

ROTARY CLUB OF NORTH SYDNEY OUTWARD BOUND EXCHANGE STUDENT AND RECENT ROTORACT GRADUATE REPORT ON THE 2017 ROTORACT SAILING CRUISE OF THE DALMATION COAST

Sitting at a corner table in an outdoor café in Dubrovnik, Croatia, I take in the scenery. I am wedged in a narrow alley between a 400-year-old Cathedral and a baroque style apartment block with green venetian shutters. Under my feet, the large flagstones are worn smooth by thousands of feet tramping up and down, stunning in the reflective sunshine and relatively lethal in the rain. The live gypsy swing band has the entire streetscape humming and tapping along to the music. Like the people around me I am smiling at the magical moment, and it is the perfect setting to reflect on the massive adventure I just returned from.

Many of you reading this may have already been privileged enough to explore Croatia for yourselves, and know of its undeniable utter beauty and rich cultural history, and it would be difficult to adequately describe it to those of you who are yet to tick it of your travel list. Therefore, I believe that it will be of more interest for me to share some honest musings from my trip rather than just to re-write a tourist agency's brochure on "5 Reasons You Must Visit Croatia". However, this may end up being one and the same, I'll let you be the judge.



Now for some context. While Dubrovnik is clearly stunning, my original purpose for being in Croatia was to attend the 2017 Roteract European Sailing Trip (REST), held along the Dalmatian coast and run by Roteract club Ljubljana. Having recently joined the Northern Beaches Roteract club off the back of my enriching RYLA experience, I found out about the Roteract trips and set my heart on joining the sailing adventure before beginning my exchange in the nearby Czech Republic. The trip itself was in its 5th year, and consisted of a fleet of 10 Hansa 554 yachts containing 90 international sailors from predominately mainland Europe, 10 skippers, 7 nights and several picturesque destinations. We started and ended the trip at Split, and visited the islands of Brač, Vis and Hvar. In order, each of them are uniquely known for the Roman imperial palace of Diocletian, medieval monasteries, ex-Yugoslavian secret military complexes and stunning British and Austrian fortress towns.



Like all Rotary and Roteract events I have attending, I left with a handful of lifelong connections forged, plenty of postcard worthy photographs, and a greater understanding of local and regional history and culture. Therefore, I shall try to present more of a critical assessment of the environment I was able to immerse myself in.

Having now being a Rotary International exchange student, a RYLA participant, a Roteract European Meeting (REM) conference attendee and REST sailor, I have noticed a common trend across all of these experiences, which is increasingly reinforced. In my experience, individuals who are drawn to pro-social, community-oriented, cross-cultural organisations such a Rotary and Roteract, tend to have similar characteristics and moral principals that gravitate around the inherent values of the organisations. They are open-minded, curious, altruistic, mindful and generous beings irrelevant of their background, and it is predominantly this prevalence of like-minded and -valued people that keeps driving to continue my connection with the organisations.

I am really looking forward to benefiting from some of these forged friendships when I start my semester-long university exchange in Prague next week, and can visit both old and new Rotary and Roteract connections on my free weekends, who share this. However, for the first time attending any event, this set of values was not entirely reflected in everyone involved. Interestingly, it became quite clear that there was something of a divide within the overall sailing group, but not one defined by geography or nationality, rather one based on values. Many in the group, largely not Rotary or Roteract affiliated, were revved up to enjoy a week of non-stop partying and this created a level of disengagement within the overall group. I suppose the blatant commercialisation and marketing of European coastal sailing trips as a Contiki extravaganza is to be expected, as who doesn't want to enjoy themselves on sapphire seas with others, but I had hoped that this trip would be different.

This may have been naive of me, and I felt determined not to have to justify my intent on making memories that I would remember in the morning and exploring the physical and cultural landscape of each destination. However, this unexpected situation provided me with a unique opportunity and there were many positives to come out of this 'creative abrasion'. It helped to reaffirm my values, practice inter-cultural negotiation and conflict resolution, and prove to myself that I can make truly top-notch burritos for a boat load of hungover people while in a kitchen that is rocking about 30 degrees in either direction. Additionally, the revellers regular loud returns from their night of

partying ensure that I woke up to see more sunsets that I believe I have ever seen in my entire life, and each one was uniquely and unforgettably spectacular.



It was not only sunrises that blew me away, but also the Mediterranean sunrises, which could often be clearly visible from horizon to horizon, and reflected on the lime-washed buildings and calm ocean in the brightest technicolour. I attempted to even try and paint a few but could never quite capture their phenomenal brilliance. This overwhelming chaos of colour was a common feature across the whole trip, and to be found in many of the natural and architectural structures of the locations we visited.

In the towns, the green wooden Venetian-style shutters on the white sandstone buildings, with their red terracotta rooves, and lines of vibrant laundry arching the narrow alleyways was dreamlike and almost fantastical. It felt like walking through a movie set of a town almost, but the almost cartoon nature of the cities was balances by the gravitas of its natural back drop. For example, there was something that felt larger-than-life and almost sacred about floating in the permanently royal blue Adriatic and watching the imposing grey-blue mountains crest along the coastline.

In fact, upon reflection I realised that I have never experienced these two contrasting environments in the same moment. In my mind, drawn in kindergarten-esque scribbles, the ocean and mountains were on opposite sides of what nature could look like, as it was never a feature of my NSW/ACT, Germany or England based life experience. It was such a simple and easily accommodated moment of cognitive dissonance, but it highlighted to me how much I still took for granted and the value of challenging and expanding my worldview.

Opportunities like this, often provided through Rotary and Roteract, have had an immense impact on helping me build the skills I need to improve and evolve the way I relate to myself, other people and the world around me. It is easy to get overwhelmed and want to shrink from the craziness of the diverse and dynamic world we live in, especially if you dare to leave the house, let alone your hemisphere. However, as a direct result, I find I am increasingly capable of making the most of the situation, regardless of how left-field it may be, and that is something worth toasting. So, '*živielli*' to those of you still reading, for I am off to finish my beer and see what the afternoon has in store for me.
