The President's Year in Review - Sandeep Rathi 2022-2023

Collaboration – Community Spirit – Championing our Youth.

It has been a privilege and an honour to serve as the President of our Club. Chartered on 5th June 1978, our Club has been in service for 45 years. As I reflect on what we have done during this year, it is very clear that even though we are small in numbers, we have passionate and enthusiastic members who work together to accomplish a lot.

While COVID refused to go away completely in the early part of the Rotary year, we managed to revert to most of our activities. The past 12 months have been about: **Collaboration** – joining hands with other Rotary Clubs to achieve more; **Community Spirit** – encouraging and celebrating the coming together of people and **Championing our Youth** - empowering youth and young professionals.

Like most Rotary Clubs, we started our year with a planning session in July to set goals for the coming year. It highlighted the need to start early with planning various activities. We have continued to utilise a portion of the Club Assembly sessions to discuss and plan future-activities.

Following a discussion forum, we agreed to support the **Uluru Statement from the Heart**, placing it on our website, on our Facebook page, in our newsletter and in our correspondence. We want our support to be real and we continue to look at actively supporting projects that involve the Aboriginal community. Through Secretary Bob Selinger, we are making efforts at a District level to involve more Rotary Clubs.

One of the suggestions for improvement from our Member Satisfaction Survey was creating opportunities for social and professional networking. Looking to find fresh ways to connect, the first multi-Club meeting of the **Riverside Rotary Clubs** – North Ryde, Macquarie Park, Ryde, Hunters Hill and Eastwood-Gladesville was held in February 2023. It was a fantastic night attended by nearly 60 Rotarians and friends of Rotary. We heard from all the Clubs and celebrated Rotary's 118th Birthday. It was an excellent start to better connection between the Clubs and an opportunity to become involved in something greater.

Utilising a District Grant, **the Ripple Effects Photo Contest** with the theme "Celebrating & Protecting the Natural Environment in Australia" ran from August to October involving students in years K-12. It was wonderful that through the efforts of our Past President Shankar Sankaran and his colleagues at the University of Technology Sydney, we could join together with the Rotary Club of Currumbin Coolangatta Tweed to support this worthwhile endeavour.

In December, the 2022 **Rotary Carols on the Common** returned to the North Ryde Common after 2 years. What a remarkable turnout it was, confirming that it is an outstanding community event enjoyed by everyone. We worked very well alongside the Rotary Club of Macquarie Park - thank you to everyone who was involved in planning and organizing in the months leading up to the event as well as those helping on the day.

We continued to hold meetings of the Presidents of the Riverside cluster Clubs, chaired by Assistant Governor Bruce Jacob. These meetings are intended to help us learn about what other Rotary Clubs in our area are doing and share experiences and learning.

We participated in the **Community Needs Assessment** event organised by the Rotary Club of Ryde. There was a lot of good discussion around various community needs and we hope to work with other Rotary Clubs in the Ryde area to understand how our Club can get involved.

In September, we had the pleasure of **Ross Johnson from the E-Club of Greater Sydney** joining us for our meeting. Providing opportunities for members of Clubs that meet virtually to engage with other Clubs in-person is a wonderful way to connect Clubs in our District and foster collaboration. Help and support provided by the E-Club of Greater Sydney for our projects was greatly appreciated.

Once again, we supported the **Books in Homes Project** at Moree East Public School by selling Christmas puddings. This fundraiser was run in association with several other Rotary Clubs and has raised more than \$2,000 for the project.

The **North Ryde eFun Run** was a fantastic fundraising activity to support a very worthy cause – Youth Mental Health. The event was kicked off with a walk along the Putney foreshore and concluded with a walk across 7 of our beautiful bridges in Sydney. Throughout the week-long event, the fundraisers were busy walking, running and exercising to achieve their goals.

Bunnings BBQs have been an important fundraiser for our Club and we held 6 of them during the year. A huge thank you to our members, past and present and other volunteers who helped us. A special thank you to **Garry Maloney** who takes on the responsibility of organizing them every couple of months – coordinating all the volunteers and supplies, allocating tasks and responsibilities and then being there on the day from the start to the end.

Our Club meetings are made more interesting through an excellent mix of internal and external guest speakers. This is all due to the efforts of **Past President Rob Wilkinson**.

As a Club we believe in having fun while doing good in the community. We continued to organize social events throughout the year to promote fellowship. Post COVID, it has been all the more important to encourage the community spirit and bring back people to events.

