NOEL PHELAN

THE STORY OF THE COSTA CONCORDIA

Tonight we will have the pleasure of having Noel Phelan speaking to us on what must be one of the most unbelievably bizarre stories of human vanity and incompetence causing a massive nautical disaster followed by an incredible engineering feat of salvage.

Noel Phelan's first career was as a science and mathematics teacher. He then moved into IT with IBM as a systems engineer and spent 25 years in various technical and management positions. He has been a volunteer guide at the Maritime Museum for over 15 years. Noel was the team leader of the speakers for many years.

Noel is a Past President of the Northbridge Rotary club. He spent many years as sailing captain of his sailing club. He also spent several years with Marine Rescue and the Rural Fire Service.

Noel is also a volunteer at the Naval Historical Society where he has developed three Navy harbour cruises. He has also organised a speaker's program for the Navy Historical Society where the presentations are delivered by ZOOM to the 500 members around Australia.

He fulfilled a boyhood dream to fly a WW II fighter by flying a SPITFIRE at The Imperial War Museum at Duxford in the UK recently

FROM YOUR PRESIDENT

On the 7th of February Avis Manoukian took us out of our usual routine and organised a tour of more than 20 of our members and partners to the Lucas Heights Australia Nuclear Science & Technology Organisation (ANSTO) which made me appreciate that I decided to take up Law as an occupation rather than Science, otherwise I would have caused some nasty international incidents.



At our Board meeting one week later I realised how much our club and the former Chatswood club are involved in International aid activities.

Neil Howie explained that a recent amendment to the law on imports into Timor Leste necessitated the updating of some documentation relating to the Timor Leste Dental Program which has been operating since 2003. Neil and Peter Kindred spent many hours in meetings with a representative of the team of dentists who volunteer their services to improve the oral treatment of remote rural communities and then Neil drafted several documents, including a Memorandum of Understanding with the Carmelite Sisters who are responsible for the day to day operations of the project.

I congratulate Neil on the drafting of those complex documents which were signed by Peter Kindred as project manager and then forwarded to the Carmelite Sisters for their signature.

It was noted that The Golden Needle project is up and running with the Turkish Rotary Club purchasing machines and continuing discussions with the relevant local authorities on the operation of the project.

Peter Kindred also provided information to the Board about the Education Development in North East Thailand. This is a RAWCS project which is currently dormant. It has not been cancelled, as it is hoped to re-establish the work it does, and re-starting after closure adds to complications.

Details of our activities in our local communities are set out elsewhere in this edition of the Bulletin.

We will also focus to select woman coming from earthquake effected cities.

Also we held will hold our first project Monitoring (Zoom) Meeting on 21 Feb. 2023 to run through progress, issues and to keep track of the finances which Peter Kindred is oversighting.

COSTA CONCORDIA

THE SINKING AND SALVAGE - JANUARY 2012



The **COSTA CONCORDIA** sank on the 13th January 2012 one hundred years after the TITANIC sank and in similar circumstances. The ship had 3,229 passengers and a crew of 1,023. The captain of the ship was Francesco Schettino. He diverted the ship from its normal course to do a “salute” to a friend on Giglio Island. Schettino had on the bridge the maitre d’ and a woman he had dined with on the night. At around 9 pm he took control of the ship and it hit a rock which tore a 53 metre gash in the port side. Communication with the Indonesian helmsman was difficult and a key order was misunderstood. All the vital compartments flooded resulting in the loss of power and electricity. At this point everyone on the bridge knew the ship would sink. The ship continued on under its own momentum listing to port. Cross flooding allowed the ship to right itself. The breeze and current blew the ship around and with a starboard list back to shore where it grounded and capsized.

Captain Schettino was in shock after striking the rock and failed to take command of the situation and organize for the passengers to abandon ship. There had been no lifeboat drill so the passengers and crew had to fend for themselves. It took over 6 hours to get everyone off the ship. Schettino fell into a lifeboat and went ashore with many of the passengers still on the ship. Rescue operations were quickly mounted and Schettino was ordered back to the ship and take charge. He refused and went home to be detained the next day. He was found guilty of multiple counts of manslaughter, causing a shipwreck and abandoning his ship while passengers remained on board. He was sentenced to 16 years in prison.

