

13 July - 1942 Japanese Submarine Attack

On 29 May 1942, five Japanese submarines gathered outside Sydney Harbour. The war was about to come to Sydney. Three midget submarines were launched but only one managed to fire its weapons, one of which sunk the ferry HMAS Kuttabul, an accommodation vessel moored at Garden Island. Twenty-one sailors lost their lives.

Ray's talk will explain what happened, how it happened and will briefly consider the aftermath.

After spending over thirty years in the navy, joining as an apprentice, Ray retired as a Commander Engineer and has continued his interest in marine matters by volunteering with the Sydney Heritage Fleet restoring and crewing in a range of heritage vessels.


FROM YOUR PRESIDENT

I am sure that all of us will agree that the youth in rural areas of Australia face difficulties in obtaining a good education and subsequently, good career opportunities. They need help in addition to that which is supplied by the State government and their magnificent, dedicated teachers.

The Rotary Club of Turramurra assists the public school at Moree and we provide some financial support for their project.

The Rotary Club of Belrose assists the public school at Peak Hill.

I am suggesting that our club provides some assistance to the Yeoval Central School.



Yeoval is a small town 340 kms North West of Sydney on the cross roads between Dubbo, Wellington and Parkes. I have an interest in the town because my great grandparents on my father's side, and their 11 children, lived there in the 2nd half of the 1800s and early 1900s but none of the family remain. The lure of the Big Smoke. Two (2) of their daughters married teachers who were stationed there and moved on with them to their next posting.

I can state with reasonable confidence that my Great Grandfather initiated the schooling of the children of Yeoval when he was the manager of the nearby Goodrich gold mine. In 1876, when the population of that mining community was about 700, a school was opened with 45 pupils. The school at Yeoval was not opened until 1883, some 7 years later.

Nick Brook [a member of our club], Shane Waddell [a former member of the Roseville Chase club], a couple of other desperates and I stayed overnight at the one and only hotel in the town, the Royal, during an outback trip in May 2021. The hotel was owned by my ancestors for many years.

I have recently made initial approaches to the school at Yeoval and in mid March I received an email from Helen Tremain, the Head Teacher Secondary Studies which read, in part;

"I thought I would begin by giving a brief overview of our school. We have approximately 100 students from kindergarten to Year 12 with a 50/50 spread between primary and secondary. Our indigenous population is around 30%. Our students come from a relatively low socio-



economic background which sometimes impacts their educational opportunities. We still have a strong partnership with the Western Access Program which has spanned over 30 years but have progressed from the original telematics to Microsoft Teams which is much more convenient and far less clunky.

In regards to how you may be of assistance to our school, I have heard great things about the Peak Hill model and would be open to exploring that with you a little more. I would also like to be able to put our Years 10 – 12 students through mock interviews in preparation for the work force. Our school is also a BYOD (Bring Your Own Device). All students from Year 7 – 12 are expected to have a lap top which is subsidised by the school. Very rarely, this is out of the reach of some students, and it would be beneficial to be able to source some donations to assist these students. From a practical viewpoint have only needed to do this twice in the last 10 years.

Thank you again for making contact. Yeoval Central School would be delighted to be able to forge links with your club and look forward to developing opportunities to do so".

Helen mentions the Peak Hill project. This is a hands-on project where a group of members of the Belrose club make annual visits to the town, stay for a few days, and mentor the senior students in a variety of ways to prepare them for life after they leave school, including mock interviews. It does not have to provide much money. One of my grandsons and I assisted Belrose during a visit to Peak Hill a few years ago and we were most impressed with what they were doing. I have raised this matter with the Board of our club who have expressed an interest in pursuing my suggestion but would like to hear more about what help we can give.


Warren McGurgan, a former member of the Roseville Chase club, but now a member of the Belrose club, is heavily involved in the project. He will attend our meeting on the 23rd May to explain more about what is involved.

If the members of our club show interest in our assisting the Yeoval Central School I will drive to Yeoval during the next month or so and further discuss the matter with the teachers and then be more specific about my suggestion.

SPECIAL GENERAL MEETING 9th MAY 2023

Notice was given on 13 April by Arthur Marshall, Hon Secretary, of a Special General Meeting on Tuesday 9th May 2023. The purpose of this meeting is to adopt the 2022 Standard Rotary Club Constitution (NSW) and revised Club By-laws.

Copies of the 2022 Standard Rotary Constitution and draft By-laws were previously sent to members and they were discussed at the Club Forum on 14th March 2023. If you require another copy please contact Ross Symons.

Note;

BACKGROUND

District previously advised that following the 2022 Council on Legislation, legal counsel was engaged by the RI South Pacific & Philippines Office to update the Standard Club Constitution to meet the requirements of the NSW Associations Incorporation Act 2009 and the Associations Incorporation Regulation 2022. The following documents were forwarded to clubs by District;

- 2022 Rotary Standard Club Constitution (NSW)
- Bylaws template to accompany the Constitution.

Rotary Standard Club Constitution (NSW), There are 2 parts;

The first part (Articles 1 to 20) is produced by Rotary International further to the Council on Legislation.

