REPORT FROM OUR MEETING ON JANUARY 11th

Well it was the first meeting of the new year and there were 8 people in attendance.

The meeting got off to a bit of a slow start as there were a few jokes to be shared and travel reviews that needed to be shared with the group. Ida had an interesting joke about how to get an elephant into a fridge.

The main topic of discussion was the format and required tasks for the upcoming Australia Day event at the Pennant Hills Golf Club on January 25th. The tasks were allocated around the group and John Ellis was challenged with coming up with an Australiana quiz of 20 questions. Pam Hudson also reminded members of the morning tea at the aged care centre in Kitchener Road on Wednesday January 25th. We are also supplying lamingtons to Lutanda Manor. Once again we are to receive financial support for our Australia Day activities through our Rotary cluster from the National Australia Day Council.

John Ellis went over the upcoming youth events. John is delivering Aaron Muston, our nominee, to the RYLA event on Sunday at Knox Grammar School, Wahroonga. He is going to ask him to speak at the club on the 1st of February. Our candidates at RYPEN will be a boy and a girl from Year 9 last year at Pennant Hills High School and it will take place at Narabeen Sports Centre on the 3, 4 and 5th of February. Anoop Sud asked if his grandson could be considered for next year's event.

President David reminded people to register for the Annual District Conference in Cowra on March 17-19 as well as the Rotary International Convention in Melbourne on the 27-31 of May. There are already a few registrations.

He then opened it up for discussions on how the structure of the meetings could be run for the new year. The first item raised was by Theo about meetings at the Hotel Pennant Hills. He felt there was too much noise for a standard meeting and suggested a meal be catered/supplied at the Health Centre meeting place like the one done for the governor's meeting last year. Anoop suggested a meal be brought by various members to share. David asked about the number of meetings to be held; should there be a weekly one or one every second week. No consensus was determined so looking for more feedback from others. Discussion then turned to improving the focus on services/projects for the community and other projects. Pam suggested a Mothers Day raffle with prizes which may include vouchers. Anoop suggested an award at the local schools for a volunteer of the year or for some special event the student was involved in. David spoke of the Dementia Cafe which has been on hold since the start of Covid. It was suggested we might contact local doctors to see if there were any local folk who could use some support. This may have some confidentiality challenges. Jim Fraser is to look at available dates for a sausage sizzle at Bunnings. David highlighted the need for a membership drive late in February when schedules are back on track.
