TONIGHT'S MEETING - 24 OCTOBER 2023

Guest Speaker - Noel Phelan

"The Teddy Sheean VC RAN Story"

On 1 December 1942 Teddy Sheean, aged 18 and the youngest on HMAS ARMIDALE, was an ordinary seaman and a loader for the anti-aircraft gun.

The ship was attacked by 13 Japanese planes. Torpedoed, the order was given to abandon ship.



Teddy strapped himself in to the gun mounts and commenced firing, shooting down one aircraft and possibly damaging others attempting to disrupt the aircraft from strafing and killing his defenceless shipmates in the water.

Severely wounded, Teddy continued firing the gun as the ship slipped under the waves dragging him with it to his grave.

Bring family, friends and others to hear Noel tell this tragic story of incredible bravery for which Teddy became the only Royal Australian Navy person to be awarded a VC.

Guest Speaker - David Lipson

“ABC News and Current Affairs”

Our Guest Speaker was David Lipson, the well known news and current affairs presenter and journalist with over 20 years experience with Sky News Australia and ABC National TV and Radio.

David's father, Dr Tony Lipson, was a charter Member of the Roseville Chase Rotary Club, who sadly suddenly passed away in April 1996.

David gave us a fascinating insight into the exigencies, and often risks, experienced by a foreign correspondent and his team bringing a story to our screens and radios. This was superbly illustrated with extracts from videos of a football match in Indonesia; a protesters demonstration in Michigan and an interview in easternmost Ukraine.

The ferocity of the football match with the teams and the massive crowd fighting, brawling in the stands and on the ground itself.

In May 2020 hundreds of protesters from the American Patriot Rally carried automatic weapons into the grounds of the Michigan Congress with many entering the building to protest its closure during Covid.

David's skills were very evident in his interview with a Ukrainian woman in the City of Mariupol on the border with Russia a few days before the invasion in February 2022. She had lived in Russia and had recently moved across the border with her family and they would once again become refugees.

Rotary's fight against Polio

Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 35 years. Our goal of ridding the world of this disease is closer than ever.



In 1985 Rotary International and the World Health Organization launched the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. There were an estimated 350,000 cases of polio in 125 countries.

Since our first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979 we've reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent.

Rotary members have contributed more than \$2.1 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect nearly 3 billion children in 122 countries from this paralyzing disease. Rotary's advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by governments to contribute more than \$10 billion to the effort.

Today, polio remains endemic only in Afghanistan and Pakistan. But it's crucial to continue working to keep other countries polio-free. If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyze as many as 200,000 children each year.

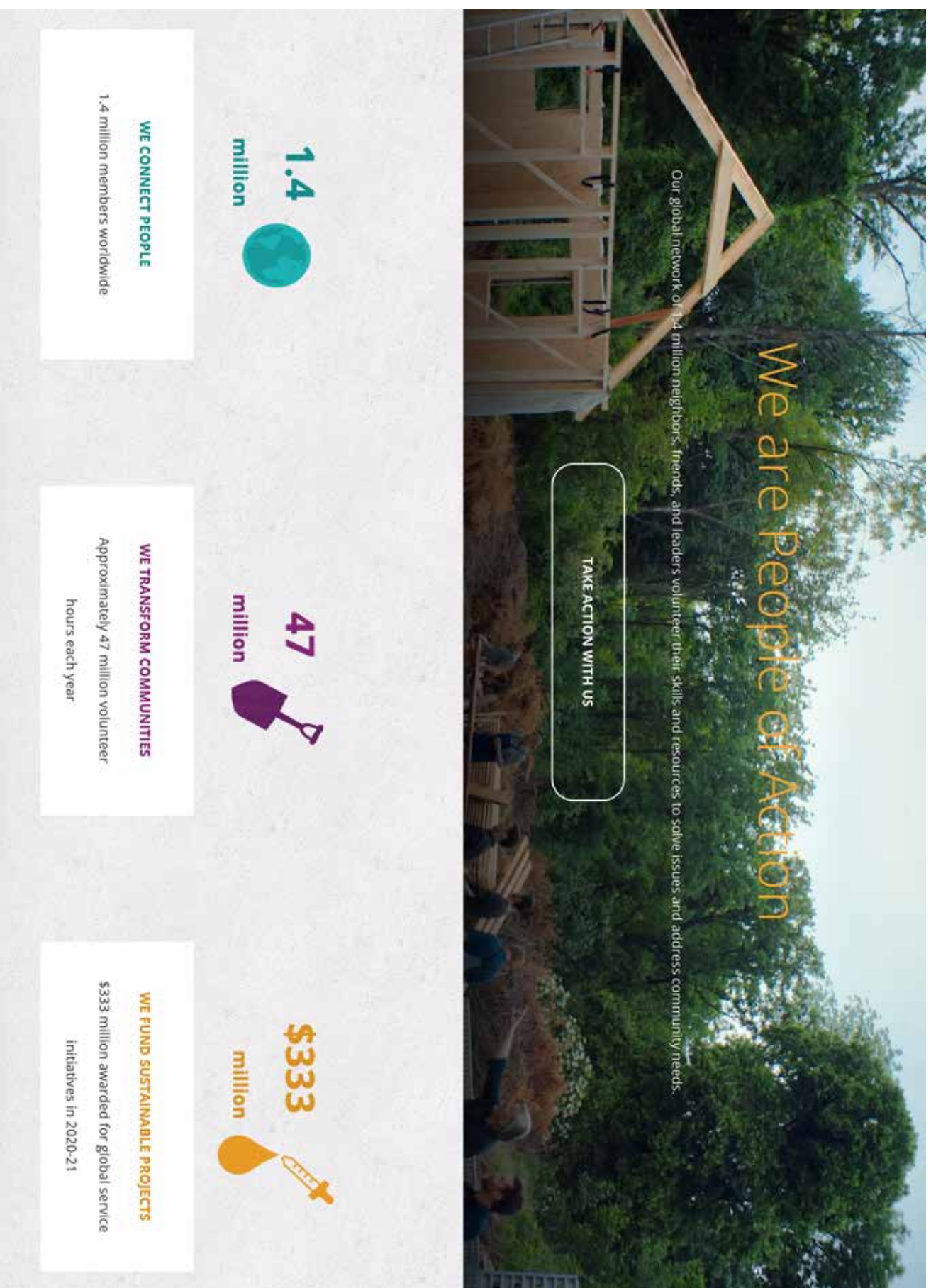

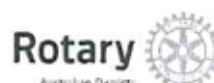

SUMMARY/RECOMMENDATIONS

we have sent 2 dental teams to Timor-Leste this year, the first with 2 dentists, the second with 5 dentists. In each team, we have a Timorese component, generally 4-5 Timorese in total consisting of one admin/fixer and clinicians, who we continue to support with training and equipment. The project employs 2 Timorese dental clinicians full-time, who work with the teams when they arrive in TL; at other times, they are employed in the clinic in Maubara and support 13 local schools with oral health education. 5000 toothbrushes and toothpaste has been given out to the children in the surrounding areas.