The second part (Articles 21 to 32) has been inserted to meet the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 and the Associations Incorporation Regulation 2022. The 2022 Rotary International Standard Club Constitution, was previously circulated for information at the Club Forum on 14 March 2023, The Constitution must be adopted by the Club.

<u>Draft Bylaws</u>. Clubs were encouraged by District to adopt the Bylaws template recognizing the ability of Clubs to amend it to fit a club's needs.

The draft bylaws were also circulated for information at the Club Forum... The additions and amendment to the Bylaws template were in blue typing. Much of the existing bylaws concerning meeting procedures at, and for, both General and Board meetings, detailed duties of Officers, detailed lengthy description of some existing bylaws, have been simplified or deleted. In other cases some have been expanded for clarity, or to avoid any confusion and to reflect some of the special provisions for our club.

The draft by-laws may be amended, if necessary, at this special meeting before adoption.



Topic- "How Can it be Poetry if it Does Not Rhyme



David Atkinson is a retired lawyer and also a former Rotarian. His story is inspirational. Having read poetry from time to time over the years, he didn't find his passion and ability until he started to write in 2013. He is now one of Australia's foremost poets and is internationally acclaimed for his work.

His poems have been published widely in Australia, the USA and the UK. Among other awards, David has been the winner of the Ros Spencer Poetry Prize and of the FAW

Jean Stone Poetry Award. In addition, his poems have been Commended in the WB Yeats Poetry Prize and in the Melbourne Poets Union International Poetry Competition.

David is a poet of memory, the human condition and the natural world. He takes as his topic "How Can It Be Poetry If It Does Not Rhyme?"

VISIT TO ANZAC MEMORIAL, HYDE PARK -18 APRIL 2023.

On 18 April, nineteen Rotarians, partners and friends attended the 'Devoted Service' Performance and Tour from 5.00pm to 6.30pm. This was followed by a majority showing up for dinner at the nearby Mazzaro.

Taken to the Memorial's theatrette on arrival, we were transported by a short film into Sister Mary 'Margorie' Marr's autograph book wherein she had collected the signatures, poetry and musings of the soldiers who returned to Australia to recover from the trauma of Gallipoli.

'Devoted Service' then immersed us in four different experiences of war. The performance by Sophia, an actor with the memory of an elephant, featured actual words and personal accounts from the diaries and letters of three nurses and a matron: Clementina Marshall, Muriel Wakeford, Alice Cashin and Evelyn Wright. The courage and conviction of these women were simply remarkable. For example, Alice refused to leave the torpedoed and sinking HMHS Gloucester Castle until all her 399 injured men and 33 nurses were safely on lifeboats!

At the conclusion of the performance, Tristan, Head of Learning, took us on a tour which included the opportunity to explore the nurses' personal objects on exhibition. Besides the heritage building and its sculptures, there are medals, badges, uniforms, field equipment, photographs, documents, manuscripts, famed works and books to tell the personal stories of servicemen and servicewomen, and their families.

Go and see things for yourself if you haven't been there and if you have, you would probably want to visit the Anzac Memorial again it is vast downstairs and still has plenty of room for expansion because it is underneath the large Hyde Park!

- the sustainability aspects through an MOU with Izmir Council to supply rooms, run course as well as cover repairs and replacement of equipment; and
- Project monitoring, jointly through both our Rotary Clubs.

Enter Ian Robertson who set up IT links first to myself and then to Türkiye.

CREATING SUSTAINABLE COMMUNITIES IN SRI LANKA GLOBAL GRANT PROJECT

Some photo's & report below for our Global grant of sustainable communities in Sri Lanka. We are the International Rotary club partner on this global grant where we are building 110 toilets & 6 shower facilities. We have been invited up as a club to visit in December this year.

Greetings from Rotary club of Negombo, Sri Lanka. We are grateful to you for your generous financial contribution and guidance towards this project. We are also thankful to the members of RC Chatswood Roseville for being the International partners for this project.

As you are aware there were unexpected delays in starting the project owing to the financial crisis that our country was experiencing. We are pleased to note that we managed to start the project in Dec. 2022 after obtaining approval from TRF for revising the budget and adjusting the quantity of toilets to be built.


We have already engaged a contractor to start the construction of toilets. The contractor was given the responsibility to construct toilets in batches consisting of 10 toilets per batch. We paid 50% of the cost of building 10 toilets to the contractor to start the construction work. 45% of the amount would be paid upon them completing the 1 batch. The payments were made through our community partner "Troup Estate workers Housing Co-op Society". The Plantation Human Development Trust which is a Semi-Government trust took the responsibility to inspect the construction work. The payment would be made only after their Engineering Assistant visits the place and certifies the payment. The remaining 5% of total will be retained for 3 months as a guarantee.

The contractor has already completed the construction of 10 toilets and the construction of the next 20 toilets are in progress. We are planning to begin the Capacity building training for Public Sector Midwives from the last week of April onwards. We hope to complete the project and hand it over to the beneficiaries by Dec. 2023. We take this opportunity to invite you to Sri Lanka during the handing over in Dec. 2023.
