Meeting Report – 14th March 2022

Phil Stanton opened this meeting that would combine our Australia Day Award and the Club anniversary. Barry Seach was invited to Welcome to Country. He related his background to local

Gadigal people then reflected on the contact of Aboriginal peoples in the Sydney area with First Fleeters. At times relationships were cordial but often violent, aggravated by the deadly effects of smallpox. He reminded us that not only had the First Fleet crossed expansive oceans but the first settlers crossed over 200 miles of ocean to reach this land over 65,000 years ago.

President Kaye Carter then welcomed our visitors including the Mayor of Hornsby, District Governor Lindsay May and Tania, guest speaker Janelle Dodd, Assistant Governor Stuart, and Principal of St



Lucy's School. Following Rotary grace, Mayor Philip Ruddock proposed the toast to Australia and Theo Glockemann proposed the toast to Rotary International. DG Lindsay thanked Theo for his remarks and told us that a grant of \$34,000 towards flood relief in the Hawkesbury River districts had been made by the Rotary Foundation and would be matched by a private donation of \$50,000.

Following dinner, President Kaye brought our many visitors up-to-date with our recent activities. She started with today being 62 years since our charter and that since last July Zoom had kept the Club together. She reflected on the passing of PP Ian Huckel last month, and then went on to many activities. We had donated Ipads and Easter eggs to retirement villages, we had sold poppies at Remembrance and Anzac Day to support Hornsby RSL sub-branch with \$1,800. An effort had been made to publicise our Club locally through advertisements, Chinese lanterns and Diwali posters. Our public face was most prominent because of our annual trailer raffle and Trees of Joy in Pennant Hills and Thornleigh shopping centres. The trailer raffle allowed us to donate \$8,000 to St Lucy's. John Ellis presented David Raphael, St Lucy's Principal, with a large "cheque" for \$8,000, the proceeds of the trailer raffle. David, in responding, explained that our donation would go towards bursaries for students whose parents were unable to meet the school fees.

President Kaye introduced Janelle Dodd, our guest speaker. Janelle has been a volunteer for community activities in and around Ryde for many years through Rotaract, her Church, local school and Rotary exchange students. She was very busy in 2012-13 supporting the then DG, her husband, John. She is now full time with Days for Girls. Through this organization she and her team of volunteers mobilize to increase access to menstrual products and vital health information for women and girls around the world. They make and distribute washable and reusable menstrual products for girls and women in disadvantaged and remote communities. Janelle explained that Celeste Mergens from Seattle was looking at solutions to alleviate poverty in



Kenya. At an orphanage Celeste found 400 children in overcrowded living quarters and could see that the supply of appropriate food would help. She retuned to Seattle and got things moving, then woke up one day thinking, "What do those girls do when menstruating?" This had never been mentioned when she had been investigating their living conditions. On asking, the response was, "Nothing." She found the usual practice was to sit on a piece of cardboard, usually unfed, and wait until it had passed. Celeste's solution in 2008 – raise funds for disposable pads for 500 girls. These were welcomed however the used pads ended up everywhere – holes in the ground, on a fence, down the loo and many were being re-used. She then considered a washable and re-useable solution. Of course this is a world-wide problem, menstruation being a normal part of being female in good health. On looking wider than Kenya she came across the myths, taboos and customs in many third world countries. In a practical aspect, menstruating girls missed school, thus lowering education levels. Celeste knew that higher levels of education amongst girls meant fewer children. She had a kit dropped to each table so visitors could see the contents – a shield, a pad holder, liners, layers of flannelette, a water resistant bag, a wash cloth, soap, instructions and a calendar to keep track of one's cycle. Kits are delivered with an education program that covers biology, the menstrual cycle and hand washing. Boys have been included so that they can understand their women. A kit



delivery is followed up six months later. Celeste found that some follow ups revealed that there wasn't water for the washing. The program now has the support of the World Health Organisation. The program developed in Australia in 2012 and Janelle heard about it three years later. These days she holds workshops here to make up kits - about 200 at a time. The recent two years have interrupted the program but it has not stopped. She had some statistics - since commencement,

some 2.4 million kits have been distributed to 600 million girls and women in 140 countries, supported by 50,000 volunteers. Here the kits cost about \$15 to \$20 to prepare. Janelle reflected that today's world has many seeminaly insoluble problems, but this isn't one of them. It can assist in empowering women who can then become leaders. There is no financial support from our governments, thus Days for Girls is dependent upon fund raising. World Vision has assisted with transport costs.

Pam Hudson, who had suggested Janelle Dodd as our speaker, then thanked Janelle with a bunch of


flowers and a cheque for \$500 for Days for Girls. David Firth came to the lectern to give the background to our Australia Day Award of 36 years then invited PDG Kalma McLellan to join President Kave to present this year's award. Kave announced that the award was for Janelle Dodd. For a moment she was speechless, then she told us of the rewards it had given her, meeting people through an a amazing community project.

The raffle conducted during the night was then drawn - prizes donated by IGA and Harris Farm. President Kaye then presented certificates of appreciation to Pat Dewey, a champion poppy knitter and Liz Chuck for the Thornleigh Shopping Centre's support of our Tree of Joy. SHELTERBOX UPDATE - 18th March

ShelterBox *is* responding to the Ukraine crisis. We have a team in Poland and aid is on the way. We are working on three projects – two within Ukraine and one to support refugees fleeing the county.

We are sending mattresses to 'collective centres' like schools, churches and sports centres in western Ukraine. This will ensure people who have fled their homes have somewhere to sleep and keep warm at night.

We are preparing to provide shelter kits with tools and rope, high thermal blankets, hygiene kits (including items like soap, washing powder and toothpaste), solar lights, buckets and water carriers to help people survive in buildings damaged by the conflict.

We will be supporting refugees in neighbouring countries with high priority items they can carry with them, like hygiene items and warm winter coats.

Thanks to all those that have generously contributed to our <u>Ukraine Appeal</u>. With the UN putting the number of refugees fleeing the country now at 3 million, and millions more displaced with Ukraine, the need is only going to grow, as the conflict continues.

This month's quote comes from Matthew Desmond, "Housing is absolutely essential to human flourishing. Without stable shelter, it all falls apart."

'The Big Switch' by Saul Griffith

Climate change is a planetary emergency. We have to do something now – but what? Australian visionary Saul Griffith has a plan. In *The Big Switch*, Griffith lays out a detailed blueprint – optimistic but feasible – for fighting climate change while creating millions of new jobs and a healthier environment. Griffith explains exactly what it would take to transform our infrastructure, update our grid, and adapt our households. The same natural advantages – incredible resources on an enormous continent – that helped Australia prosper in the 20th century are the ingredients for becoming the most prosperous, entirely renewable, economy in the world. Interestingly, one of his main points is to change all gas appliances to electric! We just need to be electric. Driving our vehicles will be cheaper than it has ever been. Heating our homes and our showers will be cheaper too. The average household will probably save \$5000 a year or more on energy and car expenses.'—Saul Griffith
