Guest Speaker for Meeting 20th September

Tony Kirwan founded the organisation Destiny Rescue, soon after visiting Thailand in 1998 and seeing the conditions of many of the children there. Since that time over 3200 children have been saved from being trapped in the sex trade by Destiny Rescue.

Our speaker, Damian May, explained how he had worked for the organisation for many years, mainly in underground activities, identifying the criminals and bringing them to justice. This is done by either pretending to be a customer at the brothels and bars, building evidence at the site and notifying authorities. Because many of the local authorities are often corrupt, a second method, a soft option, is to attract the victims to leave the pornographic premises and spirit them away to a safe house.

Many of the young people are still children, often from backward and poor families from hill-tribes or even foreign citizens. Human trafficking of children under 18 is illegal internationally but widespread in the area. Destiny Rescue works in Cambodia, Laos, Thailand, the Philippines, India and even the Dominican Republic in the Caribbean. 80% of the children saved leave the sex business, with only 12% returning, a high ratio. Damien showed a brief video of the underground work which starkly demonstrated the conditions under which he worked.

Financial assistance was noted as an important factor in keeping up the very important work with the main donors to the programme coming from the United States, New Zealand and Australia.

An extremely poignant presentation on a subject that is too often not addressed.

"DONATELIFE" ORGAN AND TISSUE DONATION MEETING ON TUESDAY 23 OCTOBER 2018 Guest Speaker - Professor Philip O'Connell

On 23 October 2018, our Club is very fortunate to have **Professor Philip O'Connell** as our Guest Speaker. Professor O'Connell is an international expert on organ transplant research and on the critical need for registration of organ and tissue donations. **More than 1,500 Australians are at this moment awaiting transplant treatment.**

This is an ideal opportunity for Rotarians, their families and friends to hear what they need to know about making a decision that may help save more lives.

Professor O'Connell is a Professor of Medicine at the University of Sydney, Director of Transplantation at Westmead Hospital and a founding Director of the Centre for Transplant and Renal Research at the Westmead Institute of Medical Research.

Professor O'Connell is a Past President of the international professional body, The Transplantation Society, and was a guest speaker at the Rotary International Convention in Seoul in May 2016.

He was a member of the Australian Government Organ Donor Task Force that recommended the establishment of the Australian Organ and Tissue Authority to oversee organ donation in Australia. He is committed to the establishment of ethical solutions to the world wide organ shortage.
