The plan is to transport what is donated out to the Cowra area where Rotary there will arrange distribution. So, a great initiative Pam. Who knows where this will lead?

This was our annual meeting with the District Governor Mina Howard and was held at the Health Centre. Once dinner was finished, President Phil called the meeting to order. First point of action was David and the success of the trailer raffle at Westleigh the previous Saturday. \$1137 raised but it was very encouraging that people came up and recognised Rotary and St Lucy's School, so they were happy to help out for both. Next Saturday we are selling at Coonara. David also mentioned an upcoming fund raising project at Westfield Hornsby where we will need members to wrap presents for Christmas. Westfield provides the supplies and PH Rotary gets to keep any funds raised by providing wrapping.

Next point was Theo's overview of his most recent trip to Timor. RYLA and RYPEN where a great success with Theo very impressed with the spirit of the participants, the fine work of the locals in setting up and hosting the event and the recognition of local businesses that graduates of these programs will make valuable employees. Theo said it was a very rewarding event but it will be a real success when he and Angelo can walk away and allow the locals to run the program. Theo is very impressed by the recognition he gets from past participants while visiting local businesses and sees them being successful in the local workplace.

Christmas programs are well under way with Tree of Joy set up in Pennant Hills (cards already getting picked up quickly), Thornleigh to be done this week and our new involvement with Ray White who are hosting a tree in their office and providing local exposure for Pennant Hills Rotary in the office and mail outs to the community. All donations are off to Stewart House and Parramatta Mission.

President Phil then invited DG Mina Howard to speak. She started off with an overview of this years presidential theme with the circle and 7 dots above the green line which is the navigation stick. The 3 colours are Purple for Rotary, White for peace and green for the environment. The circle and the 7 dots represent a meeting place and the 7 items of focus for Rotary. Her focus is on finding out what the current members are doing, what they want and how they view the club projects and if they enjoy their club; so she is big on membership surveys. She discussed the need for clubs to adapt to the membership to create an environment for fellowship and friendship with different meeting types, range of projects so everyone is involved and well

meeting types, range of projects so everyone is involved and well engaged with the local community. There also needs to be measurement of the success over time so everyone is involved. She went over the great resources that Rotary provide through the Online learning centre so people can learn more about Rotary and interact with others, or if there is an interest they can find like minded people in other clubs to work on ideas or find out other ways to do things. She went through a number of projects that she has been involved in such as the foundations support of communities hit by recent flood disasters in getting financial support to the area through 3 different district grants. She is impressed by the large number of RAWCS projects under way to assist communities locally and overseas. She believes the Polio Project is coming to an end by maybe 2026 so discussions are being had about what to next focus on, such as Malaria or AIDs. She believes regionalisation is a great step forward as it gives us a significant voice in the area to speak with corporates about programs or sponsorships. They are currently working on a budget and setting up a plan of how to move forward. There are currently 21 districts in Australasia which means a significant amount of duplication so it should be much easier to get things done. She encouraged us to seek District Support if required and encouraged people to attend the conference in Cowra. She had brought along a walking stick which she is encouraging all going to the conference to make one in the club and bring it along to the conference. Please read the Rotary Magazine and eNews to be up to date. She closed off her presentation but there was a question about the director of a club having to be registered and Theo raised the issue of us having to pay a royalty for the Pride of Workmanship program run by the club. Mina said she would investigate and respond to both. President Phil thanked Mina for her presentation and we then enjoyed a lovely mango cake for desert as the meeting closed.