Hear from Noel Phelan tonight, on what really happened and the chain of events that led to this disaster and the brilliant engineering to salvage the ship that took years and 2 billion dollars. The ship cost \$900 million to build.

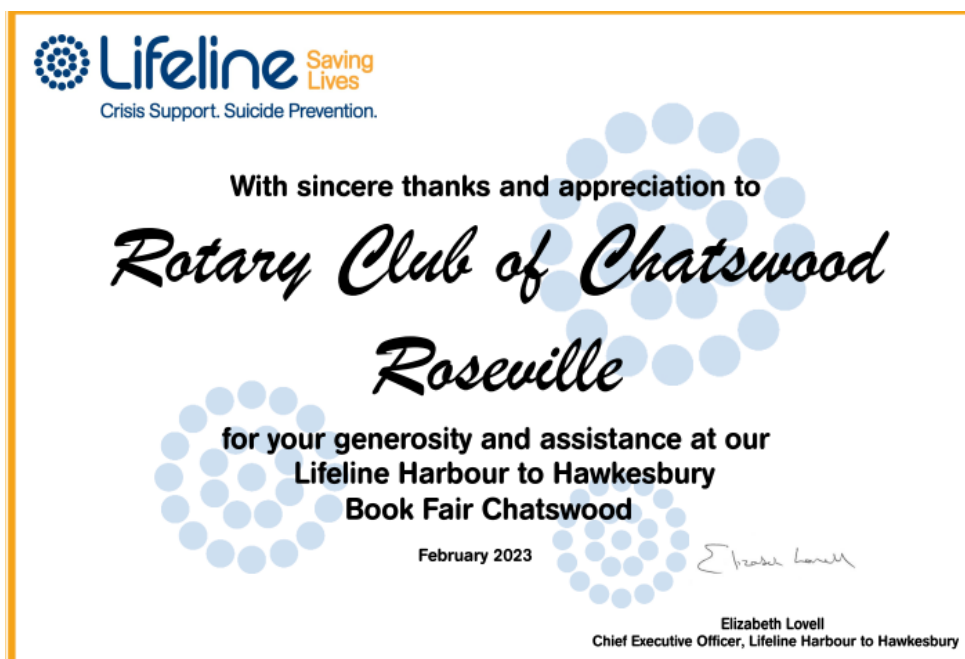

One of the goals of the Polio Eradication Strategy 2022–2026 is to permanently interrupt all poliovirus transmission in the last two endemic countries, Afghanistan and Pakistan. There is good evidence that this may occur in 2023.

In the global effort to eradicate polio, 2022 was a year of contrasts. With polio detections in places such as New York and London and an increase in cases in Pakistan, it may seem that our efforts are going backwards. While detection of any poliovirus is a setback, a deeper analysis reveals a more encouraging story: 2022 saw perhaps some of the most significant progress in the programme's history and has set up the global polio effort for a unique opportunity to achieve success in 2023.



Endemic wild poliovirus transmission in both Pakistan and Afghanistan is becoming increasingly geographically restricted, with fewer virus lineages remaining active. In Pakistan, for example, all cases in 2022 were concentrated in just six districts of one province, out of a total of 180 districts in the country. But even more importantly: the biodiversity of the virus (i.e. the individually-distinct virus lines that actively circulate in the country) continues to decline

In 2020, the country was affected by 11 separate and individual chains of transmission. This was reduced to four in 2021, and to just one single chain in 2022. This means that individual virus lines are being successfully knocked out. The situation in Afghanistan is very similar.

Encouragingly, we saw the same thing in other countries as they approached their final eradication efforts, notably India, Nigeria and Egypt.

The bulk of vaccine derived cases are also becoming more restricted, with 90% of all global cases restricted to three places: eastern Democratic Republic of Congo, northern Yemen, and northern Nigeria.



The virus is at its weakest now, and the opportunity to wipe it out completely is now at its greatest. To do this we must focus our efforts on the ‘most consequential geographies’. These are places where immunization rates are low because of poor health systems, conflict, and misinformation. They are also places from where the virus can “escape” to other countries.



