Co-Presidents Corner

The scheduled speaker, Emily called in sick on the day, instead we organised a 3-on-me evening and heard the life stories of John Royer, John Goddard and Ian Bittner.



John Royer was born in Quirindi NSW a son of a bank manager. His childhood was marked by regular relocations, following his father's job assignments. A memorable experience of his childhood was living in old Adaminaby, while the dam was being built. John attended Tamworth High School and later discovered that Bruce Jacob was also attending in the same years. Their paths did not cross in Tamworth, though.

John finished school in 1965, took a cadetship, and completed a bachelor's degree in production engineering then a masters degree in Engineering and Operational Research at NSW University. After graduation, he worked with Robertshaw Controls designing computer systems. John was a very early user of computer

systems when code was punched on paper tape. He later worked as a Systems Analyst with CSR Bradfield, the Bureau of Statistics and the Electoral Office.

John met his wife Rosemary in Eastwood and they were married in 1973, 41 years ago. They have two daughters and four grandchildren. John loves playing cards, lawn bowls and golf. He enjoys travelling and has been to India multiple times, Vanuatu and Tanzania. He also travelled on the Ghan and the Indian Pacific.

John has been a Rotarian for 18 years and is a Justice of the Peace.



John Goddard has a head for numbers. He worked in banking and stockbroking throughout his career. He took his first job after Newington College at CBC Bank in Riverstone, which was quite rural then with fields all around. This was precomputerisation, and all jobs were done manually.

On a quiet day, his manager asked him to clean the revolvers that were kept for emergencies. After cleaning them in the back room, John decided to test a revolver by shooting outside the window. The bang almost gave his manager a heart attack and the old bullet filled the room with smoke!

His successful career is littered with stories of innovative thinking which improved processes and brilliant timing when organisations grew and merged. He worked for

the Bank of NSW, J P Morgan and finished his career at Ord Minnett, a Wealth Management and Stockbroking firm.

John tells of a time when he flew to Tasmania to board the USS Enterprise Destroyer. It was wartime and the ship had to maintain a black out during its voyage. Little did people know at the time that the destroyer had nuclear weapons on board as it docked in Sydney.

2022 is a year of milestones for John. He recently celebrated his 85th birthday at a picnic with his beloved wife, children, grandchildren, and great grandchildren. He also celebrates 40 years in Rotary this year and served twice as President of our club in 1988/89 and 2003/04.



lan Bittner is one of three brothers born in Curramulka, Yorke Peninsula in South Australia. He grew up on a farm and was a very sporty kid at school, excelling at high jumps and hurdles. He was very handy with a knife and a gun and participated in pistol shooting competitions. A few years later, when PM John Howard introduced the gun buy-back scheme, Ian sold all his pistols and shooting equipment and made three times what it cost.

lan decided not to pursue farming as his brothers did. Instead, he went to Adelaide University to study Medical Science. He really enjoyed the topic and topped his final year. He spent his career as a Medical Pathologist, working in laboratory

environments.

lan secured a head of department role as his first job in Whyalla, SA. He married his girlfriend from university and had two children. The marriage ended when the kids where teenagers.

Working for Gribbles Pathology gave Ian the opportunity to travel overseas for work. He was their General Manager in Malaysia and Singapore. There he wised up to a world where the rule of Iaw was interpreted less rigidly. Sometime later, Ian worked in Alice Springs where he gained appreciation of the seriousness of social indigenous issues. He found out that they had a direct impact on laboratory practices, which had to be adapted to the local situation. He joined Rotary in Alice Springs in 2008.

lan currently works for NSW Health and is looking forward to retirement in a couple of years.

Joint Epping Rotary and EBHS (Epping Boys High School) East Timor Project Ends.

In 2017, Epping Rotary and the Year 7 cohort from EBHS, partnered in a wonderful project to help the Province of Oecusse in East Timor.

While Covid prevented some goals being achievable such as inter school hosting, the project has been an outstanding success. Many old EBHS computers, rugby, soccer, tennis balls, countless clothes, hats, stationery and 1000s of dollars has been raised by fundraising projects and donations and sent to the people, especially the young, to Oecusse.

Judy Charnaud, centre of picture, has been the inspiration for the project and pre Covid lived around 6 months of the year in Oecusse. Judy plans to return in June and will take 50 boxes of stationery and sporting equipment donated and packed by the cohort from EBHS.

This cohort is now in Year 12 and on May 23, Judy, representatives from the cohort, and myself spoke on a whole school assembly. The school is in the process of organising another fundraising activity to raise funds for the Oecusse youth.

Epping Rotary Through the Years.

In the lead up to our Club's 60th Anniversary here is a summary of the first decade of our great club:

The Swinging Sixties (1962-71)

When the Rotary Club of Epping was chartered in 1962, it was an integral part of an expanding suburb. New families were moving to the area, new schools such as Epping Boys High School, Cheltenham Girls High School and Epping North Public School were built for the post war baby boomers. New shops and restaurants were established. Community facilities such as the YMCA, Dence Park Swimming Pool, Scouts and Guide groups, the Poplars Hospital, and bowling and croquet club were flourishing.

On 15 June 1962, 26 community minded Epping businessmen and male residents formed the new Rotary Club of Epping under the sponsorship of the Rotary Club of Ryde. By the end of the decade there were 43 members. The Club's weekly bulletin was RIM (Rotary In Men).

The Club Presidents

The Club Presidents for those years were: Charter President Lloyd Gollan (1962-63), Ces Chambers (1963-64), Arthur Walker (1964-65), John Niccol (1965-66), Bill McPhillips (1966-67), Horrie Mendham (1967-68), Jum Land (1968-69), Bill Jennings (1969-70), and Eric Wade (1970-71).

Service projects

During those years, an ambitious program of service to the local community and beyond was established. Early projects were suppling books for patients at the Poplars Hospital, sending books to PNG, painting the Isabelle Pulsford Kindergarten in Bridge Street, establishing the annual Carols in the Park and organising outings for the elderly.

In 1964-65 Club members built the Guide Hall in Blaxland Road, and the Youth Exchange Program commenced in 1967 with a student from Canada. The Club's first two nominees attended The Rotary Youth Leadership Award (RYLA) program and the High School debates were commenced.

Other projects included a careers night at Epping Boys HS, the donation of a public address system to the Freedom From Hunger campaign, furnishing the Board Room at the YMCA, establishing an Interact Club at Epping Boys HS, and providing a piano, a refrigerator, a bus and erecting a double garage and workshop at Karonga Special School.

During the Rotary International world Convention in Sydney in 1971, Epping Rotary hosted the Tokyo Ikebukuro Rotary Club and the enduring sister club relationship was formed.


Walks are always 90 minutes (plus or minus 15) total along flat, paved surfaces. There are steps going up onto John Whitton Bridge.
