.

The project is focussed to provide education and improved economic standing of disadvantaged women by generating an up-skilled workforce for the textile industry in the city of Izmir. Regional turmoil has seen high rates of incoming international migration to Izmir and the project seeks to prove technical training to enable impacted women gain employment and improved opportunities.

Goals: The project will establish 3 centres which will train some 200 women per year to work, as intermediate staff, in the ready-made clothing and textile industry. The project's goals are:

- Building the capacity of local leaders, organizations, and networks to support economic development in poor communities;
- Developing opportunities for productive work and improving access to sustainable livelihoods; and
- Empowering marginalized communities by providing access to economic opportunities and services.

Cooperating organisations include:

- * Izmir Metropolitan Municipality has committed to allocate 3 buildings, to support the access of people who will receive training, and to take over the training centres and make them sustainable after the project is over.
- * Aegean Clothing Manufacturers Association is committed to supporting women's education processes, supporting the employment of women who graduate and supporting the employment of vocational high school graduates.
- * İzmir Bayraklı Ali Osman Konakçı Vocational and Technical High School management have committed, in the MoU, that after the end of the project, they will continue training with new machinery and equipment.



The project framework was built on:

- Surveys of women's training centres confirm the education criteria (see attached) and localities of the training centres. (In 3 regions of Bayraklı, Konak, Karabağlar).
- Interviews of ready-made clothing manufacturers to identify their needs, training requirements and employment opportunities.

Evaluation and Monitoring: A Golden Needle Project Monitoring and Evaluation Committee will assess the project over its course, at is end and report to The Rotary Foundation.


