Christa Silvia from the SEAT Project gave us an interesting discussion on her project, which stands for Sustainability, Education, Art and Teamwork. The history of the project began when a young University of NSW student was told to create something useful. Christa showed us the result – a bamboo stool made without nails just dowels which can be dismantled and which contains a hidden compartment.

The Project now manufactures the stools in Vietnam and they are sold in kit form along with an inspirational children's book. Teams of three pupils assemble the stools in class under instruction from their teacher who is provided with a lesson plan. The money raised supports the Vietnamese stool makers. As the name of the Project describes, each team learns teamwork, is educated in an artistic way while working on a sustainable project.

Christa spoke inspirationally and enthusiastically and it just shows that from little things big things grow.