Our work in the community continued during the year. **The Rotary Spring Fair** was held in October at the St John's North Ryde Anglican Church. It was wonderful to experience the community spirit among the people who attended the fair.

The **North Ryde Community Aid Seniors Christmas Lunch** was held in December at the North Ryde Golf Club. This event, which our Club has been associated with for a number of years, is much appreciated by the elderly folks of North Ryde community.

The **Tree of Joy** at Cox's Road Mall again spread a lot of cheer in our community thanks to **Pam Wood** and her group of helpers. A huge number of gifts were collected and distributed. Special thanks to **Bendigo Bank North Ryde** who is a major supporter of this activity.

We were delighted to welcome **Queenie Seto** as a new member of the Club. It is always a wonderful experience to bring new members into the fold. Knee replacements were the flavour of the year, with 3 of our members - Brian, Victoria and Shankar – undergoing knee replacement. They were able to provide each other a lot of support and advice.

Earlier in the year, our Club said YES to the **Regionalisation Pilot**. It is a unique opportunity to work together to develop, test and evaluate a new model of governance that best suits our region. Club autonomy and the provision of better support to Clubs are fundamental principles that underpin the pilot.

We continued to perform well in youth activities. While the Youth Exchange program will commence later in the year, we have been involved in supporting youth leadership programs – RYLA (Rotary Youth Leadership Award) and RYPEN (Rotary Youth Program for Enrichment). It is always pleasing to see young people commit themselves to their own development.

After a hiatus of 3 years, we were able to hold the **IT Tour for Country Students** (DIGIT week) through the tireless efforts of-**Past President David Martin**. 7 students from the towns of Forbes, Inverell, Ashford and Warialda were taken around to organisations such as **Cochlear**, **Oracle**, **Coles**, **Cisco**, **IBM**, **Google**, **UTS**, **Macquarie University and Konica Minolta**. It was a fun and experiential week for them. The **Rotary Club of Epping** was a valuable partner in helping us host the students.

None of these achievements would have been possible without the unwavering dedication and commitment of our members. Each Rotarian has played a crucial role, contributing their time, skills, and resources to make a positive impact in our community. It is this collective effort and passion for service that sets us apart and makes our Club a force for good.

I thank everyone in the Club for their commitment, energy and contribution towards making a difference.

Community Service - Mandy Van

With the easing of Covid19 restrictions over the past 12 months, the Club has been able to resume most of the Community service projects we usually undertake and take on a few more.

The Club has continued our regular bi-monthly BBQs at Bunnings Gladesville. This has helped provide a fundraising stream for Club projects, as well as raising our profile in the community. We have a team of up to 8 or 9 members and friends who help throughout the day and make the day enjoyable for all involved.

We are very appreciative of the ongoing support from Bunnings Gladesville, Bush's Meats Gladesville, Ritchies IGA, Cox's Road Fruit Market and Officeworks North Ryde.

We held a **Bunnings BBQ** fundraiser for Riding for Disabled Ryde Centre in October. This was a very successful event with supporters and volunteers from RDA assisting at the BBQ. Funds raised from the BBQ provided \$2,000 for Riding for the Disabled Ryde Centre at Marsfield to assist with care of the horses.

We held a BBQ and Spring Fair car boot sale at St John's Anglican Church, Cox's Road on 15 October 2022 organised by Rev John Chappell for the Spring Fair.

The Club continued to provide a donation of \$500 to each of the 6 local Primary schools and \$1,000 to Ryde Secondary School to support programs for the students.

Principals and school representatives of local Primary and Secondary schools are traditionally invited to a Club meeting. We missed the opportunity this year to hear from the Primary schools: Smalls Road, Truscott Street, Kent Road, North Ryde, Ryde East, and Holy Spirit as well as Ryde Secondary College. Hopefully we will have an opportunity to meet with them in the near future.

It was a privilege to be involved with UTS along with the University of Louisville, USA and the Rotary Club of Currumbin Coolangatta Tweed in the **Ripple Effects photography competition** this year. Students from K-12 were invited to share a photograph that reflected how they felt about the natural world around them and to submit the photo with a short 100–250 word reflective write-up. Prizes were awarded for the best photographs for different age categories at a special Award Ceremony on 26 October 2022.



We provide an annual scholarship of \$1,000 to a selected student from Dunmore Lang College to help cover their educational expenses for the year. We also continue our sponsorship of a student through the Smith Family Learning for Life Program.