There are seven subnational areas around the world that need to be targeted: *eastern Afghanistan; southern Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, Pakistan; Tete province and its hinterland in northern Mozambique; eastern Democratic Republic of Congo; northern Yemen; northern Nigeria; south-central Somalia. These areas have some of the highest and most densely populated proportions of zero-dose children (children who are either un- or under-vaccinated) in the world.*

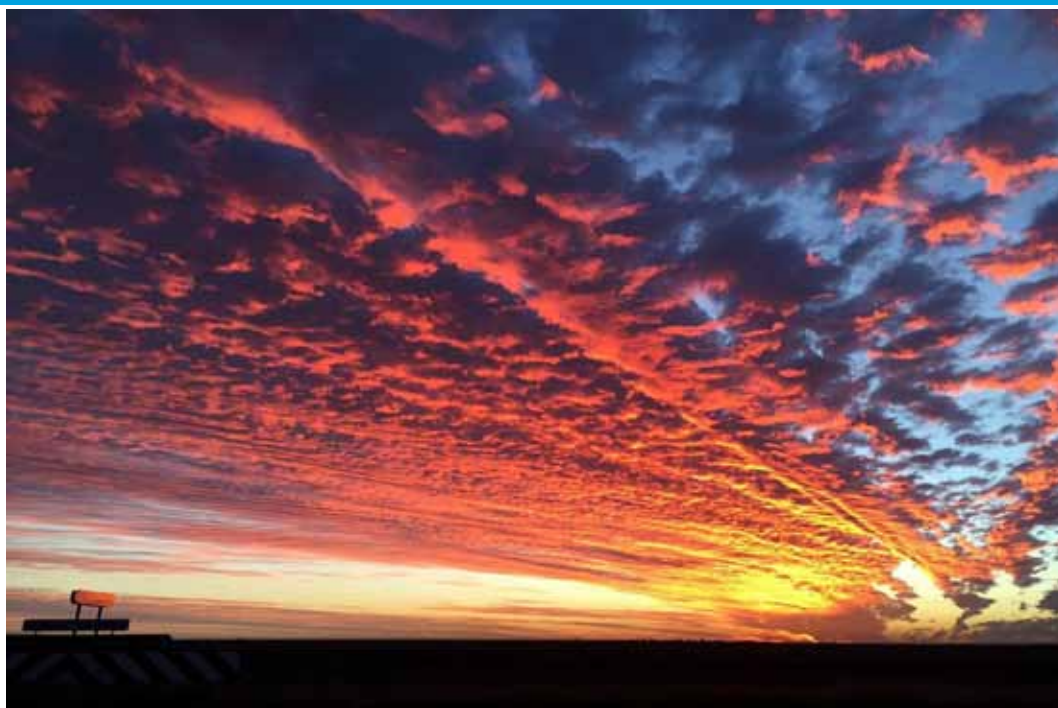
A highly infectious disease such as polio spreads easily with population movements. Outbreaks such as in London and New York last year will continue to occur until polio is gone from all areas. It is critical that all countries maintain their national efforts to protect themselves through strong disease surveillance and high vaccination coverage.

However, this year the GPEI programme will focus on reaching zero-dose children in the seven identified areas. These are the areas which will have the greatest impact on the global eradication effort.

There will be challenges reaching the unimmunized children, and also ensuring the necessary financial resources are available, but success this year certainly is possible. As always, Rotarians can help by advocating for the cause and donating funds: Donate to End Polio

In short, despite appearances, during 2022 the world was put on an extremely strong footing to interrupt all remaining chains of poliovirus transmission by the end of 2023—the goal of the GPEI Strategy 2022-2026.

Satan laughs uproariously and answers, "Yeah, right. AND JUST WHERE ARE YOU GOING TO FIND A LAWYER?"

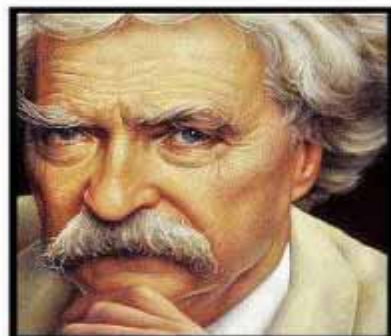
CHEAP PARKING
