

PRESIDENT'S CORNER & MEETING REPORT

Last Wednesday's meeting was a relaxed Fellowship Night with President Phil in the chair. I had spoken to Theo earlier and had asked him to come along with a few Trivia questions to pose as something different.

President Phil started off with a discussion about our meeting times and frequency. As we are in transition mode, it is important to ensure we are all in agreement with some of these basic arrangements.



It was agreed that we continue with 2 business meetings a month, on the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays; on the 2nd and 4th Wednesdays we will assemble at the Community Health Centre and then proceed to a local restaurant for a meal. On each occasion the start time will be 7.00pm.

The discussion then centred on partnerships. The first ones we should persue are the schools - Pennant Hills High and Pennant Hills Public and the respective P & C Associations. We already have approval to to have an insert in the high school newsletter 'Jumbunna' which goes out regularly to staff, parents and students. Other possible partnerships are the local community organisations - perhaps the Pennant Hills Civic Trust - and also Hornsby Shire Council and their listing of community groups.

We then moved to projects and fundraising ideas which included both our established ones - the Christmas Trailer Raffle; the Trees of Joy; and Phil undertook to contact David Raphael at St Lucy's School to see if we can work together on the trailer raffle; - and new ideas like the Hole in One competition proposed by Terry; also a restructured Golf Day with Phil and I following up a possible partnership. Adrian also offered to get a creative writer to prepare a suitable item for the school newsletter mentioned before.

We then had a short trivia burst from Theo which included some fairly obscure questions and some equally obscure answers with Theo claiming to be the final arbiter of the accuracy. Despite this, we had a good time with plenty of goodnatured banter.

The following is a post on Facebook by Rotary International General Secretary and CEO John Hewko on August 25th. The previous day was the National Day of the Ukraine.

The 1990's feel like a lifetime ago. Recently, Marga and I were going through photos of our time living in Ukraine. From moments of joy and experiencing history to moments of connection, we wouldn't trade this period of our lives for anything.

Today, and all days, I am proud of my ties to Ukraine, my Ukrainian heritage, and my parents who were forced to flee Ukraine from communist oppression. On this day 31 years ago, 24 August 1991, I had the good fortune of being in the Ukrainian Parliament building to witness Ukraine declare its independence. I remember being in the backroom discussions of the contending parliamentary factions, the raucous debates, the massive crowd outside the Parliament building with its sea of yellow and blue flags; and then the euphoria that filled all of us present when the final vote for independence was taken. One of the iconic moments of the day was the bringing of an enormous Ukrainian flag into the Parliament hall after the vote, draping the flag on the dias in front of a huge statue of Lenin, followed by a full throated rendition by the MPs of the song Chervona Kalyna (Red Viburnum) which has now become the rallying song for Ukrainians in their current struggle against Russian aggression and atrocities (with countless renditions being played around the world in support of Ukraine).

It was the dream of my parents, my grandparents, my great-grandparents, and their respective generations to see an independent Ukraine. But that dream is now under mortal threat. Ukraine's Independence Day is typically celebrated with fanfare, but the rallies are banned this year for fear of Russian rocket strikes on civilian and other non-military targets.

Today also marks six months since Russia invaded Ukraine -- six months of unceasing death, mass destruction, and war crimes. But these months are a testament to the bravery, resilience, and love of country exhibited by the Ukrainian people and to the generosity of those outside Ukraine who have come to the country's aid at this extraordinary time of need.

Slava Ukrajini!