We continued to work with the Rotary Club of Macquarie Park on planning the Carols on the Common. This year, the Carols returned to North

Rvde Common on Sundav18 December 2022 along with the



much-anticipated fireworks finale. The event was well supported and appreciated by the community. The Annual Rotary Carols are supported and sponsored by

local community members, groups and businesses, the City of Ryde Council and State and Federal Members of Parliament. Stephen Sim was MC for the event and Roseanna Gallo organised and lead the performances. This year each Club raised \$6,900 to go towards our annual giving programs through the Carols. From total funds raised \$500 each was donated to St John's Ambulance, Ryde SES and Warringah Headquarters SES.

Throughout November and December, we set up the Tree of Joy at Cox's Road Mall. Donations and gifts from the Tree of Joy were donated to North Ryde Community Aid - Presbyterian Aged Care, St Vincent De Paul, Macquarie Hospital and New Horizons Aged Care. The community was again very generous with their donations with approximately 2000 gifts donated.



Bendigo Bank donated **\$1,000** towards the purchase of gifts for **Macquarie Hospital** and **New Horizons Aged Care**. Cox's Road Mall Management provided support for the collection and storage for the gifts as they came in.

Our thanks again to Reverend John Chappell who provided storage at St John's Anglican Church

hall. Businesses in the Mall also provided support for the Tree of Joy including Ritchies IGA North Ryde Grocery, North Ryde Pharmacy and Café SaBu. On Thursday 8 December the Club sponsored the annual Christmas Party for the clients of North Ryde Community Aid – Presbyterian Aged Care. The Club received a \$2,500 Community grant from Ryde Council which helped cover the cost of food, drink and transport for their clients. The event was held at North Ryde Golf Club.

We continued the **GroTrees project** and the **X'mas pudding drive** that Bob Selinger introduced to our Club in 2021-22. The Xmas pudding drive was undertaken with 5 other Rotary Clubs to raise funds to provide Books in Homes for Moree East Public School. This year the project raised **\$13,389.78** including two District grants and generous top ups from two of the Clubs organising a Trivia night, recipe book sales and a raffle.

The North Ryde Fun Run for Youth Mental Health was virtual, once again, this year. The eFun Run was held in partnership with



Macquarie University's Centre for Emotional Health. It was held over a week from 30 April until 7 May 2023.

This year the **eFun Run** raised approximately **\$13,000** through direct sponsorship of participants by their friends, families and colleagues, as well as corporate sponsorship from local business including Bendigo Bank North Ryde, North Ryde RSL, Sydney Sports Management and Konica Minolta. Rob Wilkinson and Sandeep Rathi were outstanding rivals in getting sponsorships!

Funds will be distributed between **Australian Rotary Health**, receiving **\$8,000** and the **Centre for Emotional Health**, receiving **\$4,000**. Funds will also be set aside to sponsor a candidate for the RYLA and RYPEN programs in 2024.

The Rotary Club of North Ryde runs an annual tour, in May, of local information technology based companies for students from Country NSW. We have been running the program for more than 20 years.



We work with Rotary Clubs in West Wyalong, Temora, Forbes and Inverell to source suitable students from year 10 at their local high schools. We take up to 8 students each year. The students travel down to Sydney on the Sunday and are then hosted by Rotarians through to Friday morning when they return home.

Rotarians take the students on a series of visits to information technology (IT) based companies such as IBM, Oracle, Cisco and Google and other major companies which use IT in their businesses such as Coles, Optus, Cochlear and Konica Minolta. They also see how IT is used within the Universities of UTS and Macquarie.

The objective is to provide the students with an insight into not only how IT is used in the workplace but what job opportunities are available to them after school.

After a hiatus of 3 years, we were able to hold the IT Tour for Country Students (DIGIT week) through the tireless efforts of our Past President David Martin. This year we had a total of 7 students: 3 students from Forbes, 2 from Inverell, 1 from Ashford and 1 from Warialda. It was a fun and experiential week for them. The Rotary Club of Epping was a valuable partner in helping us host the students.







We received great feedback from the students. Jack Dekkers, a student from Inverell, expressed his satisfaction with the tour, stating, "I really enjoyed it and would

recommend it to future students. It was great to have a mix of sightseeing and going to businesses." Chase Moses, one of the Forbes students, described the tour as an "amazing experience to get insight into complex processes." "I thought the tour was very good. A key takeaway was that there are many opportunities for IT jobs in the city. It was also good to see how the IT principles that I had been playing around with, are applied in the real world" reflected James Paton, another student from Inverell.




The Shelter Box is sent to areas where homes


