MEETING REPORT

President David Firth opened the meeting and welcomed Herbert Chan, formerly a member of the RC of Chatswood Sunrise and now a resident of Pennant Hills.

Kaye Carter had arranged for Louise McCann to speak to us on the Hornsby Women's Shelter, however, at short notice, she was not able to join us.

President David then recounted the Pride of Workmanship award on Friday 27 November at the Cherrybrook Christian Care Centre where the commitment of Sharon Sjamsudin to her role as Client Liaison Officer was recognised. Some 40 residents and five Rotarians attended the morning tea.

David went on to report on the trailer raffle at Cherrybrook on Saturday 28 November. A kerfuffle arose over the shopping centre management not recording our booking. Nevertheless our team took \$880, putting this year's results to date well ahead of last year.

The RC of West Pennant Hills/Cherrybrook held a Youth Evening on 30 November. President David attended the function and signed the papers

relevant to the chartering of the proposed Rotaract Club of Pennant Hills/Cherrybrook early next February.

He related the plight of the Club's Youth Exchange student who went to Vienna last January. All went well until the second wave of the virus in Austria saw the country close down, however she was able to return home at the last moment. Several exchange students remain stranded abroad.

The arrangements for our forthcoming Christmas social evening came next. Theo Glockemann had passed a quote from a spit roast team to our President and members agreed to accept their quote and muster at Chez Fraser on 23 December.

Arrangements for our Australia Day Function on 27 January will see David Raphael, Principal of St Lucy's School, joining us.

President David then advised that our District Zone have offered a grant of \$20,000 should we hold a community event. Recently David became aware the RC of Beecroft is planning a function at Beecroft Bowling Club and suggested we join them. This was agreed.

Another suggestion, related to the Centenary of Rotary in Australia, is the planting of trees in the Blue Mountains in areas affected by last summer's bushfires.

President David attended a meeting at Galston recently with a representative of the Kurin-Gai Dementia Centre. He will discuss this project further with the Uniting Church of Thornleigh, also interested in joining us in this venture. Those attending the Dementia Café will require a referral from their GP explaining they are experiencing dementia. Attendance at the café will be limited to eight, plus their carers. It is anticipated the café will be opened early next year.

Pat Parker reported on the Trees of Joy and has already collected gifts. He plans to take the first delivery to Stewart House on Thursday, 10 December and invited any interested members to join him. Gifts are also coming in that will go to the Parramatta Mission, the Smith Family and Meals on Wheels.

President David reported his contact with our former Rotarian, Robert Rutishauser, now a member of the RC of Port Macquarie. Robert complimented us on our activities and seeks a link with our Christmas function. The general meeting was then closed and we moved on to the annual general meeting.
