Our annual Golf Day dawned with the continuing drizzling rain of the previous few days. Nevertheless Jack Reid was observed watering his garden. Players began to check in from 7 o'clock. Some did not present because of the drizzle and some, having turned up, were disappointed to learn that the Golf Club would not be making carts available. By 8:15, registration was complete and the players donned their rain jackets and set off. Behind the scenes the arrangements for registering players, lunch, and the auction had been organized by Pam Hudson.

Players began to drift in from the links after 1 pm and lunch was served. After the lunch, our MC, Jim Fraser, explained that this 14th Golf Day would support research into PKU and then introduced Andrew MacDonald from the PKU Association. Andrew gave the golfers an overview of phenylketonuria. The presence of the disorder can be detected in an infant at birth from a pin prick of blood from the heel. Broadly the child cannot process the usual intake of protein and failure to consume a diet with 5 gm of protein or less each day will lead to brain damage. The disorder arises from the liver missing one enzyme causing poor brain development. The very strict diet of low protein and some supplements is necessary throughout life. Andrew went on to cover the research now in progress at the Westmead Children's Hospital and Sydney University, explaining that our Rotary Club has been supporting some of this research through our Golf Days. At the Children's Hospital researchers are aiming at a probiotic drink that will permit the body to process more protein. This would allow a more enjoyable dietary routine. At Sydney University a researcher is reviewing the usefulness of existing drugs and has found some to be promising.

Auctioneer Ben Read from Lumby and Hanson Real Estate took the floor, explaining his role was to extract cash from the golfers. The first item on offer was a helmet signed by now retired motor cyclist Casey Stoner, twice MotoGP World Champion. Bidding opened at \$200 and the helmet went for \$325. Ben then offered a smart little bar fridge and opened the bidding at \$200. The fridge went for \$250. A collection of shiraz and bubbles was on offer next and Ben opened bidding at \$200. This lot went out at \$525. For those too idle to mix their own cocktails was the cocktail party mix – just add your gin to a bottle containing flakes of something would give you a Singapore Sling. Bidding opened at \$100 and fetched \$360. Next was the Scotch basket – six bottles of the very best from Scotland and the Isles. This lot opened at \$200 and fetched \$600.

The auction completed, Jim took the floor to cover prizes for good golfing. There was a prize for the straightest drive on the 10th fairway for men and women. These went to John Baistow and Sue Stevenson. At the 4th hole was the prize for the shot nearest the pin and this went to David Elliott. The highest score in the single Stableford went to James Spaul. Mark Geldens was runner up. The Women's Stableford high score went to Sue Stevenson and Jenny Cross was the runner up. The Ambrose round went to Des Ong, Andrew Walters and Shayne Evans. Jim then asked Julie MacDonald to draw lottery tickets. There were prizes of gift vouchers, kitchen knives, fruit trays and bubbles. **Editors Note John failed to win a prize.**

The gathering closed with President David Firth thanking all players who went out despite the inclement weather. David thanked our sponsors, Mazars, Steve Watt Constructions, West Pennant Hills Sports Club, Grindley, Stanton Dahl Architects, Lumby Hampson Real Estate, CSI Constructions, Toongabbie Early Learning Centre and Accolade Wines. David mentioned that the Golf Club had considered calling the day off because of recent weather, nevertheless David did thank the staff for a splendid lunch and facilities.
