

TONIGHTS MEETING - 25 OCTOBER 2022 Ken HUTT - ASSAULT on EVEREST for END POLIO NOW

KEN HUTT – Australian adventurer and mountaineer

A thwarted attempt by Australian adventurer and mountaineer, Ken HUTT, to become the first person to legally paraglide off the top of Mt Everest to raise money for Rotary International's **End Polio Now** campaign, has been placed on

ice, but his message went all the way to the top.

Ken developed a life-threatening chest infection at camp 2 (6,400m). He had no choice but to descend. Once you get beyond Camp 2 you can not get medical aid or be rescued. It was heart breaking because Ken had been working on securing the flying permit for more than 3 years, but it was the only decision he could make.

Although Ken didn't get to launch the paraglider from Mr Everest his team (right) still managed to succeed with their goal. Three Brazilian climbers in his team made it to the summit and carried the **End Polio Now** banner with them.





Film maker Joe Carter, accompanied Ken and was producing a documentary *Fly from Everest*. Ken's expedition raised over \$250,000 for **End Polio Now.**

LAST MEETING 11 OCTOBER 2022 ANDY SKIDMORE - BURN BRIGHT

Andy told us how he founded the Not For Profit organisation Burn Bright, and a mission of growing the next generation of young Australians through student leadership, wellbeing programs and national camps. He outlined how Burn Bright works with students in a collaborative, fun and inclusive team culture.

Their programs and camps bring about positive behavioural change, a shift in mindset and personal wellbeing, allowing students to make informed choices and decisions.

He explained how Burn Bright's programs are focused on demonstrating how students can turn theory into action by practicing and road testing skills learnt before applying them in their own lives. Burn Bright has a team of 10 staff and over 100 volunteers. Burn Bright's programs are based on embedding and living out the concepts of positive psychology and are informed by the science of wellbeing.

NEXT MEETING - 8 NOVEMBER 2022 ELIZABETH LOVELL CEO, LIFELINE HARBOUR TO HAWKESBURY



Elizabeth Lovell commenced as the CEO of Lifeline Harbour to Hawkesbury (H2H) in July this year.

Before H2H Elizabeth was a Director of

Student Administration at the University of Sydney, from July 2019 to July 2022; held several positions with Transport for NSW; and Study Group, a provider of international education. Elizabeth has been a member of Upper Northern Beaches Rotary Club since 2016, and a Joint Immediate Past President for 2021-2022.

In 1994, H2H won a tender with Ku-ring-gai Council to occupy a building that was previously the Gordon Library. A community campaign was run, with the support of local media, to refurbish the old library into a Lifeline centre.

In 1996, the transformed building was ready and the H2H moved into its present home at 4 Park Avenue, Gordon.

Since 1996 Lifeline Harbour to Hawkesbury has grown from a relatively small centre, operating a telephone counselling service, to a large centre providing a wide range of crisis support, suicide prevention services as well as face-to-face counselling services and programs.

Lifeline H2H at Gordon is an independent Lifeline centre managed by a small number of dedicated staff and 700 variously-skilled volunteers.

Earlier this year our Club assisted in the construction of a shelter at the Lifeline Deport in West Lindfield.

PROPOSALS FROM ANDRE HARIMAN PARTICIPATION WITH LANE COVE ROTARY IN PROJECTS

I attended the Rotary Club of Lane Cove meeting last evening and they invited us to participate in two projects.

1. End Polio Now Movie 'The Lost King'.

Last March our club and Lane Cove organised a very successful End Polio Now movie at the Mandarin Centre Hoyts. We charged \$30 per person.

This time I am proposing the following - PLEASE ADVISE

- a. we are not involved with organising the project but we will support it by attendance and donating some raffles prizes.
 - I will ask the Rotary Clubs of Lane Cove and Turramurra to organise it.
- b. We will Charge only \$20 per person not \$30 but we will sell raffles tickets at \$5 for 1, \$10 for 3 and \$20 for 7. There will be more than 25 raffles prizes.
- c. I will contact and speak to Hoyts Mandarin Centre and Hoyts Booking
 Centre in Melbourne as soon a possible and organise bookings.
 Probable date Sunday 4th December at 10.00 a.m. and 1.00 p.m. sessions.

This will be a pre theatre release and as we are booking before 2.00 p.m. they probably charge us only \$10.00 per ticket.

2. \$ 20,000 Community Grant for Australia Day BBQ.

I will pay for the seats first and reimbursed later.

Like early this year, we have been invited to this event. I think each club will receive between \$4,000 to \$5,000.

I will assist on the day but I am not interested and do not have the time to organise it. Many of our members are much better than me.

Changes to laws for child-related Organisations New access to national information

Recent changes to laws mean that the NSW Working with Children Check can access information held on a national database of people barred from working with children. This database, known as the National Reference System, has been established by the Australian Government and is operated by the Australian



Criminal Intelligence Commission (ACIC).

This new measure means that the Office of the Children's Guardian will be alerted if an applicant, or holder of a NSW clearance, has been barred from working with children in other states and territories.

We may also share information, including workplace misconduct information, with other states and territories when a person is barred from working with children in NSW.

There is more information on our website about these changes.

New requirement for heads of organisations

Changes also mean that heads of organisations under the Child Safe Scheme must now have a Working with Children Check clearance. This is because leaders should model the actions expected of their staff. Apply for a WWCC now.

Animal cruelty offences now WWCC barring offences

Additional changes have come into effect that will further strengthen the NSW Working with Children Check scheme by ensuring that NSW applicants or clearance holders will be automatically barred from working with children for a range of serious animal cruelty offences.

We have established a Memorandum of Understanding with RSPCA NSW and the Animal Welfare League for sharing animal cruelty information to support this change.

Reminder to verify new and renewed Checks

An expired Working with Children Check is not valid and must be renewed for the worker to remain in child-related work.

Applicants do the first step of applying for a new Check or renewing an existing one online at www.ocg.nsw.gov.au/check. They then need to take their application number and identity documents to a Service NSW centre.

Employers can be penalised if they fail to verify that their workers or volunteers who work with children have a valid Working with Children Check or have applied for one. Find out more about penalties and compliance.

Make sure you keep your registration details up to date so we can contact you if a clearance is cancelled.

Child Safe – resources and training

There is much more to keeping children safe in your organisation than just the Working with Children Check. The Office of the Children's Guardian provides online resources and tools to help you.

VOCATIONAL VISIT - PHOENIX HOUSE 18 OCTOBER 2022

A group of 16 members and partners, and some other local identities, attended a tour and presentation of Phoenix House on 18 October 2022.

The CEO, Paul Gabrielides, ran through the history of Phoenix House and how Phoenix House supports young people and their families through a range of services.

PHYS engage young people through specialist case management, assist individuals and families through the rapeutic counselling, and create a sense of community and belonging through group work programs and activities.

Young People are referred to PHYS, requiring different levels of Care. Some require Urgent Attention, such as hospitalisation, accommodation and basic supplies. Their in-house Social Workers, Counsellors and Educators collaborate with external health professionals to support each young person achieve their most immediate needs.

They provide Youth and/or Youth and Family Counselling, Parent Consultation, Life Coaching and have conversations with parents, young people and/or their families that:

- focus on their best hopes
- focus on what is already working to help realise those hopes



Given that many people who come to the service may have faced hardship or adversity or may have been socially marginalised, PHYS aim to:

- provide a positive social response
- uphold and affirm the dignity, skills and efforts of people and
- advocate and support socially just outcomes

Following the tour we were provided with an enjoyable lunch prepared by volunteers from Phoenix House.


