TONIGHTS MEETING - 27 SEPTEMBER 2022

Virtual Tour of Central Mortuary Station, Videos Prepared by Brian Townsend Presented by Peggy Yu

Designed to carry Sydney's dead to their final resting place, Mortuary Station is the only remaining example of a purpose-built Victorian funerary railway station in Australia, and possibly the world. Located just outside Central Station, it is one of the most ornate sandstone structures in Sydney – and certainly one of the most unusual railway buildings in NSW.

In 1869, funerary services were separated from ordinary railway traffic with the introduction of a dedicated cemetery branch line between the Mortuary Station and Rookwood Necropolis. Both buildings were designed in the Gothic Revival style by the renowned colonial architect James Barnet. The train service operated between Sydney and Rookwood for over 80 years, transporting funeral mourners and visitors to the cemetery until the 1930s.

Virtual guests will take a journey back in time to learn about this elaborately carved stone railway station and have the opportunity to appreciate the landscaping and the architectural and cultural aspects of the building.

Whilst the mortuary station is a heritage item, the even bigger vocational issue that Brian and Peggy found from their research ,has revealed a history of the great architect to Sydney, James Barnett.

James Barnett is the architect who shaped most of the early government works throughout New South Wales. Some of his most notable works being Custom House, The GPO in Martin Place and North Sydney Post Office.

PRESIDENTS REPORT

I have been reminded during the past month of the 4 Global Grant projects with which our club is currently involved. 3 of them were initiated and supported by the former Chatswood club and I knew very little about them. The other one was initiated more recently as a result of the enthusiasm of lan Garrard.

One of the projects is the construction of a dam to provide drinking water to a local village which was promoted by the Rotary Club of Aurangabad East, in India.

Early in the month I received an email from that club which had been addressed to David Williams.

Dear Rtn. David,

I am pleased to inform you that our global grant project no GG1639404 for providing clean water is now complete in all respects.

The project was delayed due to leakages in concrete dam walls. The leakages can be found only when dams are filled with water.

Since last 2-3 years there has not been enough rain hence the leakages were not identified. Now all the leakages have been sealed and dams are ready in all respects.

Meanwhile I have uploaded an Interim Report for the year 2021-2022. We will be uploading the Final Report by next month.

I request you to authorise the interim report.

Please also let me know the Email Id of the current president of your club Rtn. Norman Gibson. Please request him on our behalf to authorise the interim report. Thanks, and With Best Regards,

The Board approved me authorizing the Interim Report.

Another project with which our club is involved is the Timor-Leste Dental Program. I was provided with a Project Audit Report for the 6 months as at 30th June 2022 and distributed it to the Board. I understand that Peter Kindred is providing further information about that project elsewhere in this edition of the Bulletin.

A more recent project is the Golden Needle Project in Turkey with which we are more conversant. The contribution by our club is AUS\$15,000 which has been promised by Peter Kindred and other donors.

On behalf of our club I authorized the Memorandum of Understanding with



the Dokuz Rotary Club of Turkey which has now been submitted to Rotary International for their consideration.

The 4th project with which our club is involved is in Sri Lanka but this has been put on hold as a result of the current economic problems in that country.

My recent involvement with the above projects has focused my attention on what our club is doing to raise money for worth while charitable purposes in our own community.

Apart from the Sausage Sizzles at Bunnings, which are labour intensive, not enough.

In a Bulletin a couple of editions ago I asked for one or more volunteers to form a fund-raising committee but have not been knocked over in the rush. How about a couple of members stepping up to the mark within the next fortnight before I leave on my long delayed overseas trip. Among the very interesting thoughts and ambitions shared with us by DG Mina Howard, was an explanation of this years logo and theme "Imagine Rotary."

For the information of those members who unfortunately could not attend the meeting, below is the story behind the 2022-2023 Rotary International Logo, which is shown in the banner below, and also appears on the front cover of our Bulletin.

The Story behind the 2022-2023 Rotary International Logo.

The logo for the theme was designed by Riki Salam, an Australian artist and graphic designer specializing in contemporary Indigenous art, design, and communications. He also created the 2023 Rotary International Convention logo which will be held in Melbourne, Australia, thus connecting the two by a shared visual language.

Meaning of the design elements

- The circle in aboriginal culture signifies our connections to one another.
- The dots around it represent people and there are seven because of Rotary's seven areas of focus, namely;
 - Peacebuilding and conflict prevention;
 - Disease prevention and treatment;
 - Water, sanitation, and hygiene;
 - Maternal and child health;
 - Basic education and literacy:
 - Community economic development;
 - Environment.
- The circle and the dots together become a navigation star our guiding light.
- The solid line underneath is what is referred to as a digging stick and it is used when doing hard work. And since Rotary members are people of action – it represents a tool for getting things done.

The colours

- Purple stands for polio eradication,
- Green for the environment, the newest addition to our areas of focus, and
- White for peace, our core mission.

Together, they are the colours of the women's movement, the Suffragette – a subtle nod to this history as Jennifer Jones is the first female Rotary International president.

SUMMARY/RECOMMENDATIONS

During Covid we managed to keep our dental clinic in Maubara running. We continued to employ full-time, two Timorese dental clinicians, who continued to provide dental treatment for their community throughout the pandemic.



We kept them supplied with dental materials and equipment. We also provided dental consumables -particularly local anaesthesia - to 3 government dental clinics - in Gleno, Liquiça and Maubisse. Without this support, they would have been unable to continue to serve their communities.

We are now slowly starting to return Australian teams to TL.

There is an increasing level of bureaucracy it seems, which is making it a much more onerous task to get teams up and running. We are attempting to sort out the process - which unfortunately changes significantly every election cycle.

Happy to report that two volunteer teams have completed their very productive visits in July and August/ September. A third team will visit in October.

The Education of Timorese student Ana Paula Salgado continues at Fiji National University. She has now completed Semester 1 of The Second year of the Bachelor of Oral Health Program.

Jennifer joined Rotary Club of Chatswood in 2006 and served as Secretary for three Presidents ... Paul Watts & Alan Hall-Watson & Peter Timmermann. She followed me as President in 2012-13 and paved the way for Dieter Torheiden and then Tony Basten, Nick Dorsch, Peggy Yu and Brian Townsend.

This was a golden period of strong leadership within our Rotary Club with great community projects & achievements over the past decade.

Jennifer always seemed happy and confident, if not a little shy when asked to talk publicly ... but in her years of Rotary she blossomed and gained enormous self-confidence, especially when addressing larger groups. She really was one of the very nice people in Rotary, always offering to help others in club projects & events.

Unfortunately, she was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer and resigned from Rotary in 2019 before moving north to Queensland.

In recent years, she met Michael Bourke and was in a happy, loving relationship. She sold up in Sydney and moved to Hervey Bay in 2020 where they were establishing their new home.

But her cancer returned and the end was swift.
