Through the generosity of supporters across Australia and New Zealand, during the past 12 months Interplast was able to:

Provide virtual consultations and surgical services to 75 individuals who would otherwise not be able to access life-changing care

- Deliver hand therapy products and specialist cleft feeding bottles to children and adults in countries from Bhutan in Asia to Fiji in the Pacific
- Support over 300 clinicians to learn more about burns care and prevention
- Deliver exceptional clinical education to approximately 1,000 medical professionals via our 26 webinars, delivered to individuals in 35 countries across the globe
- Run regular group and individual mentoring sessions for surgeons, anaesthetists and nurses in developing communities throughout the region
- Support 10+ hospitals to implement improvement plans designed to enhance medical services offered to patients
- Undertake extensive research on the high rates of diabetic foot disease in Pacific Islands nations, together with a baseline research project examining the state of surgery in the region.

MEETING REPORT - 10th August, 2022

President Phil Stanton opened this meeting, the first in our new venue, the Pennant Hills Community Health Centre at 5 Fisher Street, Pennant Hills. He opened with the reminder that we are now in an age quite different to 30 years ago and that we now need to consider our purpose and what is it that we want to do or be doing. Should it be more involvement in the community? By this he included the local schools, the local shopping centre and the Banna Group. Should it be about fellowship? Importantly we must also address membership. To develop local relationships we must promote what we do, who we are and what our purpose is all about. Rotary responds: support for Ukraine

The Rotary Foundation and Rotary clubs around the world have hurried to provide funds, supplies, and services to Ukrainians displaced by the war.

The Rotary Foundation has raised more than \$15 million in contributions that are already helping provide people in Ukraine with essential items such as water, food, shelter, medicine, and clothing. Donations made to the Disaster Response Fund after 30 April will be available to all communities around the world that need assistance recovering from disasters.

Rotary members in North America, South America, and Europe have collaborated with a U.S.-based association of Ukrainian health care workers and used their connections to collect and ship more than 350 tons of critical medical supplies to Ukraine.

As of May, five cargo planes packed with medical supplies such as tourniquets, blood-clotting gauze, negative pressure wound therapy equipment, and medications have been flown from Chicago to Europe, where members have helped deliver them to Ukraine.

"It is Rotary doing what Rotary does best. It networks, pulls people together, and gets the job done," says RI Director Pat Merryweather-Arges, who has helped coordinate the shipments.
