### CHARLIE ARRIVES

It was the first time Mike Hetherington and his wife Maggie had greeted a ROMAC in-coming patient at Brisbane International Terminal. described how they were waiting for Charlie with a badly deformed club foot, and his mother Rachel, to arrive from Vanuatu, in transit to Adelaide where Charlie would receive surgery to change his life.

Mike said: "We thought about how it would be their first time on an aircraft and in a foreign country. Would they be unsure, tentative, shy? Sure enough, after almost everyone else had emerged, they appeared hesitantly, with Charlie dragging his foot but wearing the biggest smile. They were carrying just one small suitcase between them.

Quickly negotiating the shuttle to the Domestic Terminal and having dropped the bag off, we faced the security screen. Charlie's leg attracted attention and he was called aside to be frisked. It was just as well that I was too, otherwise Charlie may have thought he was being singled out.

The biggest challenge, however, proved to be the escalators. Both Charlie and his mother froze at the bottom and could not bring themselves to place their feet on the moving stairs. After minutes deciding when was the right time to move, they managed their first ride. We take these things for granted but escalators will be just one of the strange things they will be confronted with in Australia.

Their nervousness also extended to walking down the jet bridge to their Adelaide-bound plane and they asked if we could come too. We reassured them that everything would be OK as they disappeared down the corridor that had no obvious end. Their miracle will come in Adelaide."

TAISHA'S JOURNEY

After a long journey, 2-year-old Taisha and her mum Lily arrived in Sydney from Port Vila, Vanuatu. Their trip is part of a life-changing medical mission to repair Tasha's frontal encephalocele, a rare congenital condition. It is made possible through the collective efforts of ROMAC volunteers and dedicated Rotarians.

Arriving in Brisbane, Rotarian Judy Holland met them at the International Terminal and quickly facilitated their transfer to a domestic flight to Sydney. There, Taisha and Lily were greeted by ROMAC Eastern Chair Anita Robinson and D9675 ROMAC Chair Jenny Connal.

Taisha and Lily have been staying with Anita for the past week while attending preoperative medical appointments. The Rotary Club of Parramatta in D9675 has continued its ongoing support for ROMAC, with members such as Maggie Thorn assisting with appointments, and PP Graham Cook and Marilyn, and Rotarian Malcolm Brown and Inge, kindly offering home hosting and other support.

Taisha underwent surgery on 27 September in the skilled hands of Neurosurgeon Dr Gemma Olsson, Plastic Surgeon Dr Damian Marucci, a Specialist Paediatric Anaesthetist and a complete medical team at the Children's Hospital at Westmead.

This journey highlights the incredible impact of compassion, teamwork and collaboration. Thanks to ROMAC, dedicated medical professionals and the unwavering support of Rotarians, Taisha has been given a chance to have a brighter future. We are confident of a successful outcome and we appreciate the kindness and generosity of everyone involved in making this journey possible.

#### CASTRO'S STORY

Castro, from the Solomon Islands, is a teenage boy with nasopharyngeal angiofibroma, a rare tumour within the nasal cavity found almost exclusively in adolescent males.

Scheduled for surgery in Australia in early September, Castro's condition declined before his departure on 25 August. But Dr Ella Malatugu travelled from Honiara with Castro and his dad Alfred to ensure Castro's safe arrival in Adelaide, where he was admitted to the Women's & Children's Hospital for treatment. After successful surgery, Castro returned home a month later.

The ROMAC Southern Regional Committee is celebrating the return home to Vanuatu of Elina Napuram, a 5-year-old girl with a club foot turned 180 degrees, and her mum Enneth, after 3 months of treatment in Melbourne.

It was a long and cold period for both of them to be away from an island village that they had never left before. But it was well worth the endurance because Elina went home with her previously distorted foot now straight, like her other one.



#### KRISSELDA UPDATE

Krisselda, a 9-year-old Papua New Guinea girl who arrived in Canberra in March, has been having multiple surgeries at the Canberra Hospital for caudal duplication syndrome, a very rare genetic condition in which internal systems are duplicated.

Krisselda is making good progress with her medical issues under the care of A/Prof Celine Hamid and A/Prof David Croaker.

Apart from regular outpatient checkups, Krisselda only requires one more major surgery to close her stoma with the wonderful surgical team, Celine and David, with Anaesthesia Consultant Simon Robertson.

Krisselda's final surgery is planned for 17 October and will require another 4 weeks post-surgery and checkups before she, and her mother Sonia, will be able to return home to PNG. In the meantime, they are staying with Rotarian Gordana, and Krisselda is attending Gold Creek School in between surgery and outpatient appointments.
