Nonetheless we had a most enjoyable evening with '3 on me' presentations by two of our most recent members and a presentation by Robert Dive from Eastwood-Gladesville.

#### Ravi Veerakathy

Ravi was born in Colombo, capital of Sri Lanka. He moved to England to study Civil Engineering at Leeds University. He then lived and worked in Singapore for about 8 years during which time 2 of his 3 children were born. His family the moved to Epping for 18 months before settling in Beecroft. His third child was born in Sydney, His children are now young adults and have all settled locally.

He has spent most of his working life in the public sector. Initially working on the railways and designing stronger columns so the tragedy of the Granville train disaster will never be repeated. He has also worked for Land Com which he enjoyed and finally for Transport NSW where he was involved with designing bridges.

Ravi is keen to be involved with Rotary projects now that he haws retired from Civil Engineering but I'm sure we will benefit a lot from his problem solving, planning and implementation skills which he has refined through his engineering background.

#### Alister Maclean

Alister discussed his early childhood in Ryde living near a dangerous intersection where his mother, previously a nurse in WW11 would need to apply her skills to support crash victims. He attended Meadowbank Primary School and later EBHS and had an adventurous spirit from early on; loving a scooter ride from Hornsby heights down to the Cumberland plateau and running up hills thus being mistaken for being a thief. He lived in London for 19 months and used it as a base to travel widely across Europe, often under difficult conditions.

He is married and has 3 sons. His eldest son studied Chemistry and Environmental Science and has a senior position testing for lead contamination in soils, asbestos etc. His second son is a cameraman for Sky News and travels widely covering both our federal election as well as elections in USA. Finally, he has Cameron our local alderman in Parramatta Council who has achieved amazing feats in running despite his visual impairment.

Alister is passionate about bush regeneration which he has done unofficially sine 1994 and officially for the past 20 years. He has seen great improvement in the area around Epping pool leading to sightings of 6 wallabies and a 2 metre black snake amongst other native fauna. He is also very active in the local scouting group.

He has a bachelor of Commerce and Business Law from Curtin University and worked as a senior design technician in Water Infrastructure. He believes in the concept of:

'The first 20 years we are nurtured,

the second 20 years we develop our career,

the next 20 years we give back to the community.'

### Presentation by Robert Dive from Eastwood - Gladesville Rotary

Robert gave us an inspiring presentation about the fund-raising activities of their 13 member club, 6 of whom came to visit our club.

They raised \$8,000 from a wine tasting held at Pennant Hills Golf Club with the wines presented by Mistletoe Wineries from the Hunter Valley. 

I began this newsletter, in August, on a very positive note - I have booked my return trip to Timor Leste, flying through to Dili on 29<sup>th</sup> August, – assuming things will go much better this time around! So far so good as I managed to use some frequent flyer points for the trip up so only cost \$135 including carbon offset! My bag is basically packed as I did not unpack much of it when I arrived home after the aborted last trip so ready to go!

GREENTL has so much planned that we will certainly be hitting the ground running – building the housing for the composting toilet, two fish farms and of course the *Youth-in-Action* GREEN Games. Looks as though we will have over 25 soccer teams so add volleyball, basketball and a marathon to that and the Games will be BIG! This of course is a problem – a good one but still a problem. The more teams we accept the more the games cost due to the extra time involved – extra games for the referees, more fuel costs, (fuel is \$US1.87, \$Aus2.85, a litre in Timor Leste now), hundreds more water bottles and so on.



#### From a parent:

Whilst I was always a big supporter of the Riding for the Disabled program and thrilled that my child was able to attend, I have been impressed by the profound impact it has had on my child – and its only week 4!! I was nervous on Week 1, I thought he would be either rigid with fear when near a horse or refusing to go beyond patting one. However, first photo – here he is, riding, and a smile from ear to ear!! From there, it has grown a life of its own. For the first time in his primary school years, he comes home from school and can't wait to tell me (in his words) about "riding the ponies". His favorite pony is "his friend" and he loves him. He tells me what he looks like, how a pony talks and we have "pony day" on the calendar and we are now counting sleeps between sessions. The horse riding is developing his conversation at a whole new level, it's a chat that goes beyond functional yes/no. It is also helping him to have real texture in a weekly structure - in that we know we wait until his riding day and how long until his next ride. The horse riding is also helping his regulation, he is calmer since he started riding and the excitement of it gives him so much joy that is helps with the waiting between the sessions.

The value of a therapy animal cannot be underestimated. I know we hear about it often, but I am now seeing it action.
