Guest Speaker for Meeting 11th October

Dr Richard Gray is a mathematical epidemiologist and Senior Research Fellow at the Kirby Institute which is part of the Faculty of Medicine at UNSW Sydney. His research focuses on using mathematical models to investigate the transmission of infectious diseases (primarily HIV, viral hepatitis and other sexually transmitted infections) for national surveillance and to assess the effectiveness of public health interventions. He told us all about his background, growing up in Tumbarumba, an only child on an isolated farm. Although he was dux of Tumbarumba High School, he was not very academically inclined in those days and even took a year off university to work in Geoff Pritchard's vineyard, after which he went back to uni and completed a Master's degree and a PhD.

Since then he has worked closely with national and state/territory departments of health in Australia and collaborated with the World Bank, the Global Fund, and UNAIDS. He has travelled the world developing health policy including Australia, Papua New Guinea, South-East Asia, Eastern Europe, Central Asia, and Southern Africa. It seems hard to imagine such a laid back guy dealing with heads of government all over the world. A brilliant career started in a humble way in Tumbarumba.

"DONATELIFE" ORGAN AND TISSUE DONATION MEETING ON TUESDAY 23 OCTOBER 2018 Guest Speaker - Professor Philip O'Connell

On 23 October 2018, our Club is very fortunate to have Professor Philip O'Connell as our Guest Speaker. Professor O'Connell is an international expert on organ transplant research and on the critical need for registration of organ and tissue donations. More than 1,500 Australians are at this moment awaiting transplant treatment.

This is an ideal opportunity for Rotarians, their families and friends to hear what they need to know about making a decision that may help save more lives.

Professor O'Connell is a Professor of Medicine at the University of Sydney, Director of Transplantation at Westmead Hospital and a founding Director of the Centre for Transplant and Renal Research at the Westmead Institute of Medical Research.

Professor O'Connell is a Past President of the international professional body, The Transplantation Society, and was a guest speaker at the Rotary International Convention in Seoul in May 2016.

He was a member of the Australian Government Organ Donor Task Force that recommended the establishment of the Australian Organ and Tissue Authority to oversee organ donation in Australia. He is committed to the establishment of ethical solutions to the world wide organ shortage.

A Spanish Teacher was explaining to her class that in Spanish, unlike English, nouns are designated as either masculine or feminine.
