President David opened the meeting and welcomed the terrific thirteen and made a special reference to Treasurer Ian Chappel who had on many previous occasions appeared on Zoom. The dinner was immediately on the table and it was a nice beef and mushroom pie with greens.

David mentioned that Pam Hudson's mother had a fall and broke her hip, she was in intensive care and they were hoping for the best. He also advised that Ian Huckle was in hospital over the weekend, but he was not aware of the problem. The president reflected on last weeks meeting involving our Federal Member Julian Leeser and his project to improve the service by Telstra and referred to a family in Thornleigh with no mobile phone service. David also advised that he was hopeful of inducting a new member on our changeover night of Wednesday 30 June and also advised of the new Rotary Club of Galston/Greater Hills chartering on Saturday 24 July.

Treasurer Ian Chappel advised that the last 12 months had been very difficult for him, he had separated from his wife and moved to the Blue Mountains area and as a result he would have to resign from the Club, but would ensure that all the books were up to date by the end of June. He also advised that changeover night would be his last at the Rotary Club of Pennant Hills.

Theo gave a full update of the difficulties faced with a number of projects involving East Timor. He mentioned that the RYLA project was doing very well with the tremendous support from Woodside, but there have been a lot of difficulties in obtaining funding for the RYPEN project. In previous years the Galston club had been a big supporter of the RYPEN project, but they were no longer able to assist and he was urgently trying to get up to \$3,000 and if so he could obtain a further \$3,000 from Rotary as a District Grant. A number of members indicated that they may be able to assist with some funding and it was left to the members to contact Theo and advise if they could help.

With the nominated 5 minute interview member (Pam Hudson) being absent, President David selected Ida Shi as the victim. Her home in China was about 90 minutes flying from Bejing, her parents are retired and both living and in good health. They are both dance performers and her father plays ping pong every day. Her father was an administration manager at a steel company and her mother was an accountant. Ida hopes to have her parents visit her here in Australia and if they do, she will ensure that they both perform at one of our Rotary meetings.

John was able to show the places along the way , including Campbell Island ,


