## Doug's World ?

My early childhood was anything but normal. I was born in Charters Towers a gold town in North Queensland. I lived there for my first year and then moved to Townsville with my mother to live with my grandparents. My father joined the army and was in New Guinea. Dad was discharged as medically unfit late in 1944. He was offered a position in Chinchilla as Secretary/Manager of the Chinchilla Dairy Association which he accepted. He had to make many trips to Greenslopes Repatriation Hospital for the next couple of years . I lived with good family friends on these occasions and am still best of friends with their children.

In spite of this I enjoyed an interesting boyhood. I always mention I would have been more familiar with the life of Tom Sawyer than that of boys of today. was educated at Chinchilla State School and then boarded at Too-woomba Grammar School.

I wanted to do engineering but my father accepted an offer from the local pharmacist to become his apprentice pharmacist. I was not happy but agreed. The last year was spent in Brisbane at the pharmacy college after working 2 years in the pharmacy. I completed my final examinations and worked in Brisbane for a time. I was offered a partnership in Chinchilla and returned to take up this offer. Later I took over a pharmacy in Theodore (near Rockhampton). I also opened a commercial laundry in Chinchilla. I did this to help educate my 4 children. I am pleased to say they have all been very successful in their fields. In 1986 I sold off my business enterprises. I stayed on in Chinchilla for a time before taking a short term position in Kakadu. This was a very interesting time but too far from my family. I returned to Dalby and took over the Friendly Societies dispensary and retirement village for 12 years. In the meantime I reunited with Anne at a conference managed by Geoff Pritchard. The rest you know.

I have enjoyed 3 different memberships in Rotary. I was a member of Chinchilla Rotary from 1983 until 1987. I the joined Dalby Rotary Club from 1990 until 2001. On coming to Sydney Anne urged me to join North Sydney in 2002.

In my younger days I played golf and squash. However as I matured I spent a weeks fishing on the barrier reef over a number of years. I also joined friends on inland fishing trips eg a trip down the Diamentina River. My other interest was flying. I flew mainly Cessna and Piper aircraft. I feel the Piper is much easier to fly than a Cessna.

Rotary has changed over the years. We are all ageing and need to introduce more younger members. Outer suburban and country areas seem to be in a better position to do this. Changing demographics affect our abilities to encourage members in these areas to join. A major change occurred while I was in Dalby. Women were inducted into Rotary and this was a saviour. We had many more social interactions in the country but this was far easier to do. it may be worth investigating however after COVID. We also had an occasional dinner where we would invite selected possible members. I can see Toni has some positive thoughts.
