Continuing the findings of a recent survey conducted in Australia. What different age groups think about climate change

Differing views are apparent between age groups. People aged 65 and over are the largest cohort that believe climate change is happening (83%). This compares with only 72% of young people aged 18-34 years that believe climate change is real.

The younger age group of 18 to 34 year-olds were most likely to think climate change is either not happening (15%) or to be unsure (14%).

Around half of Australians aged 50 and over attribute climate change to humans (49 to 50%). However, those aged 35 to 49 years old hold the opinion that humans are causing climate change, the strongest of all age groups, at 56%.

Those aged 65 and over were most likely to think that climate change is just a natural fluctuation in Earth's temperatures. In fact, some 35% of those aged 65 and over view it as a natural fluctuation, compared with only 18% of young people aged 18 to 34 who hold that view.

Theo will leave for Timor on 2nd May for four days. He will oversee the RYLA and RYEN project planning. The office which has been set up will require training for staff. Theo will return to Timor in October for RYLA and is grateful for sponsorship through Woodside.

John Ellis introduced the guest speaker, Paige Newton, who attended National Youth Science Forum (NYSF) this year. Paige's NYSF experience was on-line this year due to COVID. An excellent presentation followed covering her experience. She was introduced to this opportunity by her mother, a science teacher. She was quite hesitant at first. Research into the program found that it covered engineering which she wanted to pursue. She was not sure what to choose - Robotics, mechatronics or mechanics, and information from Wikipedia was limited.

In the lead up to NYSF she received a NYSF student shirt. Paige was also sent prerequisites for upcoming science experiments. Joining Discord-social media network to learn more about the organisation and fellow participants. The in person events - ANSTO discovery centre, UNSW Science Day, UTS meet the researchers, and a Speed Meet have been postponed to a later date. Paige downloaded the Whova app for the first event. The most inspirational session was the privilege to experience the Nobel Laureate session called CERN Live Cross. This was like a physics Disneyland. She is considering learning a few languages and to move to Switzerland.



A session called "Dr Karl's House Party" featured recommendations of his books, podcast and newsletters to sign up to. Students were encouraged to sign up to MIT's Technology Review for updates on new scientific discoveries, research and opportunities worldwide.

The next week included a live cross Antarctic to meet a medical practitioner, environmental assessment officer and a remediation team. Satellite tracking allowed a view of penguins and how they monitored marine life.

Paige thanked the club for the support that she was given. She enjoyed the Speaking Rotary session and plans to expand her knowledge of Rotary.

John Ellis thanked Paige for an excellent presentation.

President Kaye closed the meeting.
